John D. Rockefeller Speaks Here Today

John D. Rockefeller IV will speak to the student body on May 1. Sponsored by the Cosmopolitan, Rockefeller is a resident of Charleston.

Born in New York City on June 18, 1937, he attended Philip Exeter Academy and Harvard University. He attended International Christian University in Tokyo, Japan, from 1957 through 1960. There he taught English and, through intensive language programs, developed fluency in the Japanese language.

Returning to Harvard in 1961, Mr. Rockefeller took his A.B. degree in Chinese and Far Eastern Affairs and Languages. Mr. Rockefeller was appointed by President Kennedy to serve on the National Advisory Council of the Peace Corps in 1961. Joining the Peace Corps as Special Assistant to the Director, he later became Operations Officer in charge of the Peace Corps' Philippines program in Education and Community Development.

He then served in the State Department's Bureau of Far Eastern Affairs for a year, as Desk Officer for Indonesian Affairs, and as Staff Assistant to the Secretary for Far Eastern Affairs.

In July of 1964, Mr. Rockefeller was appointed by At-

torney General Robert F. Kennedy as a Consultant to the President's Commission of Juvenile Delinquency and Youth Crime. In October of the same year, Mr. Rockefeller came to West Virginia to spend full time with Action for Appalachian Youth, a West Virginia anti-poverty program. For two years he worked in a rural, isolated, former coal mining community, trying to guide the people to help themselves solve their problems.

Mr. Rockefeller is a Trustee of the Philip Exeter Academy, a member of the Visiting Committee on Asian Affairs at Harvard University, a Trustee of the University of Chicago, a member of the Charleston Symphony Board and Board Chairman of the Charleston Rockets.

Mr. Rockefeller has written for the New York Times Sunday Magazine and for Life Magazine. He has traveled extensively in Asia and Europe. On April 1, 1967, he married the former Sharon Percy of Chicago, and they now reside in Charleston.

In early 1966, Mr. Rockefeller entered politics as a Democrat. In May he was nominated as a candidate for the House of Delegates and in November he was elected.

Student Views Match Adults

A new survey of American college student opinion on major issues shows them to be far less in rebellion and much closer to adult views than is commonly believed. The poll was conducted by Newsweek magazine and represents a cross-section of 8,700 students from 150 colleges.

Among its highlights: On Vietnam only 17 per cent advocate a unilateral halt in bombing and withdrawal of U. S. forces, while 34 per cent would escalate the war effort to seek a military victory.

On the one person they respect most, a parent or relative is cited by 19 per cent. Far down the line are celebrity choices such as the late John F. Kennedy with 3.4 per cent. Two per cent of the students cited "myself",

more than was accorded any other individual other than President Kennedy.

On politics, no Presidential hopeful received a significant plurality. Highest is New York Sen. Robert F. Kennedy with 15 per cent backing for the Presidency. President Johnson and Richard Nixon each received 11 per cent, Nelson Rockefeller 10, George Romney 9, and Ronald Reagan 8.

The Newsweek poll was conducted by reply-card questionnaire last fall as a part of the magazine's College News Letter. The 8,700 respondents voted by January 1.

In addition to the 34 per cent who would escalate in Vietnam and the 17 per cent who would withdraw unconditionally, another

8 per cent would call a cease fire and seek negotiation. (But 6 of this 8 per cent would then escalate if the call for negotiations were refused.) Six per cent would continue present policy, five would appeal to the United Nations or other outside groups, five would recognize the Viet Cong, and two would simply negotiate now. The remaining 17 per cent had no opinion or suggested individual plans too diverse to tally.

On the draft, the Newsweek survey showed that 44 per cent of the students disapprove of someone who rejects his military obligation, while 37 per cent accept his position if he is "sincere". Sixteen per cent refused to pass judgement saying it is a personal decision, and the

President Announces New Employees

New positions, resignations and promotions in rank have been announced by Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, president of the college. New employees for next year are:

Mrs. Genevieve McDaniel has been hired as an assistant professor of English. Mrs. McDaniel received her Bachelor of Arts and Master of Arts Degrees from Marshall University. She has nine years of teaching experience in secondary schools in Cabell County.

An instructor of English, Harry Curtis, Jr., has also been hired. He has a Bachelor of Arts Degree from West Virginia Wesleyan and a Master of Arts from

Marshall. For the past two years, Curtis has been a Graduate Assistant in the department of English at Marshall University.

Hired as the director of the audio visual aids and learning center of the Robert F. Kidd Library, is Donald Phillips. Phillips was hired to develop the learning center and coordinate all audio visual aids and learning materials.

Robert A. Smith has been hired as an instructor of physical science. Smith obtained a B.A. degree from GSC and will complete his M.A. degree at the University of Tennessee this coming August. He taught in

secondary schools in Winchester, Va., and in Wood County, W. Va.

An assistant professor of forestry was hired and will begin work on Aug. 1, 1968. This is William Cones. He received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from West Virginia University in 1961, and his Master of Arts Degree in forestry from Duke University in 1962. In August of 1968 Cones expects to receive a Doctor of Philosophy Degree from WVU. He has had teaching experience in the school of forestry at WVU and at Egerton College in Kenya.

Robert Lee Summers has been hired as an instructor in physi-

cal education and as an assistant football coach. He obtained his B.A. degree from GSC in 1962, and his M.S. degree in 1965, from WVU. Summers has also completed additional graduate study at Ohio University. For the past six years he has been teaching in Parkersburg.

Also hired, is another security officer. This is to be Thomas L. Reaser. For the seven years, Reaser has been employed in security work. Presently he is employed by the West Virginia Department of Natural Resources.

Mrs. Mary L. Morrow, who has been working as the Col-

lege nurse temporarily, has been appointed as the regular nurse.

Tenure has been granted to Bernard C. McKown, assistant professor of science, who has been at GSC for five years. This was granted by the West Virginia Board of Education and means that he will be permanently employed at GSC.

Dr. John Chisler, assistant professor of biology, has been promoted to an associate professor. Chisler has been teaching in schools of higher learning for six years. Three of

GSC Graduate To Address Nation in Memorial Services

Harold L. Scott, a 1941 graduate of Glenville State College, will give a memorial address at the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in Arlington, Va., on May 5. The address, which is sponsored by the I.O.O.F., is to be recorded in the Congressional Record.

Scott is the only West Virginian who has ever made the address, which is to be given in the Amphitheatre in Arlington, I.O.O.F., an organization of which Scott is Sovereign Grand Master, is the only fraternity which has the privilege of conducting memorial services there.

In June, Scott will be the Honorary Marshall of the West Virginia Strawberry Festival to be held in Buckhannon.

Mr. Scott is a 1937 graduate of Troy High School and a 1949 graduate of West Virginia University, where he received a M.A. degree.

During his time at Glenville State College, he was a member of the football team, was co-captain of the basketball team, president of the G-Club, junior class president and a member of the Holy Roller Court of the Student Council.

Scott is presently taking a leave-of-absence from Normantown High School, where he teaches social studies and physical education.

Scott is a member of the Rock Grove Baptist Church of Lfnn. He is an ordained deacon of the church and also teaches a Sunday School class there.

He has served as District Deputy, as President of the Northern West Virginia Past Grands Association, and in 1960-61 was Grand Patriarch of his Jurisdiction. He received the Decoration of Chivalry in 1962 and the Grand Decoration in 1965. He has also received a S.G.L. pin for securing 25 new members in one year; and in 1966 received the Meritorious Award, the first in West Virginia.

At the international level of I.O.O.F., Mr. Scott served as Grand Representative at the 1961, 1962, and 1965 S.G.L. sessions, it being at the 1965 session that he was elected Sovereign Grand Warden. He is also a Past Sovereign Grand Marshall. He holds the rank of Lt. Col. in the Patriarchs Militant as an Aide to the General Commanding. He served

two summers in New York as an Assistant Director of the United Nations Pilgrimage. Last Aug. 7, he became a Senior Brother by initiation into Kanawha J.L. No. 5 of Burnsville, at the same time his son, Howard Ralph Scott.

His wife is the former Beulah Ellen Farnsworth. A graduate Glenville State College with an A.B. degree, she has done graduate work at George Peabody College, Nashville, Tenn. She is also a school teacher. The Scott's have five children, Howard Ralph, Martha Elizabeth, Mary Ellen, David Linn and Dorcas Maria.

Following the close of the Sovereign Grand Lodge sessions in Calgary, Sovereign Grand Master Scott and his wife left for Europe where, on Sept. 30, he was present for the initiation of a group of Austrians, and the next day assisted in instituting the first Austrian lodge since before World War II. Following this, they visited all of the other European Grand Jurisdictions.

Scott entered World War II in 1941 as a private and was discharged four and one half years later as a captain.

Mr. Scott has visited in South America and Europe. In South America, he visited such places as Lima, Peru, Chile and Uruguay. His European travels have included countries like Switzerland, Germany, Norway, Sweden, Finland, Holland, France and Italy. He has also visited in Hawaii and Canada.

Scott is the first West Virginian to be named to this position in the 184 year history of the lodge.

Glenville handed league-leading Salem its first defeat of the season 7-6 here last Thursday, April 25.

Glenville started the game with a five run outburst in the first inning. Salem pitcher Amidid walked the first two batters to face him, Haught and Harbaugh, before giving Dick Werry an intentional pass, loading the bases. Potts then hit a double, scoring Haught and Harbaugh. Bill Burbank and Bill Frost struck out before Jerry Ramsburg drove in another run with a single. Dave Bodkin walked and Lacy's single scored two more runs before Haught grounded out to end the inning.

Glenville scored again in the third inning as Harbaugh singled and Werry walked. Potts grounded out, moving the runners to second and third before pitcher Bill Burbank banded a single, scoring both the runners and giving GSC a 7-0 lead.

Salem tried desperately to come back in the fifth, when lead off batter Cecearelli tripled and came home on a bulk by Burbank. Cole singled and

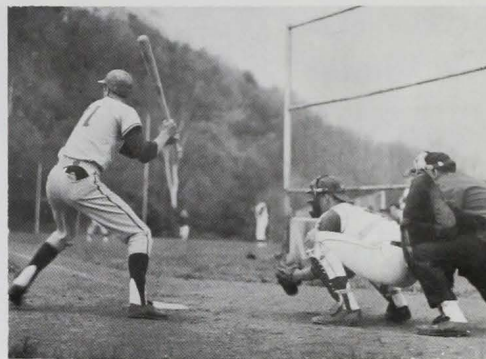
Animals Lead Greek Bowling Followed By 4 TKE Teams

The Glenville State College baseball team seems to have come alive. After winning only two of their first five, they have won two of their last three, including previously unbeaten Salem.

Important in this mid-season spurt has been the hitting of right fielder Jim Potts. Potts got two hits in five at bats against Morris Harvey, one a clutch single scoring an important run in the first game of the double header. Potts also hit a bases loaded double in the first inning of the Salem game starting a five run outburst.

Another factor in the Pioneers late success has been the five clutch plays of the freshmen members of the squad. Pee Wee Lacy went 3-3 and scored two runs besides getting a running scoring single in the second game. Besides getting hits, Lacy has proven his ability to obtain walks and, as we all know, is almost as good as a hit! Every time Lacy comes to bat there is an excellent chance he will get on base.

Tom Turner and Bob Hays also got clutch scoring hits, exhibiting the pressure play of these two fine young Glenville athletes. Hays, a reserve catcher, has also shown a fine arm in nailing three of the four men who have thus far tried to steal on him. Regular catcher Dick Werry displayed power in smacking, what turned out to be, the winning home run with a man aboard in the Morris Harvey game.

Although Glenville has been out hit in two of its last three games (out hitting only Morris Harvey in losing the second game of twin bill and being out hit in both wins) Glenville managed the hits when they were most needed.

In the last release from the commissioner's office, Tommy Haught is the second leading hitter in the conference with a sparkling .545 average. Although Haught has been in a slump lately (0-5 at Concord and 1-6 against Morris Harvey) he is a fine fielder and an outstanding hitter. Haught can straighten out his hitting slump and the rest of the team can continue at the current rate, Glenville should have an outstanding last half of the second season.

Shirley Starcher and Jack Albert attended the West Virginia State Commission on Youth meeting April 16. They were nominated for this honor by Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, president of the College, and appointed by Governor Smith. The commission, composed of young people from sixteen to twenty-six, met in Charleston to discuss state problems in the following areas: education, transportation and communication, social problems, economic and industrial growth, natural resources and agriculture. The youths met with experts in those fields and the results of their discussions were incorporated into a preliminary report to be delivered to the Governor Nov. 15.

Governor Smith will review this report and return it with his recommendations for revision to the "Steering Committee," a special committee of youth elected by and from the main assembly. Jack Albert, chairman of the committee on transportation and communication, and Shirley Starcher, vice-chairman of the education committee, report that a final draft of the conclusions of the West Virginia youth will be ready by Jan. 1, 1969, for Governor Smith to hand to his successor.

remaining 3 per cent passed over the question.

Only 5 per cent of the respondents say they favor a lottery approach to the draft, while a surprising 17 per cent support Universal Military Training.

Thirty-seven per cent prefer a volunteer army and 32 per cent favor the present draft setup as is. Seven per cent offered their various individual alternatives. Two per cent skipped the question.

The poll of Presidential choices drew votes for eleven different candidates. Besides the six leaders cited above John Lindsay, Barry Goldwater, and Charles Percy each received 3 per cent. William Fulbright got 2 per cent and George Wallace 1 per cent.

Votes for the "person in the world you most respect," were widely scattered after the 19 per cent choice of a parent or relative. John F. Kennedy was second with 34 per cent, Pope Paul with 1.7 per cent, Martin Luther King and Barry Goldwater, each with 1.4 per cent, and "a teacher" with 1.5 per cent.
