Next Mercury Is December 18

The next issue of the MERCURY, Dec. 18, will be the annual Christmas issue and will include the three winning poems written by Glenville State College students for this special issue.

At the time the MERCURY went to press, Dec. 6, nine poems had been submitted to the office. This year is the fifth year that the poetry contest has been sponsored by the staff. In this way an attempt is made to encourage campus poets and poetry writing.

A Wave of Grief

OUR MINDS did not readily accept the terrible truth that was thrust upon them recently. Anguish, unbelief, shock and sorrow swept across us Friday afternoon, Nov. 22, as the flash from Dallas became a wave of grief: "President John F. Kennedy is dead."

THE NATION mourns, still mourns and will continue to mourn for time to come.

THE ANGUISH AND THE AGONY of this experience must remind us that all who hold freedom dear must assume responsibility for knitting tighter the bonds of understanding, brotherhood and reason.

Student-Faculty Forum?

The lack of student-faculty understanding is considered by many students to be a serious problem. A recent meeting on campus has attempted to clarify both student and faculty positions.

This meeting dealt primarily with student ideals, existing problems, and solutions to these problems. While nothing concrete was established in the solution of the problems, the meeting provided a forum for students and faculty to air their views.

The actual purpose of the meeting was simply to develop a better understanding of the various positions taken on campus problems. Those attending the session did not consider it as a final answer to all problems.

Yet there is much to be said for such a meeting. Perhaps it is the key to a healthier student-faculty relationship. Certainly it is a means by which students, through their representatives, may have a voice in campus policies.

Immediately below is a ballot on which the student may indicate whether he feels that such meetings are a valuable innovation and whether he would attend such meetings if they were continued.

Highway Tragedies Claim Lives of Glenville People

During the Thanksgiving holiday period, one faculty member, Mrs. Dorothy Peterson, and two students, Larry Alan Peterson, and Joseph Wayne Minney, were killed in automobile accidents.

Mr. and Mrs. Carr Peterson and their son Larry were killed instantly Sunday evening, Dec. 1, on Route 33-119 four miles north of Glenville.

Daughter and sister Linda Lou was seriously injured in the same accident.

Mrs. Dorothy Peterson, assistant librarian here, was graduated from Glenville State College in 1959 and joined the GSC faculty that same fall as an instructor in business.

She later received an MA degree from West Virginia University and returned to Glenville State as an assistant in the library. The past summer she did graduate study at the University of Kentucky, and she planned to return there late in January to complete work on a masters degree in library science.

Mrs. Peterson was a member of the First Baptist Church of Glenville and Glenville Eastern Star Chapter No. 90.

Larry Alan Peterson was a GSC freshman. He was graduated from Glenville High School in 1962. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Glenville.

Mr. Carr Peterson was a widely-known radio and TV sales and service representative.

Joseph Wayne Minney, a 1963 graduate of Normantown High School, was a GSC freshman. He had attended both 1963 summer sessions. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rodney Minney of Shock; he was a member of the Rosedale Baptist Church.

Three others, Mr. and Mrs. Russell R. Richards and Henry R. Richards, were also killed in the accident that took the lives of the Petersons.

Classes were not in session, in observance of the funeral services for the Peterson family, from 12:45 until 2:30 p.m. Wednesday, Dec. 4. Services were held in the First Baptist Church by the Rev. Smith Dye.

Pioneers Cop Third In Weston Tourney

By virtue of a 93-75 defeat of Alderson-Broadus, after losing to Fairmont 83-68, the Glenville State Pioneers won third place in the Weston Invitational Basketball Tournament Nov. 26.

A strong Wesleyan team won the tournament for the second consecutive year. They overpowered Alderson-Broadus the first night and then squeaked by a fired-up Fairmont quintet the next evening.

In Glenville's game against the Falcons from Fairmont, both teams had trouble mustering an offensive attack in the first 20 minutes of play. At the end of the first half the score stood 34-26 in favor of Fairmont.

In this first half the Pioneers were playing a slow type of offense, working the ball around, waiting for the good shots, but they just could not find the range. Meanwhile, Fairmont was shooting a blistering 51% from the floor.

When the teams started the second half, it looked as though the G-men might pull the game out, as they outscored the Falcons 20 to 19 in the first 10 minutes of the second half. Then with the score at 69-59 in Fairmont's favor, with about 5 minutes remaining, the Falcons scored two quick field goals and then went on to convert nine foul shots to put the game out of reach. As the final gun sounded the Pioneers found themselves on the short end of an 83-68 score.

High point men for the Pioneers were Clyde Brewer and "Chuck" Eddy with 16 points each and Bob Maxwell with 15 points. Maxwell also pulled down 10 rebounds. Ferguson from Fairmont took the game honors with 17 points.

Glenville finished with a 43% from the floor and 58% from the foul line. The Pioneers also gathered in 34 stray rebounds.

G-Men Show Improvement

The next night, against the Bat-tlers from Alderson-Broadus, the Pioneers played a much improved game. They had five men scoring in double figures and also pulled down 57 rebounds against the taller A-B team.

Glenville started well scoring 22 points in the first 10 minutes and taking a 47-38 lead to the dressing room with them at half time.

MAA Completes Volleyball Play

The volleyball playoffs have been completed in MAA, and basketball is now in the spotlight. Winners in the volleyball tournament in order were The Saints, The Untouchables, The Aces and Theta Xi No. 1.

MAA Basketball began the past Thursday with four games being played.

William Kinzer, MAA director, has announced that 22 teams are participating in the roundball play; this is about 180 men.

An intramural swim meet has been set for February.

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Clark Dilley poured in 12 points during this half.

During the first part of the second half, Glenville and Alderson-Broadus just exchanged baskets and at the three quarter mark the Pioneers were out in front 64-56. Then the Pioneers caught fire and poured in 29 points, while the Bat-tlers could manage only 19 points. Mike Reed collected 12 markers in the second half.

Maxwell and Reed led the Glenville scorers with 17 points each followed by Dilley with 14, and Brewer and Eddy with 11 points each. Reed also hauled in 11 rebounds.

The Pioneers improved on their shooting with a 47% from the floor and 66% from the foul line.

Freshmen Perform

Maxwell and Eddy were chosen to the all-tournament team.

One particularly bright spot in the games was the play of the freshmen members of the team. Bob Minnieweather gathered in 15 rebounds during the two games and Carlton Spicer scored eight points and made good four out of five shots from the floor.

The Pioneers opened the regular season last weekend against W. Va. State Friday and Salem Saturday, the results of these games were not available at press time.

On Dec. 13 Glenville goes against Concord at home and on Dec. 17, W. Va. Tech is here. The G-men travel to Fairmont on Dec. 19, to battle the Falcons again.
