Lyceum 'Three In Concert' Features Musicians, Dancers

The Lyceum Committee will sponsor a performance by "Three in Concert," musicians and dancers, tomorrow night at 8 o'clock in the auditorium. Glenville State College students will be admitted by activity tickets.

"Three in Concert" is a group of three exciting young people who present one of the most unusual combinations in the concert

world. In a program designed to interest an audience of varied experience and taste, they will present music and dance from classical to modern.

DOUGLAS WILLIAMS, organizer of the group, plays classical music on the marimba. Paul Owsley and Harriet All are dancers. Peggy Paschall is the pianist. Although they appear at different times, the piano furnishes the ac-

companiment for both the marimba and the dancers.

EACH OF THESE performers felt it necessary to improve his work by going to better teachers in New York and living in the cultural environment which the city offers. GSC Registrar Announces Increase in Enrollment

Registrar Beryl Langford announced recently that registration figures show a total of 957 students enrolled at Glenville State College. This total consists of 895 on-campus students and 62 who are enrolled in extension classes. This represents an increase of five and one-half per cent over last year's on-campus students and a continuous growth since 1951 when only 369 were enrolled.

The freshman class leads in the number of full-time students with 290. Sophomores are second with 231; juniors have 164; seniors 137, and five are doing post-graduate work. There are also 68 part-time students enrolled.

As in the past, the men outnumber the women 493 to 402.

There are 40 out-of-state students attending Glenville State College. Two of these students are from Nyasaland; 14 from Ohio; ten from Pennsylvania; four each from Maryland and Virginia; three from Delaware; and one each from Florida, New Jersey, and Tennessee.

A float entered by the Glenville Rotary Club received special mention although it was not eligible

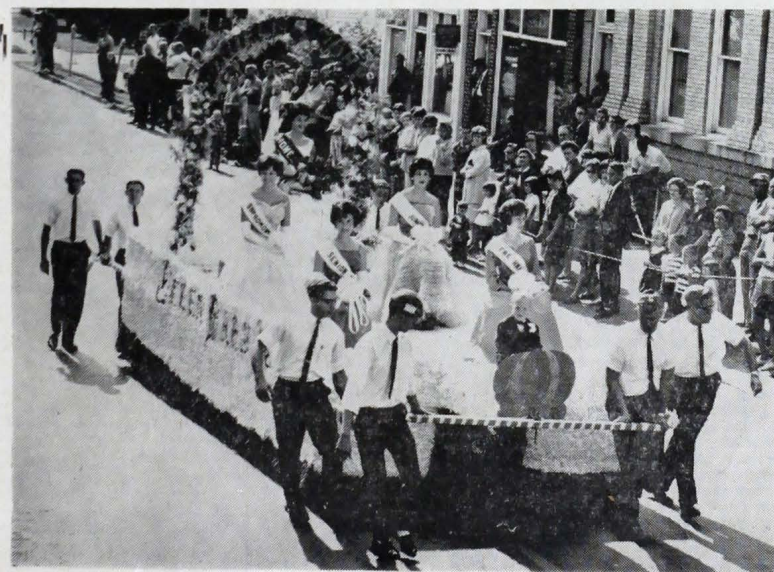
for an award. This float featured the West Virginia seal.

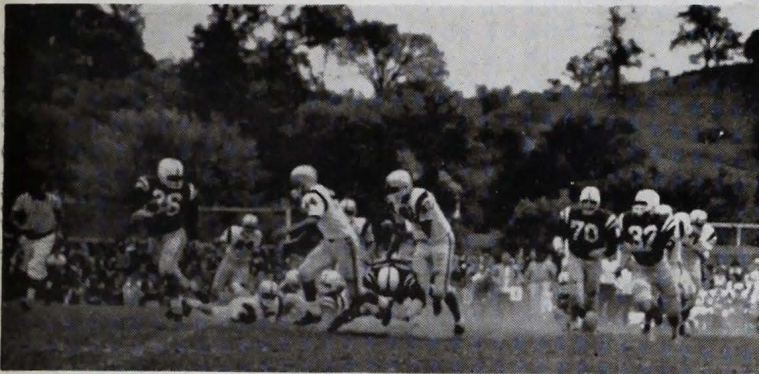

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Capacity Crowd Cheers Victory

Coach Jesse Lilly's Pioneers turned in another sparkling performance Saturday, Sept. 28, at Rohrbough Field. The Blue & White Wave romped to a 34-13 decision over Concord before a capacity Homecoming crowd.

Joe Duncan scored three touchdowns and the Pioneer defense led by Jim Kiser, Ernie Moore and Bill Casto sparked the victory.

Glenville jumped on the Mountain Lions for 14 points in the first quarter enroute to handing the defending WVIAC Conference champions their second consecutive defeat.

Defense Is Strong

The defense held the Lions to just 58 yards rushing, but the visitors completed six of 13 passes for 120 yards. After two games, the Pioneers defense has only allowed a total of 78 yards rushing and 167 through the air.

The Lillymen struck pay-dirt the first time they had their hands on the pigskin. They marched 55 yards with Duncan bulging over from the one for the score. John Lucas then booted the first of four conversions to make the score 7-0.

Lustig Scores

Moments later the Pioneers added another seven points when John Lustig, aided by a tremendous block from Mark Downey, scampered 21 yards around left end to (Continued on Page 4)

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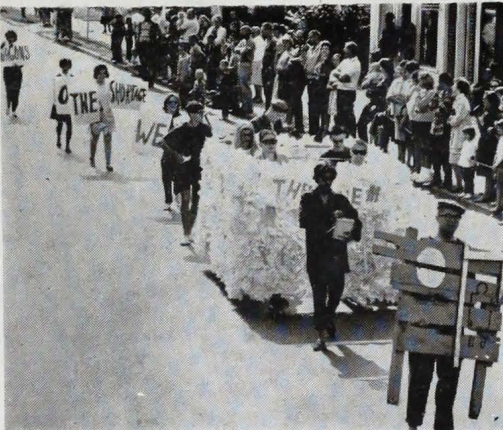
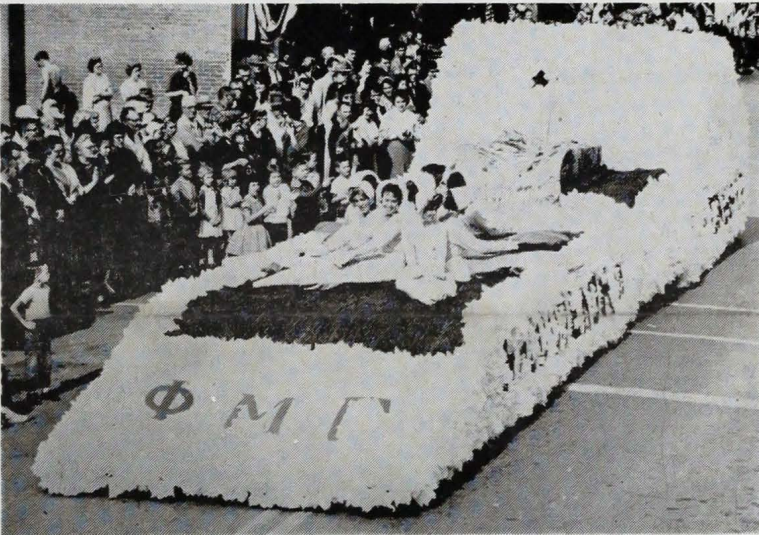

Money is always a major problem for college students. Of the many sources employed perhaps the most rewarding is the scholarship. Information released by Mr. Lloyd M. Jones, business manager, indicates that this year Glenville State College students will receive scholarships totaling \$37,505; Approximately 100 GSC students will use scholarships.

Thirty-three West Virginia Board of Education four-year scholarships amounting to \$25,680 have been granted Glenville students.

One-year grants include the Claude Worthington Benedum scholarships of \$200 each which have been awarded 31 students and 11 John C. Shaw scholarships of \$150. The Kanawha Union Bank granted four scholarships of \$50 each. Two scholarships, one for \$250 and one for \$200 are given to two students from the Woman's Benefit Association of Port Huron, Mich. Alpha Delta Epsilon, local business fraternity, awarded two students \$95 each.

Many other grants are received by individual students. In Glenville the following are given: Woman's Club, \$95; Civic Club, \$95; and Glenville High School Student Council, \$190. Buckhan-non-Upshur High School awards \$200, while Walton High gives \$100, and Nicholas County High \$75.

The education associations of Kanawha County and Peninsula Conference award \$250 and \$75 respectively. Others include a Waitman F. Zinin scholarship of \$75 and anonymous grants amounting to \$390.

In addition to the above there are undoubtedly several scholarships paid directly to the student and about which the college has no record.
