Four Deans Aid Freshmen In GSC Orientation Week

Deans Alfred Billips, Stanley Hayward, Jean Wright and Delmer Somerville have various duties, but all four have one common duty.

Their common duty is to help the students of Glenville State College. They are here to help the students adjust to college life and life at GSC. They hope to make possible student involvement in activities.

They are in charge of student housing, food and health. Mrs. Jean Wright as dean of women, is in charge of housing women, and Mr. Stanley Hayward, dean of men, houses men. Dr. Alfred T. Billips, Jr., dean of student affairs, serves on the Foods Committee and Student Life and Welfare Committee. They have other such duties, but they are also here to serve all students in a helping relationship.

Dr. Billips has a B.S. degree from the University of Tenn., a B.D. degree from Emory University, M. Ed. and E. D. degrees from University of Georgia. He was a teaching assistant at the University of Georgia for two years.

Mrs. Wright received an A.B. degree from Marshall in 1944 and an M.A. in 1954, also from Marshall. She was previously employed at McDowell County Schools for eleven years, Tucson Public Schools for less than one year, and Mercer County Schools for four years.

Mr. Hayward was graduated from Middlebury College with an A.B. degree and from Colum-

bia University with a M.A. degree. He was previously employed at: Indiana University, Bloomington, Ind.; University of South Florida, Tampa, Fla.; Williston Academy, Fosthampton, Mass.; and Pt. Pleasant Borough School, Pt. Pleasant, N.J.

Dr. Delmer K. Somerville, Dean of the College, is concerned with the academic development of the freshmen. His office deals with grade records, schedules and student loads.

Dr. Somerville, professor of education, has been with Glenville State since 1952. He holds an M.A. degree from West Virginia University; and an Ed. D. from Cornell University.

All students should refer to the handbook concerning the due process for students which has been added this fall, the deans agreed.

All students, after having identification pictures taken, will proceed to the next door, Room 104, to have their annual portraits made. There will be no sitting fee but it will be necessary for students to display a specially-marked Delmar card in order to be admitted to the ballroom for registration. This will insure that all students will have pictures appearing in the '69 *Kanawha* chen.

Orientation Activities Planned

This afternoon at 1:30 p.m., a new chapter in the lives of some 500 students will begin in Pioneer Center Ballroom as new freshmen and their parents meet with the college administration.

The Parents' Convocation will introduce the president of the college, other administrative officials and parents and provide an orientation, complete with question and answer period.

Separate sessions will be held tonight at 8 p.m., with the men meeting in the gymnasium and the freshmen women in the auditorium.

A general assembly in the auditorium will begin tomorrow's busy day at an early 8 a.m. Faculty advisers will be assigned, college catalogs will be distributed and Dean Delmer K. Somerville will discuss the academic programs.

French placement tests will be administered to all interested students at 1 a.m. Other students will meet with advisers until a general assembly at 2 p.m.

The President's Meeting at 4 p.m. will be the scene of an address by Dr. D. Banks Wilburn and all local ministers.

A social reception for all freshmen will be given by the president from 7-9 p.m. in the Ballroom. At this time all freshmen will be given an opportunity to meet and talk with the faculty and administration.

Tuesday's activities include identification and yearbook photographs from 7:30 - 4 p.m. in the new WF building and the registration for classes. Social activities include a Wesley Foundation party at 4 p.m. in the new WF building and the capping ceremony at 7 p.m. in amphitheater at which time all new students will officially become freshmen of Glenville State College by the order of Garry Ramsey, SGA president. A mix at 8 p.m. sponsored by the SGA will conclude the day's activities.

Wednesday will be taken up with freshman testing in the gymnasium. Two sessions of Freshman Orientation will be held in the auditorium Wednesday from 7 - 9 p.m. These will include discussion of stumbling blocks and study habits for freshmen.

Third general orientation ses-

sion will be held at 9 a.m. on Thursday for freshmen in the auditorium. Alphabetical groups, A - L will meet in the gymnasium from 2 - 2:45 p.m. and the M - Z group will meet from 2:45 - 3:30 p.m. to be oriented as to organizations on campus.

A mix in the ballroom, sponsored by the Greek Council will terminate the day's activities from 7:30 - 10:30 p.m.

Classes begin for all students on Friday, Sept. 13 (Superstitious, Students?) and a square dance will be held in the Ballroom from 7:30 - 10:30 p.m.

Saturday and Sunday will allow new students a moment to breathe after the week's busy days and will provide the opportunity for attending the church of one's choice, whether in Glenville or elsewhere.

Oct. 18 Ritual Opens C. Hall

Clark Hall will be formally opened on Friday, October 18 at 3:30 p.m. The opening ceremony which will be held on the terrace of Clark Hall will feature the Honorable Governor Hulett C. Smith as guest speaker.

Guest of honor will be Mr. H. Y. Clark, for whom the building is named. Mr. Clark is a former member of the faculty at Glenville State College, having served as professor of education until 1955. He is now retired and living in Vienna, Wood County, W. Va.

The 1968 GSC football coaches
are Bill Hanlin, Earl Adolfson
and Robert Summers.

Head coach Bill Hanlin was
graduated from GSC in 1953 with
an A.B. degree and from the
University of Maryland in 1957
with an M.A. degree.

He previously worked at Tyler
County High School in Middle-
bourne, W. Va., from 1953-'55;
Ashland High School, Ashland,
Ohio, from 1955-'56; and St.
Marys, W. Va., from 1957-'66.

Coach Hanlin is a member of
the American Football Coaches
Association and the West Vir-
ginia Coaches Association. His
hobby is duck hunting.

A graduate of West Virginia
Institute of Technology and of
WVU, Earl C. Adolfson, Jr. is
the associate football coach this
season.

He received a Bachelor's Degree
in 1954 from W. Va. Institute of
Technology and a Master's de-

gree from WVU in 1963. He was
previously employed at Wirt
County High School, Elizabeth,
W. Va.; Southern High School,
Oakland, Md.; and Weston High
School, Weston, W. Va.

Coach Adolfson enjoys hunting,
fishing, and playing tennis.

Coming to GSC from Parkers-
burg High School, Robert Summers
is the newest addition to the
GSC football coaching staff. He
is assistant football coach.

He is an alumnus of GSC where
he obtained an A.B. degree.
Coach Summers received his
M.S. degree from WVU.

Summers previously taught
here from January to June of
1962; at Williamstown High
School from 1962-'63, and Park-
ersburg High School from 1963-
'68.

Assistant Coach Summers is a
member of the West Virginia
Coaches' Association. His hob-
bies are: golf, reading and

Fishbowl Classic Opens '68 Season

PORTSMOUTH — Patrons of
the 22nd Fish Bowl Classic,
scheduled for Frank D. Lawrence
Stadium Saturday, Sept. 21, at
2 p.m., and featuring the foot-
ball teams of Glenville (W.Va.)
State College and Norfolk State
College just might get a preview
of the CIAA's "sleeper" eleven.

Norfolk State, bolstered by
returning veterans, three fine
quarterback prospects, a flock
of excellent receivers and several
strong running backs could come
up with its first conference foot-
ball championship.

Glenville State, however, will
be a supreme test of this theory.
Playing in the West Virginia
Intercollegiate Conference
Glenville State compiled a
5-2-1 record in 1967, including
triumphs over W. Va. State, a
6-3 victim of the Spartans, and
Bluefield.

The Pioneers will field a squad
composed mainly of native West
Virginians and a sprinkling of
out-of-state players. Based upon
their record and the return of
numerous veterans Coach Bill
Hanlin is confident that his
charges are capable of turning

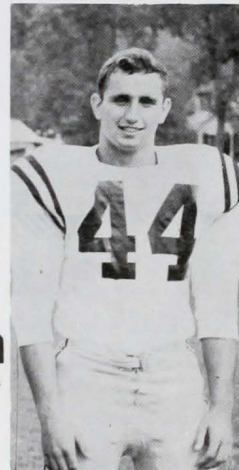
in a good showing in their first
Fish Bowl appearance.

Stressing the basic fundamentals
— blocking and tackling — the
Pioneers are rated as a hard nos-
ed football team in West Vir-
ginia collegiate circles and these
basics, coupled with a formid-
able passing and running game
earned them a second place
finish in the West Virginia Inter-
collegiate Conference last year.

Defensively, the Pioneers held
their opponents to an average of
13 points per game while garner-
ing an average of 15 points per
tilt on offense.

Proceeding the football game
and scheduled to get underway
at 10 a.m. will be the Shriner's
mammoth street parade under the
direction of Noble Sylvester
Spence, longtime organizer of the
popular spectacle, who has prom-
ised that this year's parade
will equal, if not surpass, pre-
vious presentations.

sale at several outlets.

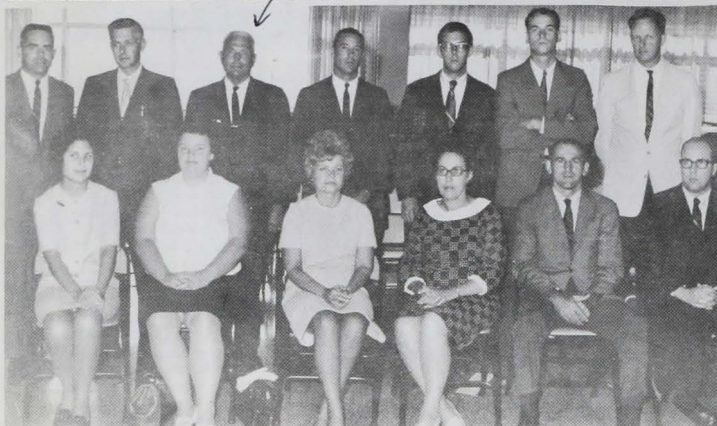

Room, Board, Tuition Fees Are Increased

Fee payment has changed this year and students now make a larger payment this month.

This is due to the fact that residents of the dormitories pay for a whole semester at once. Board as before will be split into two payments. This way the only payment in November is for board.

Room payment has changed in another way. If there are four in a room the payment remains the same. If three are in a room, the charge is an additional \$9.27 per semester. If two in a room, an additional charge of \$18.54 and an additional \$37.08 for a private room.

Students will be required to pay the following amounts on September 10, 11, or 12, 1968, (registration days for the first semester of 1968-69 school year).

Dormitory Students - W. Va. Students: Tuition and Fees, \$102.00; Board first half of semester, \$99.00; Room entire semester, \$126.00; Tax, \$6.75; Total, \$333.75. Out-of-State Students: Tuition and Fees, \$402.00; Board first half of semester, \$99.00; Room entire semester, \$126.00; Tax, \$6.75. Total \$633.75.

Off Campus Students - W. Va. Students: Tuition and Fees, \$102.00. Total, \$102.00. Out-of-State Students: Tuition and Fees, \$402.00. Total, \$402.00.

Due November 4, 1968 (by dormitory students): Board, \$99.00; Tax, \$2.97. Total, \$101.97.

Tuition and Fees will be \$1.00 less for the Spring Semester. One charge only for I.D. Card for the whole year.

A student may elect to live in the dormitory or off-campus during the semester he is doing student teaching. If he chooses to reside in the dormitory, he must pay for the entire semester. No room rent will be refunded if the student is absent or moves out of the dormitory during the semester. If a student withdraws or is suspended from college

during the first half of the semester, he will receive a refund of room rent for the second half of the semester, less room deposit. If a student withdraws or is suspended from college during the second half of the semester, there will be no refund of room rent or room deposit.

Checks are not cashed by the Business Office. A check for fees and payments due the College will be accepted when it is drawn for the exact amount of the obligation due the College. Dishonored checks will result in exclusion from classes until payment is made, including a \$5 assessment approved by the West Virginia Board of Education. Failure to pay all accounts due the College freezes one's records; he may not register for subsequent semester or obtain a transcript.
