

The Rev. Dr. Harry B. Taylor, Presbyterian minister of The Church of the Covenant, Cleveland, Ohio, has been selected by the Alumni Association as their "Alumnus of the Year" for 1963.

Dr. Taylor, a native of West Virginia, was graduated from Glenville State College in the Whiting Class of 1930. He will deliver the Baccalaureate sermon here Sunday, May 19. He was graduated from Union Theological Seminary and ordained as a Presbyterian U.S.A. minister. An honorary Doctor of Divinity was awarded to Dr. Taylor by The College of Wooster in 1952.

In New York, Dr. Taylor served as assistant minister of the Brick Presbyterian Church from 1936 to 1939 and was minister of the First Presbyterian Church from 1936 to 1939 and was minister of the First Presbyterian Church from 1936 to 1939 and was minister of the First Presbyterian Church at Syracuse from 1939 to 1949.

Dr. Taylor is chairman of the Committee on Higher Education in the Synod of Ohio. A member of the Clergy Committee on the Cleveland Academy of Religion and Mental Health, The American Academy of Po Vi ti cal al and Social Science and the Union Club of Cleveland Dr. Taylor is also lecturer in homiletics at Oberlin Graduate Schools of Theology.

The Missing Link

WHETHER SOME STUDENTS are aware of it or not, there exists at Glenville State College a chain of command. Certain links in this chain appear to be vague and confused,

and one is missing altogether.

THE MISSING LINK lies between the students and the

THE MISSING LINK lies between the students and the administration. Often times an order or a regulation comes down to the students and is misunderstood by the students. IF THE STUDENTS were supplied with some means to express their views on regulations and to listen to the reasoning behind these rules, the missing link would be supplied. WHY NOT SET up a board, consisting of the President of the College, the Dean of the College, the Dean of Student Affairs and the Dean of Women, who together with four students, duly elected by the student body, could sit down once a month and "hash out" some problems. Surely we can spare one or two hours a month to iron out some of the bad feelings and misunderstandings here.

WE FEEL THAT if such a board would be created, the student body should keep in mind that the four students elected should be outspoken, intelligent and reasoning students, while the administrative side of the board should remember that these students represent the student body and rules should be flexible enough to include their points

THE RELATIONSHIP HERE at Glenville is that of a circle in regard to rules and regulations. The proposed board, while logically unable to break this circle immediately could east make a start toward weakening this vicious circle. SOMETHING MUST BE done. For without the missing

link, we will continue to misunderstand,
