April 29 Set For Meeting

The Ninth Educational Development Conference will begin April 29 with a dinner meeting at 6 p.m. for GSC faculty members. The theme of the conference is "How the Public Schools and Colleges Can Aid in Community Development." Dr. W. Fred Totten will be discussing the concept of the community.

The community school is a program of using the school as a community center to serve the whole community, not just the children. For example, the school may be used for evening classes in adult education, crafts, dancing or swimming.

At the dinner Dr. Totten, Director of Graduate Study in Community Education, will speak on "The Role of Higher Education in Community Development." Registration for the conference will take place the following morning at 9:30.

Dr. Delmar K. Somerville, Chairman of the Educational Development of the University of Cambridge. Conference and Dean of GSC, will open the conference. Following his remarks, Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, president of GSC, will make the welcoming address. Entertainment will be provided by the College Choir under the direction of Mr. Mark Aamot.

During the afternoon session, Dr. Totten will make two speeches. His topics will be "The Community Education Movement" and "Practices and Problems in Implementing a nity Education Program." The conference will end shortly after

It Shall Be So

To the Editor of "The Glenville Mercury:

It's not what other people think of you that makes you happy or un happy. It's what you think of yourself. Most of the time we are not aware of what we think about ourselves because we tend to project these feelings on the world around us. The young man with difficulties at school never defines himself in terms of the splendid potential provided by his high I.Q.; he sees himself as constantly threatened and misunderstood by his professors. The young woman who expects rejection withdraws from "the flesh market" of college mixers, says the academic work is overly demanding of her time, that boys are all the same and just want one thing, blind dates are unnatural, her college is isolated-and then she proceeds to find other girls who think and feel the same way so that they can sit and cluck together. The lonely man or woman of any age who complains about people is essentially justifying being alone.

All this is a way of saying that we act out what we believe we are There are winners and there are losers, and very often the difference is not one of talent but one of beliefs in one's talent. A beggar does not think of getting up and going to work. A beggar begs. A bully does not think of adopting the cause of the underdog. A bully bullies. In exactly the same way, winners win and losers lose.

It is hard for most of us to classify ourselves distinctly as winners or losers. Our self-image is not that clear cut; besides, most of us fall into that large area between these extremes. But, even within these extremes it is important to recognize that not only is the color of our lives strongly influenced by the image we have of ourselves, but so is achievement itself The person who thinks poorly of himself expects others to share this opin ion, and often unwittingly invites their rejection by disliking them in advance. The person who thinks well of himself acts accordingly.

"English Schools Today," will concern the situation in 1945. Also to be discussed under this topic is the variety of provision, especially at the secondary stage. Brennan's discussion will also be concerned with the social philosophy underlying this provision and the swing from elitism to egalitarianism in the past years: how much this is to be welcomed and a consideration of the possible dangers, and how far these concepts apply to the other stages, primary and higher education.

Kinder Announces Dates of GED Test State Secondary Diplomas Offered

The General Educational Development Test, which will qualify those persons who take it and receive sat-High School Equivalent Diploma," will be given on April 28 and 29. Adult residents of West Virginia who have not completed high school and wish to take the test should make application by letter to Kermit L. Kinder, Director of Guidance and Counseling, Glenville State College, Glenville, W. Va., 26351, and should include date of birth, home address, name of school last attended and date class graduated from high school. Members of the armed forces should have their applications endorsed by the education officer of their

ige or past the age they would have been had they remained in high school until they graduated and must have been out of school for a period of one year preceding their application. Individuals under 19 years of may be admitted to testing in the following situations: (1) Induction into the Armed Forces-such of the GED tests.

applicants must present a letter of request for testing signed by the recruiting officer; (2) students enrolled in such programs as OEO. New Careers, NYC, Job Corps, and other federal programs may be admitted to testing upon the recommendation of the program administrator. Test scores for these examinees will be furnished only to the program administrator, recruiting officer, or prospective employer. These applicants will not qualify to receive the equivalency diploma until they reach the age of 19 although they may take the test.

A standard score of 35 on each of the five tests or an average standard score of 45 on all five tests is required to achieve the equivalent diploma. Non-high-school graduates wishing to qualify for admission to state colleges must achieve a standard score of 40 on each of the five tests or an average standard score of 50 on all five tests. A fee of \$5 will be charged for all five tests. High schools are not authorized to issue diplomas or certificates on the basis



Science Major Presents Report

The West Virginia State Science Academy is an organization of instructors from eolleges and uni sities throughout the state. Dr. Max Ward, a member of the organization, invited Miss Kirby to present the report. She was one of 13 students from the state who participated in

The report was based upon a research paper written by Miss Kirby entitled "The Effects of Certain Mineral Salts on the Growth of Aberrant Mosses." She has done research on the paper for the past year under the direction of Dr. Max Ward, her ad-
