A Part of You Performs Here

"A Part of You"? A very good name for the trio of young airmen who performed here Monday night in the auditorium. Their outstanding performance was a perfect finale for the Lyceum season on this college campus - or any college campus for that matter.

A large and responding audience greeted the group from the moment they stepped into the spotlight until the sentimental closing of "You'll Never Walk Alone." Their rapport with the audience was amazing considering they are only amateurs and truly professional engagements are to be looked forward to after their tour of Japan. Their hesitancy and adlibbing at times were repetitious. However, for me personally, they successfully redeemed themselves with originals as "You think the Scotch is water don't you?" And the cute ribbing among the boys was endearing.

Ron Cutright from Glenville proved himself an accomplished writer and singer, as did Michael Humphrey, another West Virginian and Bob Clemens. They provide superb accompaniment on the tambourine, bass and 12-string guitar.

Their versions of "She Loves You", "Scarborough Fair", "Leavin' On a Jet Plane", "Green Back Dollar", and "I Want To Be Free", by other popular rock groups was very refreshing. It showed their versatility ranging from folk to classical rock. Their funny "dirty" song "In Trinidad" would certainly have awakened any of those in the audience who failed to enjoy the evening of appealingly "young" music. And for those who still perhaps refuse to "understand" our generation would only have to hear the love and meaning that is in such songs as "Bridge Over Troubled Waters" "Through The Day" (by Ron Cutright) "She Threw It All Away" "Lovin' Sound" and "Let's Get Together."

Why would these young Air Force men want to perform? Money is certainly a good answer but the performance that I saw was one bringing a message with young understanding and older inner-viewing. They enjoyed it, for all the guitar failing, guitar retuning and occasional loss of words remained very cool and poised throughout all. The audience enjoyed it for their attention and applause had that definite ring of being genuine.

GSC also added its own touch with the piano accompanist, Mike Barnhouse. He performed well and added that "special touch" to the overall show.

Dockendorff Visits May 7

Captain Gary D. Dockendorff, Marine Corps Selection Officer for this area will be at the Glenville State College campus on May 7, 1970, for the purpose of interviewing and selecting applicants for Marine Corps officer training programs.

Capt. Dockendorff stated that the Marine Corps offers two programs leading to a commission in the Marine Corps. The platoon leaders class is available to undergraduates

while the officer candidate course is available to seniors and recent graduates. PLC training is conducted at Quantico, Va. during the summer while the OCC is conducted eight times a year. In both programs the applicant must have a degree before commencing his active duty and the pre-commissioning training does not in anyway interfere with attendance at college.

Radeka Addresses Council In Chicago

Mr. Nickolas Radeka, instructor of Education at Glenville State was invited to speak to student chapters of the Council of Exceptional Children at the Conrad Hilton Hotel in Chicago during the 48th International Convention of the Council for Exceptional Children held April 20-25. Mr. Radeka spoke on Special Education in Appalachia.

Others making the trip and representing GSC were Mrs. Rosemary Elswick, instructor and Robert Hays, member of the GSC Frontier Chapter of Students Council for Exceptional

Children. Wanda Radcliffe of the regional PACE center was also in attendance.

Unofficial figures placed attendance at 11,000 with representatives coming from the United States, Canada, and other foreign countries. Approximately 3,000 of those attending were students.

Activities at Chicago were many and varied with meetings beginning at 8:00 a.m. and continuing throughout the day. Many state CEC federations held social hours in the evenings which were open for all to enjoy.

Hospitality rooms were open from 9:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m.

The convention opened Wednesday morning with an address by Whitney Young, Executive Director of the Urban League. Curbstone Clinics and Cracker Barrel Sessions were also conducted by leading authorities in the various areas of Special Education. These sessions were informal in nature and after introductory remarks were made, question and answer periods were held.

Exhibits pertaining to methods and materials available for use in teaching exceptional children were set up in the lower lobby of the hotel and these along with the above mentioned meetings provided many learning opportunities. A truck strike in Chicago affected many of these exhibitors by making much of their material late or unavailable.

A personnel recruitment center was also operated by the convention and many school systems had interviewers present to offer jobs to interested convention-goers. Opportunities were presented on all levels from all over the United States and Canada.

Next year, the CEC Convention will be held at the Fontainebleau Hotel, Miami, Fla., in April.

College Veterans Must Report To VA

The VA today reminded college veterans they must return their certification of attendance card during the last full month of every enrollment period.

The current semester will end in May or June for most college students. Here at Glenville State College, the semester ends June 5.

VA computers are programmed to prepare the final check this spring for

the 1969-70 school year only after the certification of attendance card has been received.

What's more, if the card is not returned at the end of the current semester, the student cannot be automatically enrolled under the G.I. Bill next semester.

College registrars also have a role to play. They must promptly return the veterans re-enrollment certification to the VA so the veteran may start receiving his checks on schedule the next semester he is in school.

Veteran trainees attending school below college level must return their attendance certification cards every month to insure uninterrupted payment of their educational allowance checks.

The VA pointed out that failure to complete and return the certification card will automatically stop all future payments to the veteran, serviceman or dependent.

Everyone attending school under a VA program has the responsibility of keeping the VA informed as to whether there has been a change in the number of dependents, or in his enrollment program.

The VA urged those interested in entering training, or desiring further information, to contact their nearest VA office.

Lunch Hour Free?

Dean Somerville would like to stress that it is the responsibility of the student to plan his schedule so that he will be able to obtain lunch. The cafeteria will be open for serving lunch between the hours of 11:00 and 1 p.m., no lunches will be served except during the specific times.

If a student does elect to schedule no lunch period, it becomes his sole responsibility and it is not that of the college.

Exam Schedule

The final examination schedule has been released by the office of Dean Somerville. These examinations are for the second semester, 1969-70. They will begin at 8 a.m. on Monday, June 1, and end at 12:10 on Thursday, June 4.

The schedule given below will be followed. Students in courses having multiple sections must take the examinations at the time scheduled for the section in which they are enrolled.

Examinations in evening classes are to be given at the last regular class meeting on June 1 or 2 or 3. In Arranged Classes the final examinations may be given at the last regular session(s) prior to the final examination.

In case of a conflict in the schedule, the instructor concerned should see the Dean about special arrangements.

Each examination will be held in the room where the class has been meeting. Final examinations are to be given in all classes where applicable unless waived by the Divisional Chairman and the Dean.

What has Glenville State College accomplished in the area of athletic endeavor during the past year? Have we won more than we lost or is it vice versa? What chance do we stand to win the Commissioner's Trophy for the WVIAC overall championship?

Let's go back a few months to September 1969 when Coaches Hanlin, Adolfsen, and Summers greeted the Pioneer footballers. With returnees like Marcus McPhail and Tom Haight, optimism was present in the GSC camp. Both McPhail and Haight had apparently recovered from knee surgery and were ready to go. Big Blue opened at Mars Hill, N.C., with a 17-7 victory. GSC next faced the Salem Tigers after a two week lay-off and went down to defeat by a 20-7 score in the home opener. Next came the powerful Fairmont Falcons in their Homecoming game in the Marion County city. When the dust had cleared from the track meet, the Pioneers had lost two in a row, final score 62-35. Marcus McPhail was lost for the season on the first play of the game.

West Virginia Wesleyan came to Pioneerville the next week-end for GSC Homecoming festivities. The Bobcats returned to Buckhannon on the short end of a 42-14 score as the Pioneers got themselves untracked in the second half. Bluefield State was next on the list and again the Tank Hill Terrors came through with a 35-23 win.

The Hilltoppers of West Liberty State met the Pioneers at Rohrbough Field and defeated GSC 21-14 after a 14-14 half time tie. West Virginia State topped the Pioneers at Institute by a 20-11 count. The GSC record at this stage stood at three wins and four losses with the winless Concord Mt. Lions coming to town. Another track meet similar to the one at Fairmont was held as the Big Blue team came out on top of a 54-39 count.

The Pioneers loaded themselves on the college bus for a trip across the mountains to face Shepherd in the seasons final. An early snow storm gave the GSC team some bad moments but they won 20-17 to finish the year with a 5-4 record. Tom Haight was named the WVIAC offensive player of the year. Haight and Jackie Joe Robinson were named to the All-Conference Team.

Sometime about the middle of October basketball practice started and Coach Lilly and Coach Carney greeted an aggregation which included players with names like Robinson, Datcher, Garnett, and Barnes. Not quite knowing what to expect, the dribble and shoot bunch traveled to Weston for the annual pre-season Shrine Tournament. The Pioneers defeated Salem and lost to Fairmont in December on the home planks by a 61-60 count. Morris Harvey came to Tank Hill and went back to Charleston bemoaning a three point loss at the hands of Big Blue. Sports writers were beginning to call the Pioneers invincible at home until

Beckley College came in two nights after the big win over Morris Harvey. Would you believe Beckley had defeated the Pioneers by one point in Pioneer Alley?

Then came the big blow-out called a conference tournament at Charleston. Glenville State was called a dark-horse with little chance of winning after a third place finish in the WVIAC standings. The tourney opened and Big Blue had trouble disposing of Wheeling and West Liberty in the first two games. Fairmont was next to fall in the Friday night semi-finals and before you could say Jackie Joe, the GSC crew found themselves in the finals against the Golden Eagles of Morris Harvey. Down by five at the half, the blue-clad Pioneers refused to fold and when the final buzzer had sounded, GSC was the tournament champion.

A two out of three game play-off was to determine the WVIAC representative in Kansas City at the NAIA tournament and on Monday night Glenville State was back in Charleston this time on the Morris Harvey campus to take on the Eagles again. The Morris Harveyans won by three in overtime. The Pioneers now had to win two in a row with the next game on Tank Hill.

The largest crowd over to watch a basketball game at Glenville jammed into the Health and Physical Education Building to watch the Pioneers run out of gas in the last half and close out a highly successful season with 20-10 record.

All of the time the basketballers were hogging the limelight, "Doc" Dollgener's bowlers were compiling quite a record in the WVIAC postal league. Undefeated until their last match with West Virginia State, the Pioneer keggers finished the season with a 17-1 record and had won both the northern and southern regionals and the conference championship. After defeating UNC at Charlotte and Lynchburg, Va., in the area tournament, GSC went to Kansas City for the national finals and did quite well by finishing fourth in an eight team field. The national doubles championship was won by Al Malone and Steve Poling.

At the time the bowlers were in Kansas City, the golfers of Coach Tim Carney were at Wheeling's Oglebay Park for the WVIAC golf tournament. After leading at the end of the first day, the GSC linksters fell off the pace and finished in second place, eight strokes—much, much better than the sixth place of last year.

Baseball season isn't over at this writing so we will look at that angle next time around. You can bet that Coach Milliken will demand equal space for his hard ballers.

1969-70 has been a success story for the Pioneers. Its been good but not really great and has served notice that GSC will not roll over and play dead for the WVIAC any more. We look improvement in all areas in 1970-71.

GSC Loses Four Games

The Glenville State baseball team lost both ends of a double header to Morris Harvey on April 29 at Rohrbough Field to knock the last hopes the Pioneers had of a divisional championship.

In the first game the Pioneers lost by a score of 6-1. The game was tied at the end of regulation play at 1-1 but the Golden Eagles blasted the Pioneers in the extra frame for five runs to complete the scoring. Rob Church had a double for the only extra base hit for the Pioneers. Pee Wee Lacey, Dan Wessner, and Bill Rice each had a hit for the Pioneers.

In the second game, Morris Harvey banged out three runs in the first inning and were never headed thereafter. Pee Wee Lacey continued to be the mainspring of the Pioneer attack as he had two of the five hits. Mike Wentzel started the game and was relieved by Bill Rice in the third inning.

Bowlers Capture Fourth Place Title

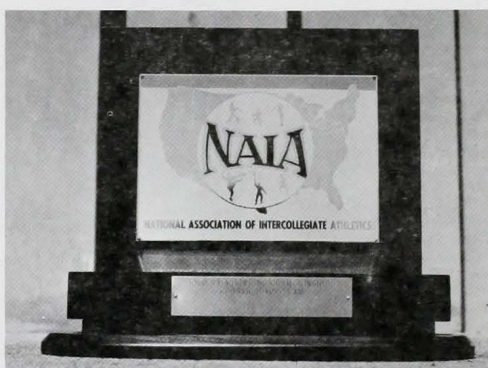
The Glenville State College bowling team finished fourth in the nation in the NAIA championship tournament which was held in Kansas City, Missouri May 1 and 2.

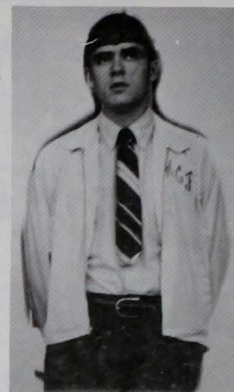

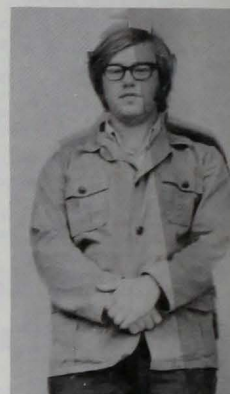
