Queen Mary Jo Nocida will reign over the activity and pageantry of the 30th Annual Homecoming at Glenville State College. Miss Nocida will be crowned by President Harry B. Heflin on the GSC campus Saturday at 11:15 a.m.

Queen Mary Jo is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carmela Nocida of Glenville. Charles Milhoan, Student Council president, will be her escort.

Members of the Queen's Court are Patricia Ann Burch, senior princess, escorted by Carl Momberger; Hilda Elaine Blankenship, junior princess, escorted by Dale Levering; Christine Elizabeth Schiefer, sophomore princess, escorted by Sam White; Linda Lee Johnson, freshman princess, escorted by James David Marple. Bill Lilly, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Lilly, will be crown bearer.

Miss Burch is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. G. Burch of Grantsville. She is a member of Delta Zeta Sorority, secretary of Women's Hall and was co-head majorette of the College Band during her junior year.

Miss Blankenship is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. M. Blankenship of Adrian. She is an elementary education student at GSC. Miss Schiefer is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Schiefer of Sutton. She is treasurer of Verona Maple Hall.

Miss Johnson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Johnson of Williamstown.

Wesley Bargeloh, popular senior physical science and mathematics student, was selected by the student body to serve as the Pioneer for the 30th annual Homecoming Sept. 28.

Bargeloh is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Mason Bargeloh of Mineral Wells. He is the president of the Wesley Foundation and vice president of the Cosmopolitan Club.

Mr. Pioneer will begin his duties on Friday evening when he will lead the annual snake dance, which will begin on Verona Maple lawn, move around campus, through town and to the bonfire at Rohrbough Field.

Escorts Queen

On Saturday morning, Bargeloh will escort Queen Mary Jo's float in the Homecoming parade. He will attend her coronation on campus, and in the afternoon will help cheer the Pioneers in the annual Homecoming football clash at Rohrbough Field. He will also play an active role at the field when the Pioneers entertain the Salem Tigers Friday, Oct. 18.

In the tradition of the Pioneer which dates back to Oct. 21, 1933, when Charles Barnett served as the first Pioneer, Bargeloh will wear a coonskin cap, buckskin clothes and several days growth of beard.

Mr. Pioneer will carry and shoot a muzzle-loading rifle, and it is rumored that he will have the typical mountaineer jug under his arm.

Saturday, Sept. 28 is Homecoming Day at Glenville State College. The annual Homecoming Parade marks the official beginning of the activities although students, faculty and alumni have been quite busy.

One of the largest groups or units in the Parade will be the "marching" members of the freshman class. The GSC Marching Band, under the direction of Dr. Jack S. Bemis, will be the lead unit of the Parade.

The Parade will also feature campus organization floats and visiting bands from area high schools. Highlighting the parade units will be the Queen's float featuring Queen Mary Jo and the class princesses.

Area high school bands expected to participate in the activities include Burnsville and Harrisville. When the MERCURY went to press other bands had indicated attendance but were awaiting approval of the Board of Education.

Parade chairman is Mr. Lonnie Fitzpatrick who has served in this capacity for many years. Mr. Frank Toth, assistant professor of science, is the general chairman of Homecoming activities. John V. White is the executive secretary of the Alumni Association and Mr. Victor Berry is the president of the Association.

Prizes Awarded

Prizes will be awarded to cam-

pus organization floats in the Parade. First, second and third prizes will be given. Winners of the 1962 floats were Phi Mu Gamma, first; Science Club, second; Alpha Tau Art Club, third.

If time permits the College Band will present a brief concert between the Parade and the coronation ceremony. The Band will provide music for the coronation ceremony which is scheduled to begin at 11:15 a.m.

Coronation On Campus

The GSC Student Council president, Charles Milhoan, will escort Queen Mary Jo to the coronation site on the college campus, class presidents will escort the four princesses to the coronation site. In the presence of college officials, alumni, students and guests, Queen Mary Jo will begin her official reign when she is crowned Homecoming Queen by President Harry B. Heflin.

The annual Homecoming football game will be played between the Glenville Pioneers and the Concord Mountain Lions. Although the Pioneers lost the 1962 Homecoming game to the W. Va. Wesleyan Bobcats, the freshman class is particularly hopeful that the GSC Pioneers can hand the Mountain Lions a 13-point defeat.

PRESIDENT HEFLIN ANNOUNCES GSC STAFF REPLACEMENTS

Nine additions or replacements to the staff are announced by President Harry B. Heflin.

Dr. Jack S. Bemis is assistant professor of music and chairman of the Fine and Applied Arts Division. Dr. Bemis, a native of New York State, holds a BSME degree from Ithaca College and the Master's and Ph.D. from Eastman School of Music. His teaching experience includes periods at Hampton, Virginia, High School, Houghton College, and Johnson State College, Johnson, Vermont. Dr. Bemis served four years with the 325th and 566th Air Force Bands.

Deel Returns

Mr. William S. Deel is Dean of Men and assistant professor of psychology and guidance. Mr. Deel was graduated from Glenville State College in 1958, and earned the MS degree at W. Va. University in 1959. He has a year of additional study at W. Va. University and the University of Pittsburgh. For the past four years, he has been employed in the public schools of Wood and Hancock counties in guidance and testing.

Mr. Bernard C. McKown is the new assistant professor of physical science. Mr. McKown graduated from GSC in 1956 and earned the MA degree from W. Va. University in 1960. He has additional graduate work from Marshall University, Case Institute of Technology, and just completed summer school at Cornell University.

Wink Is Art Instructor

Mr. Jon D. Wink has been employed as instructor in art. He

holds the BFA degree from the University of Texas and the MFA degree from the University of Washington. He also attended Southwestern University and Ohio University. Mr. Wink held assistantships at Southwestern, Ohio University and the University of Washington.

Mr. Rodney J. Busch is serving as instructor in speech and dramatics. He holds the AB degree from GSC and the MA from Pennsylvania State University. For the past two years, he has taught in the public schools of W. Va. and Ohio. He held an assistantship in dramatics while attending Pennsylvania State University.

Mr. Willis M. Gordon, who taught zoology at Southern Illinois University during the summer, has been employed as instructor in zoology. He holds the BS degree from Missouri University and the MS degree from Southern Illinois University.

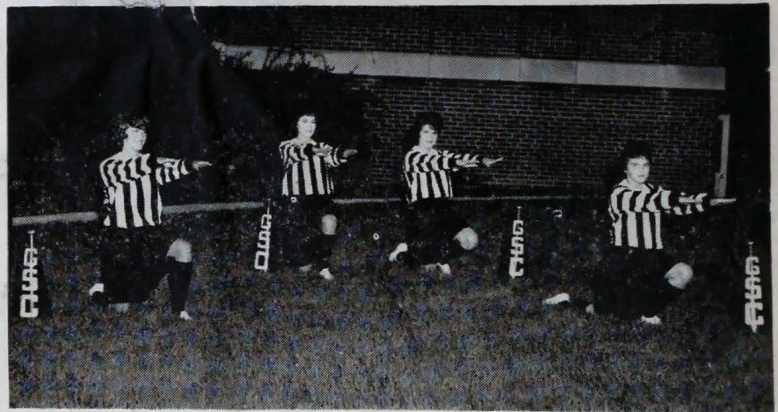

Students Must Make Request

All students who will have completed 58 hours of course work at the end of the current semester, and who have not yet been admitted to a program in teacher education must make application for this through their adviser.

Unless a student makes such application and is admitted, he will not be permitted to enroll in upper division education courses and will not be considered a candidate for a degree in education. This does not apply to students who had completed more than 73 hours of course work on June 1, 1963.

Students who need to make such application should go to their adviser to fill out an application blank and secure his signature. The applications will not be acted upon until completion of the 58 hours of course work, and until the applicant has taken the English proficiency exam. Students who have been rejected should make a new application.

score. They will be looking for win number two Saturday.

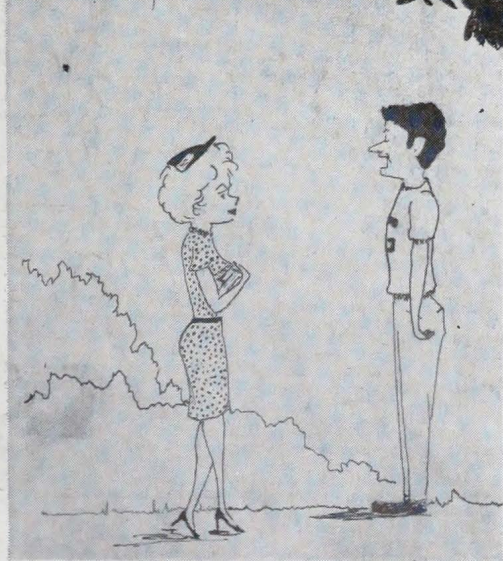
Pre-game music will be provided by College Band.

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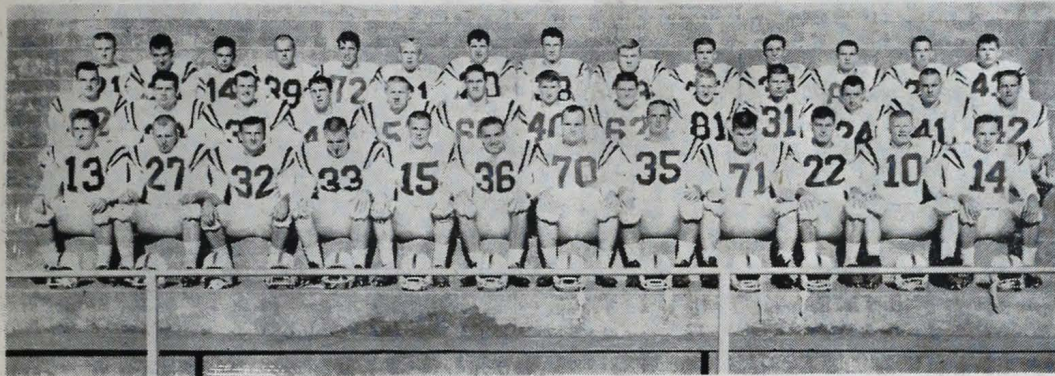
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Wave Will Face Concord Saturday

Football Time Will Be 2 P.M.

Coach Jesse Lilly's GSC Pioneers will clash with the always powerful Concord Mountain Lions in the 30th Annual Homecoming game Sept. 28 at 2 p.m. at Rohrbough Field.

The Pioneers walloped West Liberty 21-0 in their first contest of the season while Concord slaughtered Bluefield State, 40-0.

A real battle is expected to take place because of the Homecoming defeat suffered by the Pioneers the past year after registering six consecutive homecoming victories. The Pioneers lost to W. Va. Wesleyan.

The Lillymen traveled to Concord last year and led the Lions 13-6 at half-time. However, the Lions roared back to score 13 points in the second-half to hand defeat to the Pioneers. The final tally came on a 38-yard reverse pass to end Tom Munsey with 6:24 left to go in the game.

If the Pioneers have the desire and spirit they displayed Sept. 14 against West Liberty they could very easily erase the Homecoming defeat suffered the past year and begin a new string of victories. Also, the Pioneers will be out to avenge the defeat handed to them by the Mountain Lions last year.

Strong GSC Defense Stops Visiting West Liberty 21-0

The underdog Glenville State College Pioneers relied heavily on a fine defensive performance, Saturday, Sept. 14, to defeat the visiting West Liberty Hilltoppers 21-0, in the opening WVAC game for both colleges.

GSC defense lead by Ernie Moore and Pat Briscoe, held the visitors to only one yard gained on the ground in the second half, and allowed the Hilltoppers only 57 total yards for the entire game.

The White Wave showed a fierce and fighting defense and repeatedly caught the W-L quarterback behind the line of scrimmage.

Pottmeyer Calls Plays

While the defense was performing so well, the offense also was working almost to perfection. With Ollie Pottmeyer calling the plays, and Tom Gunnoe, Joe Duncan, and Louie Nocida running the pigskin, the Pioneers rolled up 171 yards rushing and another 62 yards passing, for a total of 233.

In first downs, Glenville also held a 15-5 advantage.

Kiser Scores First

The Pioneers first touchdown came on the last play of the first quarter when Jim Kiser bulled over from the one-yard line, after the defense had forced West Lib-

erty to punt. John Lucas then made his first of three extra points, as the home team went ahead to stay. In the second period, the White Wave made it 14-0, as a pass from Ollie Pottmeyer to Tom Gunnoe was good for 41 yards and touchdown.

Glenville closed out the scoring in the third period, after freshman Larry North blocked an attempted West Liberty punt, and the Pioneers took over on the one-yard line. Two plays later Pottmeyer sneaked over from the one; Lucas again converted making the score 21-0.

Units Listed

The Pioneer defense has Bucklew and Wallenburg at ends, Casto and Briscoe at tackles, North and K. Moore at guards, with E. Moore and Kiser at linebackers, and Lustig, Taylor, and Davidson in the secondary.

The offensive unit was made up of Nichols and Blake at ends, Kinzer and Totten, at tackles, Erwin and Downey at guards, and Gossman at center. In the backfield were Pottmeyer, Duncan, Gunnoe and Nocida.

Robert Kent Morris, 1961 graduate, received a graduate teaching assistantship at W. Va. University and will work toward his master's degree in business administration.

Kinzer Directs MAA Program

MAA Director William Kinzer has announced plans for a meeting to be held at 7 p.m., Sept. 24 in the Health Building.

All MAA team managers and team captains must be present. The activities for the program this year include volleyball, badminton, basketball, swimming, golf, shuffleboard, ping pong and softball.

Officials will be provided by Physical Education 131 under the guidance of Mr. Jesse Lilly.

The MAA program will be based on a team-point system for the entire year. This is the first time the point system has been used since the intramural program began.

John Lustig will assist Kinzer in presenting the program.

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HAMMETT GETS AWARD

Gale "Bud" Hammett Jr., a 1963 graduate of Glenville State College, has been awarded the 11th-annual Frank Montrose award. This outstanding honor is based upon scholastic as well as athletic ability.

Hammett was graduated from Pennsboro High School in 1959. During his high school days, he was a four letterman in baseball and football.

After high school graduation, he attended the Citadel Military School, but he transferred to Glenville State College after his freshman year. Here he participated in football and baseball winning letters each year in each sport.

Award Honors Athlete

The Frank Montrose Memorial Award was established by the Student Council in honor of the late Frank Montrose, former Glenville student and athlete. In his one year here, 1939, Montrose established himself an all-time Pioneer great.

In the spring of 1940 the 21-year old Richwood youth went blind and shortly afterward, in June, died in a Baltimore hospital. It was later learned that Montrose had been affected with nephritis.
