Selective Service Deferment Changes

Effective July 1, 1967 Selec-Service regulations quire that students make normal progress toward obtaining the Baccalaureate Degree to quali-fy for draft deferrment. This regulation has been interpreted to mean that students must earn credits sufficient to qualify them for promotion to the next highest classification (first year 27 hours, second year 57 hours, third year 89 hours, fourth year graduation) at the close of the school year, including summer school.

Students who have reached the age of 24 are not governed by this regulation, but should consult their respective selective service boards if they have questions.

Based upon this interpretation the regulation, the academic status of all male students of draft age will be reported to their respective draft boards at the beginning of the fall semes-

ter, September, 1968.

Mr. David Gillespie, head librarian, has termed Glenville's first annual Amnesty Day a success. Amnesty Day was held last Friday, May 31, and it was a time when all students were permitted to return overdue, stolen or misplaced library ma-terials with no questions asked. John Hendricks returned a

book that he had checked out of the library in 1917 when he was 11 years old. The book, en-titled Little Brother to the Bear and other Animals Studies would have brought a fine of \$1.862.50 at 10¢ each day it was overdue if he had paid his fine

on June 3, 1968.

There were an estimated 650 books out of which all except books out of which all except for approximately 150 were re-turned. There were about 200 magazines and 3 reference books returned. Students saved be-tween an estimated 120 and 150 dollars.

Next year there will be pick up boxes placed in the dormitories for students to return books easier and the library will donate Duplicate Reference Books to the Greek Organizations for their houses.







The trip is an escorted tour of England, Scotland, and Ire-land, plus a visit to Paris, France, Conducted by Jack R. Brown and Mrs. Jack R. Brown, the tour will include a visit of several days to Stratford-on-Avon; where performances of plays will be seen at the Royal Shakespeare Theatre.

Two three-hour courses will be offered for Marshall University undergraduate or graduate credit to those taking the tour. Taught by Dr. Brown, courses will include readings group discussions, lectures
