

Caruso published his first book, "Liberators of Mexico," in 1954. He began to formulate plans for his current series in 1955. "I did research for the first two volumes together," Caruso stated," and I have completed one book every two years."

Dr. Caruso also is a consultant for the National Geographic Society. His name appeared on the inside cover of "America's Historylands," along with other prominent writers including Carl Sandburg. "America's Historylands" was published by the National Geographic Society and has sold 125,000 copies.




