

Their outstanding performance was a perfect finale for the lyceum season on this college campus - or any Ilege campus for that matter. A large and responding audience greeted the group from the n colleg

Their rapport with the audience was amazing considering they are only amateurs and truly professional engagements are to be looked forward to after their tour of Japan. Their hesitance and adlibing at times were repetitious However, for me personally, they successfully redeemed themselves with originals as "You think the Scotch is water don't you?" And the cute ribbing among the boys was endearing.

Ron Cutright from Glenville proved himself and accomplished writer and singer, as did Michael Humphrey, another West Virginian and Bob Clemens. They provide superb accompaniment on the tambourine, bass and 12-string

gutar. Their versions of "She Loves You", "Scarborough Fair", "Leavin On a Jet Plane", "Green Back Dollar", and "I Want To Be Free", by other popular rock groups was very refreshing. It showed their versatility ranging from folk to classical rock. Their funny "dirty" song "In Trinidad" would certainly have awakened any of those in the audience who failed to enjoy the evening of appealingly "young" music. And for those who still perhaps refuse to "understand" our generation would only have to hear the love and meaning that is in such songs as "Bridge Over Troubled Waters" "Through The Day" (by Ron Cutright) "She Threw It All Away" "Lovin Sound" and "Lets Get Rogether."

Why would these young Air Force men want to perform? Money is cer-tainly a good answer but the performance that I saw was one bringing a message with young understanding and older inner-viewing. They enjoyed it, for all the guitar failing, guitar retuning and occasional loss of words remained very cool and poised throughout all. The audience enjoyed it for their attention

and applause had that definite ring of being genuine. GSC also added its own touch with the piano accompanist, Mike Barnhouse. He performed well and added that "special touch" to the overall show.

Panel discussions at the conference were featured on the new directions in area studies programs, teh future of language teaching, the internationalization of teacher edu-cation, and the most effective way to organize international education

administration on campus. Some of the issues discussed were: To what extent should foreign students (in whatever country) become involved in activities relating to the host country's major social and political problems and how can differences in higher education sys tems be circumvented as barriers students studying abroad.

The discussion to these questions is placed within the context of the RCIE, which has as its objective to develop international educational programs to meet the needs of its ored activities

Pre-Registration Scheduled May 11-14 The Office of the Registrar again

announced that advance registration will be conducted next week on May 11, 12, 13, 14, 1970. Each student must meet with his advisor prior to the week designated for advance registration. He will select courses which he wishes to enroll for the fir semester and complete his schedule card. The advisor must check, approve and sign the card.

The student will report to the Registrar in the Ballroom in the Pioneer Center with his advance enrollment card from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:00 p.n until 4:00 p.m. on the dates as fol lows. Senior-Students who will have completed a minimum of ninety (90) or more semester hours, Monday, May 11. Junior-Students who will have completed a minimum of fifty-eight (58) semester hours at the end of this semester, May 12, 1970, Sophomore or all other students who are not classified as juniors or seniors, register May 13, and 14, 1970.

Class attendance will be required all students during advance registration. Students will register during their vacant class periods. All students should schedule a lunch period. Dining rooms will be open from 11:00 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. during the first semester of the 1970-71 academic year.

The payment of fees is as follows Students may pay all tuition and fees for the first semester of the 1970-71 academic year at the Business Office during the advance registration. Those who register in advance and do not pay their tuition and fees during advance registration will be mailed a bill for fees not later than July 10, 1970. All fees must be paid prior to August 3rd. The names of student who register in advance (except those who receive financial aid from the college), but fail to pay their tuition and fees prior to August 3rd, will be removed from all class rolls and will be required to re-register during the regular registration period September

Students receiving financial aid from the College will pre-register, but will pay their fees during the regular registration in September. Students in the Forest Technology Program ill register at 2:00 p.m., May 14,

What has Glenville State College accomplished in the area of athletic endeavor during the past year? Have we won more than we lost or is it vice versa? What chance do we stand to win the Commissioner's Trophy for the WVIAC overall championship

Let's go back a few months to September 1969 when Coaches Janlin, Adolfson, and Summers Hanlin. greeted the Pioneer footballers. With returnees like Marcus McPhail and Tom Haught, optimism was present in GSC camp. Both McPhail and Haught had apparently recovered from knee surgery and were ready to go. Big Blue opened at Mars Hill, N.C., with a 17-7 victory. GSC next faced the Salem Tigers after a two week lay-off and went down to defeat by a 20-7 score in the home opener. Next came the powerful Fairmont Falcons in their Homecoming game in the Marion County city. When the dust had cleared from the track meet, the Pioneers had lost two in a row, final score 62-35. Marcus McPhail was lost for the season on the first play of the

West Virginia Wesleyan came to Pioneerville the next week-end for GSC Homecoming festivities. The Bobcats returned to Buckhannon on the short end of a 42-14 score as the Pioneers got themselves untracked in the second half. Bluefield State was next on the list and again the Tank Hill Terrors came through with a 35-23 win.

The Hilltoppers of West Liberty State met the Pioneers at Rohrbough Field and defeated GSC 21-14 after a 14-14 half time tie. West Virginia State topped the Pioneers at Institute by a 20-11 count. The GSC record at this stage stood at three wins and four losses with the winless Concord Mt. Lions coming to town. Another track meet similar to the one at Fairmont was held as the Big Blue team came out on top of a 54-39

The Pioneers loaded themselves on the college bus for a trip across the mountains to face Shepherd in the seasons final. An early snow storm gave the GSC team some bad moments but they won 20-17 to finish the year with a 5-4 record. Tom Haught was named the WVIAC offensive player of the year. Haught and Jackie Joe Robinson were named to the All-Conference Team.

Sometime about the middle of October basketball practice started and Coach Lilly and Coach Carney greeted an aggregation which in cluded players with names like Robin son, Datcher, Garnett, and Barnes. Not quite knowing what to expect, the dribble and shoot bunch traveled to Weston for the annual pre-season Shrine Tournament. The Pioneers defeated Salem and lost to Fairmont in December on the home planks by a 61-60 count. Morris Harvey came t Tank Hill and went back to Charle ton bemoaning a three point loss at the hands of Big Blue. Sports writers were beginning to call the Pioneers invincible at home until

Beckley College came in two nights after the big win over Morris Harvey. Would you believe Beckley had de-feated the Pioneers by one point in Pioneer Alev? Pioneer Alley? Then came the big blow-out called

a conference tournament at Charles ton. Glenville State was called a dark horse with little chance of w after a third place finish in the WVIAC standings.
