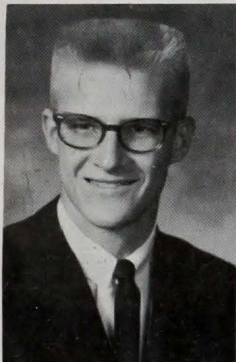

The new Robert F. Kidd Library, named for a former principal of the Glenville Normal School, will be dedicated on Oct. 13 at 1:30 p.m. Mr. Kidd was also a state senator. As such, he helped secure passage of the appropriation for the old library building.

The dedication ceremony will be held in the amphitheater if the weather permits; if not, it will be held in the auditorium. Speaker for the dedication will be the Honorable Jennings Randolph, Senior U. S. Senator from West Virginia. Senator Randolph is a member of the Senate Education Subcommittee and chairman of the Senate Public Works Committee.

Tours of the library will be given on the morning of the dedication, starting at 10:30 a.m. Students will be dismissed from classes at 1:20 p.m. in order to attend. The 12:20 p.m. class will be the last one on Friday.

## Hitchcock Movie Slated For Auditorium October 3

Alfred Hitchcock's "Marnie," a movie starring Tippi Hedren and Sean Connery, will be shown in the GSC auditorium on Tuesday, Oct. 3, sponsored by the Science Club.

Lasting slightly more than two hours, the film will be shown at 3:30 and again at 7:30 p.m. Admission will be 50 cents per person.

"Happiness is..." the theme for this year's homecoming, was selected by the Student Government Association on Sept. 19.

As in the past, there will be a parade in the morning. Mr. Wilbur Beall, an alumnus of the college, has been selected as Parade Marshal. Mr. Beall owns the Grill in Glenville. The freshmen will march in the parade attired in little girl skirts for the women and pajamas and ties for the men.

The Ned Guthrie Orchestra will play for the dance which will be held in the ballroom from 9-12. Tickets cost \$3.50 a couple and \$2.50 stag. They will be sold in advance, as well as at the door.

An alumni banquet will be held at 6:00 p.m. for the graduates of the college.

Since then the Student Government Association with the vote of the student body, has chosen to incorporate the cost of yearbook into the registration fees. The yearbook has certainly changed for the better and will become the same tradition that it should be on any campus.

But there is one thing that puzzles us. Why should any student be forced to purchase a yearbook and then be charged two dollars to have his picture included in it? This brings the total cost of the yearbook to \$7. We are of the opinion that when we pay five dollars in the registration fee for a yearbook, it is up

to the staff to see to it that all individual pictures are included. Why have a yearbook at all if only half of the student body is included?

There is an inconsistency when the tradition of a yearbook is encouraged and then the purpose is defeated by charging two dollars for a sitting fee. We firmly believe that the student body is entitled to some explanation and that plans should be made to correct the inconsistency.

## WVU Schedules Western Regional Campus Workshop

West Virginia University will hold its Western Regional Newspaper workshop at Glenville State College on November 4. The program will begin with registration which includes a \$1.00 fee to cover covebreak and lunch, followed by President D. Banks Wilburn, GSC, and Dean Quintus C. Wilson, WVU, who will give words of welcome.

Dr. Hunter Pell McCartney, Director of Public Relations Sequence at WVU, will speak on "Journalism Today." Professor W. R. Summers, Director of Advertising Sequence, WVU will then discuss "Advertising, to Build Your Newspaper."

Finally the assembly will be divided into three individual workshops. They are: (1) Reporting and editorials for advanced students, Dr. McCartney; (2) Reporting for beginners, Dean Wilson; and (3) Advertising, Professor Summers.

After lunch three different workshops will meet. They are (1) Makeup, Dean Wilson, (2) Features, Dr. McCartney and (3) Business problems, Professor Summers.

High schools from nine counties in the area have been invited to attend.

## Teacher's Examination Scheduled Here Oct. 7

Before any student can graduate from GSC with a degree in teacher education, he must take the National Teachers' Exam. Therefore, the test is scheduled to be given three times during this school year and once during the 1968 summer term.

Students expecting to complete the requirements for a degree in November or January will take the test on Oct. 7. Deadline for registration for that date was Sept. 1.

On Feb. 3, 1968, the exam will be given again for those who register by Jan. 8. This will be the last chance for students expecting to graduate in March 1968.

Any person who plans to complete graduation requirements in June 1968 must take the National Teachers' Exam on Apr. 6, 1968, at the latest. Registration dead-

line for that testing date will be Mar. 12.

During the summer 1968, the NTE will be given once more on July 6. Students who have not taken the test and expect to graduate in August of that year must register for that examination date by June 10, 1968.

Registration for any of the above testing dates should be made with Dr. Alfred T. Billips, Dean of Student Affairs. Cost to the student will be \$11.

When taking the NTE, elementary education majors take the common examination and the section on education in elementary schools. Secondary education majors also take the common exam, in addition to a teaching area exam in one of their major fields.

## Kermit L. Kinder Named Counselor

Guidance and counseling services are now available to GSC students free of charge because of the employment of a new Director of Guidance and Counseling, Kermit L. Kinder. His office adjoins the Office of Student Affairs.

Having received his bachelor degree from Morris Harvey College and his masters from East Carolina University, Mr. Kinder, a native of Madison, served as counselor at a high school in South Carolina and later at Scott High School in Madison before coming to GSC.

Mr. Kinder is available for counseling to students who have problems of vocational choice, as well as educational or personal problems. Appointments may be made with the secretary in the Office of Student Affairs.

In addition to the present service, a new testing room is being readied where personality and vocational interest inventories will be provided to assist Mr. Kinder in his counseling program.

## Flint Scores At Game End

John Flint intercepted a Phil Comer pass as the final gun sounded and streaked 65 yards to pay dirt giving the Pioneers a 20-13 win over West Liberty in their season's opener.

Flint, a senior from Glenville, picked off the pass on his own finesse and agility, turned what seemed a certain tie into an opening game victory for Coach Hanlin's blue and white.

Bill Frost got the game started on the "right foot" as he booted the ball deep into West Liberty territory. West Liberty, failing to gain a first down, lost the ball to Glenville, who promptly began marching downfield, with 5:23 remaining in the first quarter, Tom Haight took the ball off right tackle from one to put Glenville on the scoreboard. Bill Frost's kick made the score 7-0.

Glenville's defense, surprisingly tough throughout the entire game, put the Pioneers on the scoreboard again early in the second period. Freshman Dave Bonnette broke through and blocked a Kiger punt with 14:47 remaining in the half. Defensive left end Joe Painter scooped the ball up on the 17 yard line and ran the remaining yardage for Glenville's second of the day. A bad snap from center cost Glenville the extra point, leaving the score 13-0.

West Liberty hit pay dirt just five minutes later when Phil Comer circled right end and slipped into the end zone ten yards out with 9:11 remaining in the first half. Kiger kicked the PAT leaving West Liberty just six points behind at 13-7.

The third quarter and most of the fourth was scoreless, but with just 1:25 remaining in the final segment West Liberty fullback Tom Fato banged over from the one. The all important conversion attempt failed as Kiger's kick skimmed low and to the left.

Glenville took the ensuing kick off and promptly fumbled the ball away, apparently crushing all hopes of victory. Making the most of such a break, West Liberty quarterback Comer dropped to pass. His first attempt failing, and only time for one play remaining, he again retreated to the pocket, tossing a long one down field. As the last seconds ticked off the scoreboard and zipped 65 yards to victory. Frost's kick made the final score 20-13.

Glenville dominated the statistics gaining 174 yards to total offense while West Liberty gained 121 yards.

## Offensive Team Shows Promise

Coach Bill Hanlin and his Pioneers have proven early that they are a team with which to be reckoned. The team was very impressive in an opening game victory over West Liberty, showing much promise for the remainder of the season. Glenville fields a young team, consisting largely of sophomores and juniors, leaving a bright outlook for the future.

Glenville has shown they can move the ball offensively and there certainly isn't much doubt about the ability of their fine defensive unit.

Offensively the Glenville State College Pioneers look like this: Split End-Bill Frost, a 24-year old junior from Belpre, Ohio standing 6' and weighing 185 pounds. Frost is Vice President of the Student Council and a member of Theta Xi fraternity. He spent four years in the U. S. Air Force before entering GSC. Bill is majoring in physical education and minoring in social studies.

Tight End-Mike Deem, a 19-year old sophomore from Williamstown, W. Va., stands six feet and weighs 200 pounds. Mike is majoring in physical education.

Left Tackle-Frank Hughes, a 21 year old senior from Harmony, West Virginia, is 5' 10" and weighs 190 pounds. Frank is a member of Chi Beta Phi, science fraternity and is majoring in math and physical science. Or Micky Latstetter, a 19-year-old sophomore from Williamstown, stands 5' 9" and tips the scales at 200 pounds and is devoting his study hours to the field of mathematics.

Right Tackle-Sterling Beane, a 20-year-old junior from Gassaway, W. Va., stands 6' 1" and weighs 220 pounds. Sterling is a member of TKE Fraternity and is majoring in physical education and political science.

Left Guard-Larry Ackison, a twenty-four year old junior from Mann, West Virginia, five feet eight inches and weighing one-hundred and ninety pounds. He is a physical education and social studies major.

Right Guard-Bill Piercy, a senior, is tri-captain of this year's squad. Bill who is twenty years

old stands five feet ten inches tall and weighs two-hundred pounds. He hails from Weston and is a member of Theta Xi fraternity. He is majoring in physical education and business.

Center-Tom Harold, a six feet one inch tall, twenty-one year old, two-hundred twenty pound senior hails from Winfield. Tom, a physical education and social studies major, is also a member of Theta Xi fraternity.

Quarterback-Marcus McPhail is six feet one inch tall and weighs one-hundred seventy five pounds. He is a nineteen year old sophomore from Ripley. Mark, majoring in business and physical education, is a member of the TKE fraternity.

Left Halfback-Tom Haight, a nineteen year old sophomore from NewMartinsville, stands five feet seven inches tall and weighs one hundred seventy pounds. Tom is a member of TKE fraternity and his fields of endeavor are physical education and art.

Right Halfback-Stan Boyles, a twenty-one year old senior from Buckhannon, stands five feet nine inches tall and weighs one-hundred seventy-five pounds. He is majoring in physical education and social studies. Mick Hartley, a twenty-one year old junior from Belpre, stands five feet nine inches tall and weighs one-hundred and eighty pounds. Mick is a member of Theta Xi fraternity and is majoring in physical education and art.

Rich Cain, a nineteen year old freshman from Wirt County, stands five feet eight inches tall and weighs one-hundred sixty pounds. Rich is majoring in physical education.

Fullback-Sterling Seals, a twenty, year old junior from Charleston, stands six feet two inches tall and weighs two hundred and twenty pounds. Steve, a member of TKE, is a physical education and social studies major.

## Haight Scores Three TD's Giving Pioneers 19-7 Victory

Tom Haight scored two last quarter touchdowns to break a 7-7 deadlock with W. Va. State, Saturday, and give Glenville its second victory of the season in as many starts.

Haight, a 5'7" and 170-pound sophomore was the main gun in Glenville's 19-7 victory over W. Va. State at Institute. The tricky speedster gained 108 yards rushing and 144 yards at the receiving end of six McPhail passes, while accounting for all three of Glenville's touchdowns.

Glenville hit pay dirt first on the third play of the second quarter when Tom Haight hit off left tackle and cut back to his right, going 25 yards for the touchdown, capping a 62-yard drive in eight plays. Bill Frost kicked the extra point, giving Glenville a 7-0 bulge.

Early in the second half, State's aggressive defensive team capitalized on a Glenville miscue when Jim Sims picked up a Glenville fumble on the nine yard line and ran unmolested into the endzone to knot the score 7-7.

Two minutes into the fourth quarter, Tom Haight hit off tackle for two yards and a Glenville TD to cap a 72-yard drive in nine plays. A 24-yard aerial from McPhail to Haight and two runs of seven yards each by Stan Boyles were the big plays in this scoring drive.

State took the ensuing kick-off and three plays later fumbled to give Glenville possession at their own 47 yard-line. Runs of four and five yards by Boyles and a 36-yard pass from McPhail to Haight put the ball on the 10-yard

line. After a minimal gain on the next play, Boyles circled left end to the two-yard line, from where, on the next play, Haight hit off tackle for the score.

Frost's try for the point after was partially blocked, leaving the final score 19-7.

Besides Haight's outstanding performance in gaining a total of 252 yards, sophomore quarterback, Marcus McPhail displayed some talent of his own, completing nine of 15 passes for a total of 157 yards. Senior halfback Stan Boyles exhibited some fine running the last half of the game, carrying six times for a total of 35 yards.

Defense again, as last week, played a large part in the victory holding State's total offense to a mere 100 yards, 69 rushing and 31 passing. Outstanding for Glenville's defensive unit were John Flint, Jim Sprague, Dave Bonnette, and Dale Sheets, along with middle guard, Jim Frasier.

Glenville suffered a loss when junior guard Larry Ackison dislocated his elbow, while covering on a punt midway through the third quarter.

## Eight Majorettes Lend Eye Appeal to GSC Band

Addition of two new majorettes to those recently selected by Mr. Ronald Ross, GSC band director, lifted the total of Glenville State College baton twirlers to eight. Anne Wilkes and Linda Felton were chosen Friday to complete the line of majorettes.

Miss Wilkes, a blonde junior from Weston, graduated from Weston High School with the class of 1965. Upon graduation, she attended Fairmont State College for a year before transferring to Glenville, where she is majoring in library science.

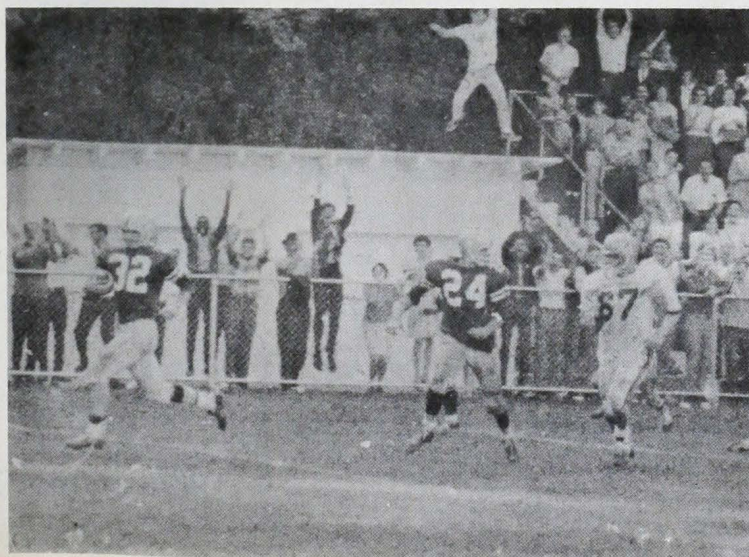
Linda Felton graduated from South Harrison and enrolled at GSC for the first time this fall. Miss Felton, a redhead, will devote her study time to a field in physical education.

## Enrollment Increases 6%; Shows Slated Partial Figures Show 1583

The approximate overall enrollment for the 1967-68 academic year has increased by six per-

cent over that of 1966, according to information from the Office of the Registrar. The total at press time for this year is 1583, compared to 1489 in the fall of 1966.

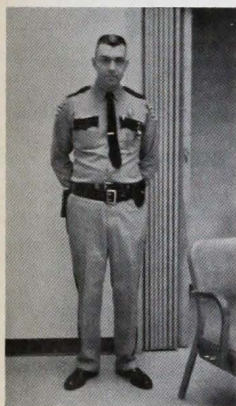
There are 1443 full-time students, compared to 1408 of last year; 77 part-time compared to 62; 62 extension students in comparison with the previous 19; and one special student. Freshmen enrolled 554 while 597 enrolled in 1966. Sophomores number 384; 1966 sophomores, 370. Juniors are 271 in number and last year's were 185; while the seniors number 233 to the previous 185. One post-graduate is enrolled.

Many of the part-time students are seniors doing their student teaching, which if included in the senior class enrollment would increase it.

Additional complete enrollment figures will be announced at a later date.
