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



All students who will have com-pleted 58 hours of course work at the end of the current semester, and who have not yet been admit-ted to a program in teacher educa-tion must make application for this through their adviser.

Unless a student makes such application and is admitted, he will not be permitted to enroll in upper division education courses and will not be considered a candidate for a degree in education. This does not apply to students who had completed more than 73 hours of course work on June 1, 1963.

Students who need to make such Students who need to make such application should go to their adviser to fill out an application blank and secure his signature. The applications will not be acted upon until completion of the 58 hours of course work, and until the applicant has taken the English proficiency exam.
