



At the last Board meeting the College asked for a release of funds for land. The land is needed at the present time for parking space. The College has asked for a contingent release of funds from the Board of Public Works. A purchase order has been submitted for a twelve-passenger station wagon and for a fiberglass shell to put on the amphitheater.

Glenville State College's budget for 1963-64 is personal service - \$518,071; current expense - \$75,240; equipment - \$38,535; community development and research - \$13,000; and land - \$18,000.

The College has added three new buildings since 1943. Since 1943 the enrollment has increased from 369 to 848.

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
