John Caruso, Historian, Will Speak Here Friday

Dr. John A. Caruso, professor of history at West Virginia University, will be guest Centennial speaker at GSC on April 26 at 1:30 p.m. Speech is tentatively scheduled for the Little Theatre. His subject will be "Admission of West Virginia to the Union."

SENIOR DAY SET MAY 2

On May 2 over 600 high school seniors from 18 high schools will be on the GSC campus to participate in the senior-day program. This program will begin in the gymnasium at 9 a.m. with the musical selection by the band while the seniors assemble.

The general assembly will begin at 10 a.m. Here, the seniors will have the opportunity to learn something about the college, what it has to offer, and why it is important for good high school students to attend college.

Following the assembly, the students will be given an opportunity to see demonstrations in the Science Building by the science department and the displays of the home economics department. Guided tours of Women's Hall, Verona Maple Hall, Louis Bennett Hall and the Home Management House are being arranged.

In the afternoon, the athletic department will sponsor physical fitness demonstrations at the Health and Physical Education Building.

This 16th annual Senior Day is being directed by Mr. Beryl Langford, registrar. During the general assembly Margaret Hofmann will discuss, "Why College Is Important to a Girl," and Harry Lynch will discuss, "Why College Is Important to a Boy."

Dr. Caruso, a noted historical author, has recently presented two manuscripts of his series of books on the American frontier to the University Library. He eventually will give all six of his manuscripts to WVU.

To date Caruso has completed three books in the series which will include six volumes.

"Appalachian Frontier," the first volume, was published in 1959 and was nominated for the Pulitzer Prize. It was followed with the "Great Lakes Frontier," which was chosen one of the best books of 1961 by the "Saturday Review." The third volume, "Southern Frontier," will be published next month and three more volumes will follow.

The six completed volumes, according to Caruso, will be retitled and issued in two large volumes: "American Frontier East of the Mississippi" and "American Frontier West of the Mississippi."

Almost 4,000 people received the vaccine, and this project could not have been accomplished without many volunteers.

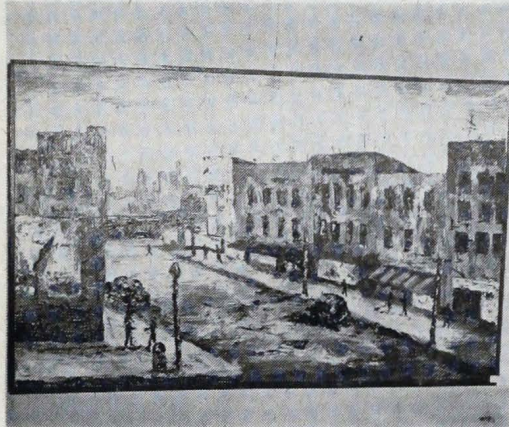

first narrative history of the American frontier.

Caruso published his first book, "Liberators of Mexico," in 1954. He began to formulate plans for his current series in 1955.

"I did research for the first two volumes together," Caruso stated, "and I have completed one book every two years."

Dr. Caruso also is a consultant for the National Geographic Society. His name appeared on the inside cover of "America's Storylands," along with other prominent writers including Carl Sandburg. "America's Storylands" was published by the National Geographic Society and has sold 125,000 copies.

Dr. Caruso's appearance at GSC is sponsored by the social studies department. The public is invited to attend.

All rosters for the MAA softball league were to be submitted to Athletic Director Leland Byrd for his approval.

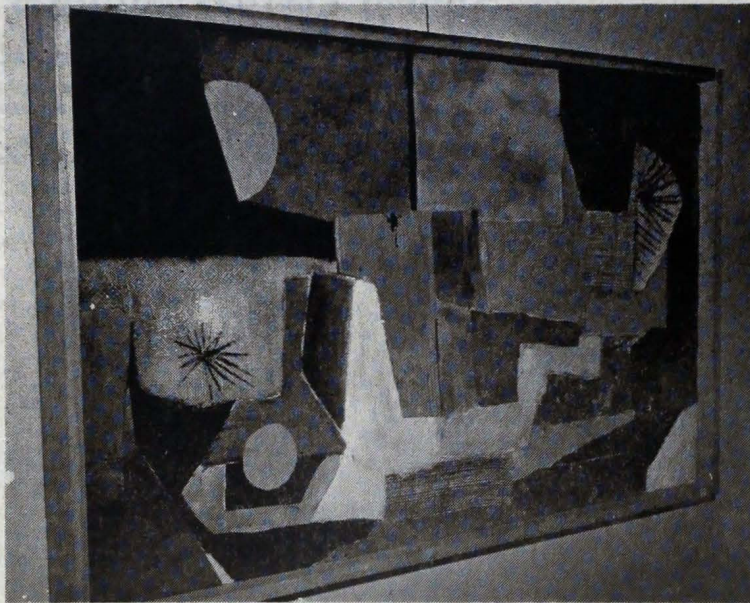

Dr. Epsy Miller attended the meeting of the West Virginia Association of College English Teachers held at Jackson's Mill, Friday and Saturday, April 19-20.

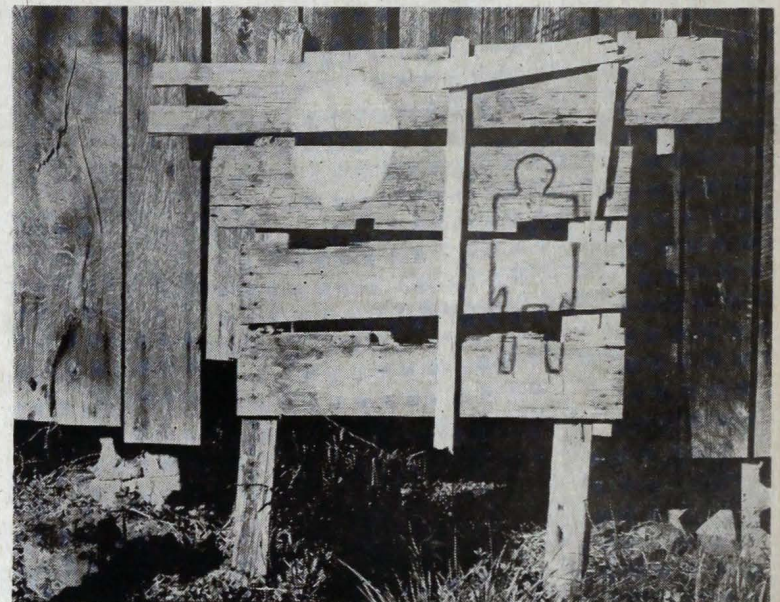
