# Renovation Named For Former Teacher

The former Robert F. Kidd
Library which will be reopened in September, 1968, will
be renamed. It will be called
"Clark Hall" in honor of Mr.
H. Y. Clark, retired member of
the faculty of Glenville State
College.
Active

The Division of Education and Psychology offices of of which Mr. Clark was a member, the journalism department, Mercury headquarters and other faculty offices will be housed in the renovated, building.

Mr. Clark was graduated from West Virginia Wesleyan College with a B.A. degree in 1917. He was graduated from Columbia University with an M.A. in 1925, and completed additional graduate study at the George Peabody College for Teachers in 1926 - 27 and 1930. Prior to accepting a position at Glenville State College, Mr. Clark held the following positions in other school systems: Principal of Wallace High School, 1917 - 18, Principal of Smithfield Schools, 1919 - 20, teacher at Fairmont High School, 1920 - 22 and Principal of Grafton High School, 1922 - 26.

Mr. Clark came to Glenville State College in the fall of 1927 as a professor of elementary education. He continued as a member of the college faculty until his retirement in 1955, and during his stay here, he served in several capacities. In addition to being a member of the faculty in the education department, he supervised student teachers and taught English, social studies and West Virginia history during the years of World War II. He

# As I See 'Em ...

It's been a long time since the Pioneers have won the WVIAC Tournament. There once was a time, in the 30's, when nobody but Glenville was supposed to win it. Now it's just the opposite. In 1951, Bob "Hooks" Hardman, one of the all-time GSC greats, combined with "Tex" Gainer to lead the underdog Pioneers to their last WVIAC Tournament victory. Hardman and Gainer were the one-two scoring leaders of the tournament and also solid choice for all-

Since then the closest Glenville has gone was to the finals in 1956 tournament. An almost unbelievable fact is that GSC has not won a WVIAC Tournament game since 1961, losing every first round game. It would be a welcome change to see the capable Pioneers

reverse this situation when they travel to Charleston next week.

The Pioneers are going to have to show something that they have shown only on occasion this year. There have been times when they seemed unbeatable, but we have not seen enough of these wimes. If someone could find that magic formula that does this to GSC on occasion, we may be quite pleased with the way in which we are represented in Charleston. That one thing that could make them all play the type of ball each member is capable of playing on a given night could even produce one of the biggest dark horse showings in the history of the tourney. It seems that only Fairmont, State, Morris Harvey and West Liberty are being considered asprobable winners, and based on regular season play, rightfully so. But this tournament begins a new season, and every team is starting anew, so we can hope that Coach Lilly can put that desire to win in their souls and bring us back a winner; we've waited long enough

### Grant Approved For Education

Glenville State College is the recipient of a \$14,000 grant awarded by the United States Office of Education, for the development of a program in the education of teachers of the mentally retarded. This gram will begin in the fall 1968-69 school term, according to Dr. D. Banks Wil-burn, president of Glenville

burn, president of Glenville State College. Application and descriptive materials concerning this 12month grant were prepared by Dr. B. E. Ross, chairman of the department of education and psychology, assisted by Miss Pauline Harvey, assistant pro-fessor of education. Miss Harvey will have the major responsi-bility of developing the cur-
