600 FRESHMEN ARRIVE FOR FRESHMAN WEEK Registrar Offers Enrollment Hints

Registration Day has long been regarded as the most hectic of all those confusing periods of tune in a student's first days at college. Although one may have enrolled before, at other institutions, he will find each registration unique. Therefore, Registrar Beryl Langford offers these suggestions and regulations to all students, freshmen and upperclassmen:

Freshmen will register tomorrow, Tuesday, September 12, ac-cording to the pink registration schedule which has been distributed.

Sophomores. juniors, transfer students and all others will register according to the white registration schedule.

All students must have their social security numbers in order admitted to registration. Social security numbers will be used here as the student's number. This number and one's zip code must be recorded in the space provided on the registration blank. Ballpoint pens must be used to fill out registration All classes which are to forms. be audited should be marked as such and approved by the Dean. Department and course numbers will be used when registering for classes, and hours of credit will be totaled for the semester. Lines should be drawn on schedule cards to separate first term. semester, and second term courses. Advisers' names must (Continued on Page Four)

Upperclassmen register on Wednesday, but freshmen will be tested from 10-12 and 1-2:30 p.m. At 2:30 p.m. and at 8 p.m., general freshmen orientation sessions will be held in the auditorium. Attendance is required.

Wesley Foundation party will be held in the new building from 3:30-5 p.m. All freshmen are invited to attend.

Thursday brings two orientation sessions, one from 9-11 a.m., a campus dress show; and a split session concerning campus organizations at ? p.m. for those in the A-L alphabetical bracket, and at 2:45 for M_Z.

The day's activities end with a square dance at 7 p.m. in the Ballroom.

Classes begin on Friday with a mix in the Ballroom that evening, sponsored by the Greek Council.

Saturday offers a home football game, the season's opener for the Pioneers.

President Wilhurn Addresses Parents

Enrollment at Glenville State College is expected to reach approximately 1,600 with the ar-rival of some 600 freshmen on campus today, according to Registrar Beryl Langford. This would set a record for the College, as last year's total enrollment for fall semester was 1,489, as compared with 1965's 1,313.

More than 400 parents were on campus to attend the Parents' Convocation Sunday as Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, College President, greeted the freshmen in the Ballroom of the Pioneer Center. Following the serving of refreshments, the following members of the administration were introduced: Dr. Delmer K. Somerville, Dean of the College: Dr. Alfred T. Billups, Jr., Dean of Student Affairs: Mrs. Jean Wright, Dean of Women; Mr. Kermit Kinder, Director of Guidance and Counsel-ing; Mr. Beryl Langford, Registrar and Director of Admissions; Mr. William J. Osborne, Business Manager; Mr. Robert K. Gainer, Alumni Director and Assistant Director of Admissions; Mrs. Yvonne King, Director of News Service and Publications; and Mr. Albert P. Carlson, Librarian.


Dr. Wilburn, in his address to the parents, termed education "difficult to identify or define." He said, further:

"Whatever that education is, it is somothing that each person must acquire for himself. It cannot be purchased, borrowed, or conferred. It cannot be imposed on a student. He cannot acquire it by some mysterious process resulting by merely living on a college campus for four years in contact with professors, classrooms, and books.

Glenville State College will offer to your sons and daughters the opportunity to achieve an education: but each student must. through individual effort, acquire that combination of knowledge and maturity of thought, wisdom, tolerance, curiosity, ambition, integrity, character, and attitude which distinguish the truly educated.'

In speaking of the next few weeks ahead President Wilburn remarked, "Experience h as taught us that the early months of college are a time of crisis for parents and students alike. Until now, most of you have been closely associated with the education of your sons and daugh-ters. You have provided much of their instruction in your homes. Most of you have encouraged them to receive religious training. You have known your children's teachers and the members of the school board; you have participated in PTA activities and school events; you have had the chief responsibility for discipline, supervision of study, and


