## Dr. Miller Is Judge

Dr. Espy W. Miller, Chairman of the Division of Language Arts, has been appointed as a regional judge for the National Council of Teachers of English Achievement Awards for 1970. The judging committees which are made up of English instructors from colleges and high schools will analyze the writing ability and literary awareness of approximately 7,500 selected high school students.

This program gives recognition to worthy high school seniors and the staff members who taught them for their excellence in English. Finalists, whose names are announced in November are given recommendations for scholarship aids to colleges throughout the United States. Winners receive on an average 50 to 75 letters from colleges offering scholarship aid or urging them to apply for admission.

These awards serve to improve instruction in English at all levels. The program is sponsored by The National Council of Teachers of English.

## \$3000 Fellowship Awarded To GSC Business Student

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro has extended a graduate teaching fellowship for the 1970-71 academic year to Mrs. Anna Slack, a senior business education major. Dr. Vance T. Littlejohn, Head of the Department of Business Education at UNC-G, confirmed the fellowship offer in a letter to Dr. John F. McCreary earlier this week. Dr. McCreary acknowledged that the fellowship is valued at more than \$3,000.

Mrs. Slack is currently planning to continue her education by pursuing a Master's degree program in business education. She possesses a 3.4 grade point average and will graduate with honors from GSC in June.

As part of her teaching fellowship responsibilities, Mrs. Slack will receive extensive preparation in computer science this summer and then serve as a laboratory instructor at UNC-G during the Fall and Spring semesters. "This is a most unusual fellowship offer," Dr. McCreary commented, "and we are quite proud of Mrs.

Slack's selection. We are confident that she will continue to excel in her professional preparation."

A native of West Virginia, Mrs. Slack lives in Servia with her two teenage daughters, both of whom are students at Braxton County High School. Debbie, her oldest daughter, will be attending GSC in the Fall. She has been awarded a work-study scholarship in the Division of Business beginning in September.

Dr. McCreary added that Mr. Tom Cox, a 1969 graduate of GSC, received a somewhat similar fellowship in Business Administration at Bowling Green State University for this academic year. He plans to complete his M.B.A. degree in December.

## Money Contributed

In order to provide educational opportunities for deserving students, the students and faculty members in the Division of Business have contributed \$650 to the federal work-study scholarship fund, according to an announcement by Dr. John F. McCreary. In addition, Public Relations Director Mr. Norman Laughlin of Monongahela Power Company has donated \$100 on behalf of his company to this scholarship fund.

These gifts to the College, together with matching funds from the federal government, will provide six \$625 work-study scholarships for the 1970-71 academic year. Dr. McCreary stated that this represents a 100 per cent increase over contributions made by the Division of Business last year.

"The work-study scholarship program is one that is very close to our hearts," Dr. McCreary explained, "because it emphasizes learning in the classroom as well as in the office while requiring excellence in each endeavor. Speaking for those who contributed to the College for this purpose," Dr. McCreary continued, "we recognize that, in a period of rising costs for higher education, those who sincerely believe in advanced studies must help provide for many learning opportunities of other deserving students."

Dr. McCreary acknowledges that the two major contributors to the work-study scholarship fund at GSC were Alpha Delta Epsilon Fraternity and Mr. Howard E. Warren. Their gifts to the Federal Work-Study Matching Fund were \$350 and \$100 respectively.

## VA Cautions G.I.'s

While many students at Glenville State College are giving thought to their final exams and to plans for the coming summer, students attending under the G. I. Bill have an additional concern.

According to the Veterans Administration, all veterans attending GSC under the G. I. Bill must return their certificate of attendance cards during the last full month of this semester to receive their final check and, in addition, to be automatically re-enrolled under the G. I. Bill next semester.

The VA explained that VA payments are computerized and the computers are programmed to prepare the final checks only after the attendance cards are received.

Since final checks do not arrive until most students have left the campus, the VA reminded veterans to be sure to make arrangements to have the post office forward their final check.

Also, the VA asked college veterans to report promptly any change in dependents or change in course load that would affect the amount of their checks.

The registrar's office at Glenville State College was reminded by the VA to promptly return the veteran's re-enrollment certification to the VA to insure that the veteran will start receiving his checks on schedule during his next enrollment period.

## Year's End Brings Apparent Changes

First of all, there has been some improvement or renovation of the physical campus in several departments. Mr. Howard E. Warren, Assistant Professor of Business Administration, announces that the 1970 Wall Street Journal Award at Glenville State College is being presented to Mrs. Anna Nottingham Slack. Mrs. Slack is a senior business education major from Servia, W. Va.

Among other benefits, this award entitles the recipient to a one year's subscription to *The Wall Street Journal* and a specially designed silver medal.

Originally enrolled as a two-year student in secretarial science, Mrs.

Slack entered the comprehensive business education program upon completing her Associate in Arts degree. Her professional student teaching experience was obtained at Braxton County High School during the first semester of the 1969-70 academic year. In addition to attending Glenville State College this semester, she has taught as a substitute teacher in Braxton County.

One year ago, Mrs. Slack's accounting research report was declared a regional winner for the state of West Virginia. This year her paper is being considered for national honors. The only other winner in West Virginia in the biannual contest was Mr. Ronal Boothe. Mr. Boothe, who is currently employed by the General Accounting Office in Washington, D. D., is a graduate of GSC and was the 1969 Wall Street Journal awardee.
