A Look at the Issues

Election eve is the time for voters to review the performance of Student Council officials elected in the last election and to consider whether the Student Government is a strong enough force on the GSC campus.

Candidates promise, among other promises, to perform their duties, to support better student-faculty relationships, to increase the hours a woman resident may spend outside the dormitory, and to work for the yearbook.

Often the statements made in the platforms are ambiguous. They are stated in such a way that there can be little doubt of their sincerity but the actual meaning is clouded.

In the last election, one candidate promised to advocate a positive attitude toward GSC. No one can find fault with this. It is a worthy sentiment.

The candidate also supported the expansion of the Student Union. Any student could honestly say that he was in favor of this. The actual expansion could and would continue with or without Council support.

Another plank in the candidate's platform was the creation of a Student Union Board. The Board has been established, but functions only in advisory capacity. It has no real power. It is difficult to understand whether it was actually a necessity.

One candidate was an ardent supporter of more liberal regulations for women. This is no original idea. It has been a part of many platforms.

Finally, the incorporation of a yearbook fee into the activity fee was an important part of the campaign. This has not yet been accomplished.

When reading the platforms of the candidates, it is easy to see that there are few basic differences in the platforms. Now is the time to take a good look at the issues and to become concerned regarding Student Government at GSC.

Elections have in the past resulted in ignoring the issues and in favoring the personalities. We can only hope this one may be different.

Briscoe pledges to carry out the duties of his office in the best possible manner, to promote better student-faculty relationships, to support the purchase of a yearbook, to promote better and more effective freshman rules, and to assist the student body in every way possible.

DALE FRANKLIN LEVERING from Grantsville is a junior with fields in Biological science and English.

He is a member of Theta Xi Fraternity and serves as a member of the Student Council through his position as president of the junior class.

Levering promises to promote better and more varied campus activities, to continue to work toward the publication of a yearbook, to see that all minutes of the Student Council are printed in the MERCURY and to establish more student-faculty conferences as well as to perform the duties of his office to the best of his ability.

The third candidate for president is ROBERT A. SMITH, a physical science and social studies student from Vienna. Smith is the sports editor for the MERCURY and is also one of the photographers. 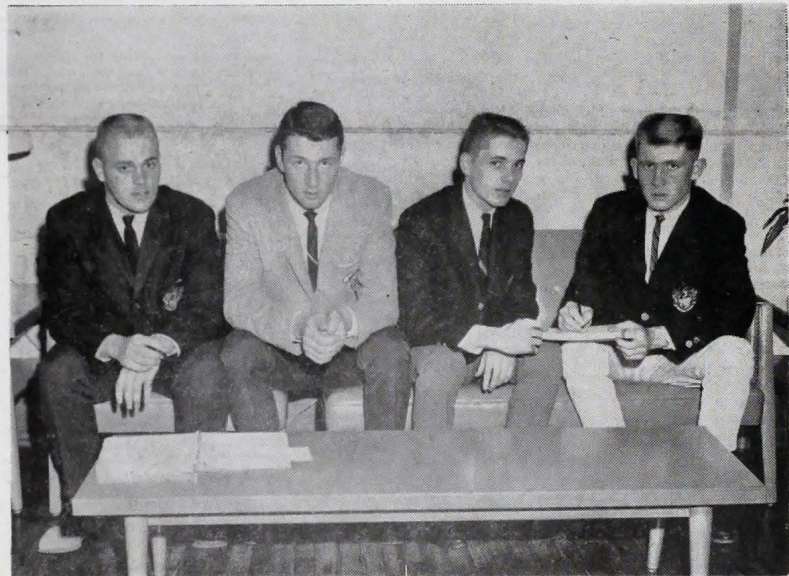

Tenn. Scientist Visits Campus On April 20

Mr. Henry W. Morgan of Oak Ridge National Laboratory, Oak Ridge, Tenn., will visit Glenville State College Monday, April 20, as a part of the Traveling Lecture Program. Mr. Morgan plans to be on campus the entire day Monday to meet with groups of students interested in optics or spectroscopy, or in general physics.

The lecture will be presented at 4 p.m. in the auditorium. Mr. Morgan's topic, "An Introduction to the Optical Laser, with Demonstrations," will consist of a 30-minute introduction to the theory and mechanism of the gas laser, followed by twenty to thirty-minute demonstrations. After the demonstrations, the audience will be invited to examine the laser in detail and repeat the experiments.

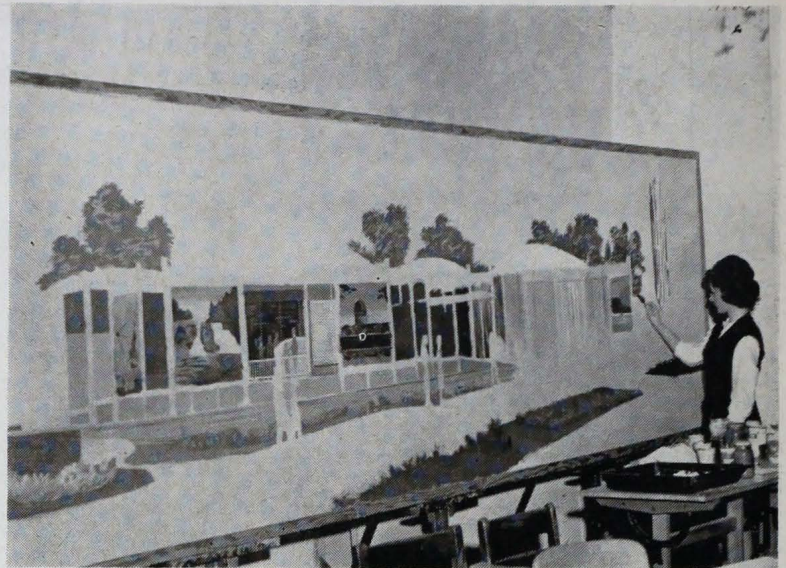
Some original writings and meditations of GSC students will also be included in the "Link."

SUMMER TRIPS TENTATIVELY SET

W. M. Gordon, instructor in biology, indicates that two courses in biology will be offered on a field experience basis during the first summer session. Students may enroll in both courses for a total of six semester hours of credit. A minimum enrollment of ten students is required for the courses to be offered.

Biology 400 will concentrate on the collection, preservations and identification of animals. Ecology will deal with the basic concepts important to the field. Prerequisites for this field trip are Biology 101, 102. Biology 305 and 352 are desirable.

One week at the beginning and the end of the term will be spent on campus. The remaining weeks will be spent in the field.

Costs will be comparable to those for "on campus" courses. Tuition and fees will be \$47. Meals will be cooked in the encampment and housing will be in tents.

Students will be required to provide their own sleeping, cooking, and camping gear as well as food and travel.

A workshop dealing with new methods and materials in teaching health, physical education and safety in the public schools will be offered this summer for three semester hours of credit.
