"An Old Fashioned Homecoming" is the theme chosen for the 1970-71 gala celebration of the Pioneer Homecoming. This will be the theme which the organizations of the campus and community will use to entitle their floats for the Homecoming parade.

Heading the parade this year will be the parade marshal, Mr. John R. Wagner. Student marshalls are Greg Morgan and Cofer Walls, who will assist Mr. John White, parade chairman. Following him will be the Boy Scouts with the color guard. Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, president of the college and James White, president of the Alumni Association, will follow, with Mrs. Wilburn and Mrs. White in the car directly behind their husbands. Mr. Jackie Joe Robinson, Montrose Award Winner, will be next followed by the Student Congress Officers.

The following in order of march will be GSC Marching Band, Brownie Troop 58, Glenville Girl Scouts, Cub Scouts, Council for Exceptional Children's float, and the W.Va. Folk Festival Belles.

Camden Flats 4-H Club, Little Kanawha Shrine Club, Alpha Sigma Alpha sorority float, Delta Zeta sorority float, and the Sigma Sigma Sigma sorority float, followed by the Clay County High School Band.

The GSC Pioneer and cheerleaders will follow with the freshman class. The Queens Entourage, Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity float and cars, Theta Xi fraternity float and cars, and the Lambda Chi Alpha fraternity float and cars.

Miss GSC, Janet Alkire, will be preceded by the Forest Technology Society float, Baptist Student Movement float, Gilmer County High School Band and Student Government.

Women's Physical Education Majors and Minors Club float, Student Education Association and Kappa Delta Pi float, Women's Hall with their float and Sand Fork Elementary queen.

The parade will follow the traditional route down main street, with line up on Bouderman Boulevard and College Avenue at 9 a.m. and the actual parade starting promptly at 10 a.m.

In the past, this has been one of the most spectacular events of Homecoming weekend.

The author of the book *Eye of the Hurricane*, Mr. Buckley is currently finishing a novel to be entitled *Servants and Their Masters*, a book on morals and manners set in Spain. He is also working on three movie scripts.

Mr. Buckley is the son of the oil explorer William F. Buckley, and he is the younger brother of William F. Buckley, Jr., and James Buckley, the conservative candidate for the U.S. Senate from New York.

Strongly opinionated and possessing a lively imagination, Mr. Buckley is an eloquent spokesman for the conservative point of view. Known for his perceptive and witty answers, Mr. Buckley is constantly taking a searching look at contemporary society and predicting its future.

The youngest of the Buckley sons, Mr. Buckley attended school in England, Mexico, and the United States. He received his A.B. degree from Yale University in 1952, where he distinguished himself as a debater, editor and writer. Mrs. Buckley is the former Elizabeth Huntington Howell, the daughter of Westhampton and Southampton whaling captains. She is the Madrid editor of *Harper's Bazaar*, and president of Teatro Madrid, Spain's foremost school of dramatics.

The thrill of victory...

Well the Pioneers have done it again. Their last quarter touchdown put them over the hump against the determined Wesleyan Bobcats. A bright spot in the victory was the play of freshman fullback John Pratt. Pratt, from Parkersburg, gained 133 yards in his first taste of varsity action. This is the most yardage gained by a Pioneer this season. Pratt is filling in for Clyde Stepp who injured his knee in the Fairmont game.

My most valuable player award this week goes to halfback Carl Alloway. Alloway is the workhorse for the Pioneers. He gained 108 yards rushing in 34 carries against Wesleyan. The 34 carries is only four shy of the record held by Tommy Haight. This is the second straight game that Alloway has broken the 100 yard mark. A great deal of credit should go to the Pioneer offensive line. Quarterback Pete McDermitt had an off night passing, but he ran the option well. "Pee Wee" Lacey caught another pass for a touchdown and has to be considered as one of the top conference backs in the receiving department.

The highly acclaimed defensive unit has to be praised again. The bandits gave up only 82 yards total offense. GSC Defeats Bobcat 11

The Glenville Pioneers defeated the Bobcats of West Virginia Wesleyan Saturday night 19-14. The Pioneers completely dominated the game statistically, but had to come from behind in the closing minutes to win.

The Pioneers who gained 227 yards during the game scored first on a 36 yard pass from Pete McDermitt to 'Pee Wee' Lacey. Raymond Swisher then attempted the extra point. The kick was no good, as Swisher's string was broken at 37. The touchdown drive was highlighted by the running of John Pratt and Carl Alloway. The Pioneers controlled the ball throughout the first quarter but could not score again. Swisher attempted three field goals, but the magic seemed to be gone from his talented toe, as he missed all three attempts. Wesleyan went ahead 7-6 in the closing minutes of the first quarter when Terry Landis threw 27 yards to Jay Fleishman for the touchdown. The extra point was good by Leslie Hart. The game then seasawed back and forth with the Pioneers controlling the football. Finally late in the second quarter John Pratt ripped through the Bobcat defense for a 5 yard touchdown. Swisher then added the extra point making the score 13-7 Pioneers.

The Bobcats regained the lead when Hart capped a third quarter drive with a 16 yard spurt around his right end for the touchdown. Hart also kicked the extra point putting the Bobcats on top 14-13. Things began looking bleak for Glenville as they could not score. They moved up and down the field at will, but the fired-up Bobcats kept them from penetrating paydirt. As they have done in the past two games, the Pioneers came to life late in the game. With approximately six minutes remaining in the game, Carl Alloway took the ball six yards for the winning touchdown. The score was then 19-14. This was the final score as the Blue Bandits held the Bobcats in check.

The Blue Bandits, Pioneer defensive unit, again deserves credit. The Bandits allowed Wesleyan only 82 yards total offense. This weekend the Pioneers face the tough Big Blues of Bluefield State in the Homecoming Game.

Bluefield To Invade Glenville Pioneers

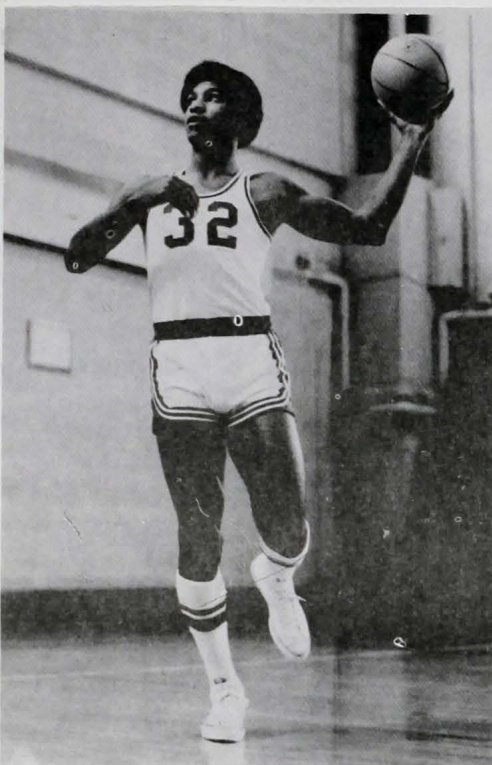

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Jackie Joe Robinson Montrose Winner

Annual Montrose Award Denotes Outstanding Sr.

In the spring of 1952, the Student Council decided to give an award to Glenville State College's outstanding senior class athlete - the Frank Montrose Award. In naming the award, the committee endeavored to find a man who was a fine athlete, had a high scholastic record, and was of impeccable moral character. They looked no further than Frank Montrose.

Frank Montrose came to Glenville after establishing his talents at Richwood High School. His first game at Rohrbough Field was while he was still a junior at Richwood High, when he led the Lumberjacks to a 7-0 victory over Glenville High School on Oct. 9, 1937. In the second quarter of that game he returned a punt for a 60-yard touchdown and had another run of 65 yards, but was hauled down short of the goal line.

Montrose showed much promise as a freshman under Coach "Nate" Rohrbough, but failed to play in the first game, a scoreless tie with Salem.

In the following four games against Morris Harvey, Bethany, West Liberty, and Concord, Montrose saw only limited action. Disappointed with the 2-2-1 record to date, Coach Rohrbough used Montrose frequently in the New River (now W.Va. Tech) game.

The 5'11", 163-pound freshman passed for a touchdown in leading the Pioneers to their third victory of the season.

Frank Montrose started the next game against Fairmont, scoring two touchdowns and passing for a third as Glenville outclassed Fairmont 27-8. His first college TD came in the first period when he returned a punt for 63 yards.

Montrose ran wild against Shepherd, setting up the first TD with a 17-yard end-sweep and scoring the next one on a 12-yard run. He ran 59 yards through a broken field for a third, and intercepted a pass and returned it 46 yards to set up the

fourth. The final score was 34-0.

Frank Montrose played his final game for GSC against Potomac State, when he led the Pioneers to a 7-0 victory. After sitting out the first game and parts of the next four, he still received All-Conference mention.

The following spring, Frank Montrose went blind and was forced to drop out of school. Shortly before he left school, Earl MacDonald, Mercury sports writer, shook the Montrose's hand and said, "See you in September at training camp, Frank." "Don't worry, I'll be back," replied Montrose.

On June 21, 1940, the 21-year-old Frank Montrose died of nephritis in a Baltimore hospital. Montrose never made it back to GSC, but with the Frank Montrose Award, he is once again back at Glenville State College.

Montrose's niece, Mary Margaret Nester, of Ravenswood, is now attending GSC. She is a physical education major.

Jackie J. Robinson Is Honored Athlete

Jackie Joe Louis Robinson has been named the winner of the 1970 Montrose Award, given annually to the most well-rounded student athlete to graduate from Glenville State College. Robinson, who is currently teaching and coaching at Woodrow Wilson High School in Beckley, will receive the award during halftime at the Homecoming game featuring the Pioneers and the Big Blues of Bluefield State College.

Robinson was one of the greatest athletes to ever grace the Glenville campus. He was an all WVIAC selection in basketball three years, was basketball player of the year in the conference his senior year; was an all WVIAC selection in baseball; and was an all WVIAC selection in football during his only year on the football squad. To add to these awards, the Montrose Award winner was an honorable mention small college All-American selection in both basketball and football.

Jackie Robinson's prowess in sports does not come from natural ability alone, for Mr. Robinson was probably the state's most superbly-conditioned athlete. He also carried with him a great knowledge of the game. To add to this, Jackie Joe Robinson does not have the word "quit" in his

vocabulary. All these attributes combined with his great natural talent made Robinson a truly great athlete. Glenville fans will long remember his driving layups, soft high arching jump shots, his grin as he shot his free throws, his one handed catches of the football and in baseball, his game winning hits. Jackie Joe Louis Robinson was a coach's dream.

NTE Is Scheduled Nov. 14 At GSC

Less than one week remains for prospective teachers who plan to take the National Teacher Examinations at GSC on Nov. 14, 1970, to submit their registrations for these tests to Educational Testing Service, Princeton, N.J., Kermit L. Kinder, Counselor, announced today. Registrations for the examinations must be forwarded so as to reach the Princeton Office not later than Oct. 22, Mr. Kinder advised.

At the one-day test session a candidate may take the Common Examinations, which include tests in Professional Education and General Education, and one of the seventeen Teaching Area Examinations which are designed to evaluate his understanding of the subject matter and methods applicable to the area he may be expected to teach.

Each candidate will receive an Admission Ticket advising him of the exact location of the center to which he should report, Mr. Kinder advised. Candidates for the Common Examinations will report at 8:30 a.m. on Nov. 14, and should finish at approximately 12:30 p.m. Mr. Kinder said. The Teaching Area Examinations will begin at 1:30 p.m. and should finish at approximately 4:15 p.m., according to the time schedule for these examinations which has been set up by Education Testing Service.

OCS Team To Be Here On Tuesday, Oct. 20

The U.S. Army Officer Candidate School Selection Team will visit the Glenville State College Campus on October 20, 1970, Lieutenant Joseph P. Byrne, Team Officer, announced today.

Lt. Byrne, from the First U.S. Army Recruiting District Headquarters, Fort Meade, Md., will interview college seniors and graduates on campus for the officer candidate enlistment option.

Under this program, qualified college students or graduates can enlist in the U.S. Army and be guaranteed attendance at one of the two officer candidate schools. Officer candidate training is 23 weeks. These schools are Infantry OCS, Fort Benning, Ga.; Artillery OCS, Fort Sill, Okla.

Graduates of OCS are commissioned Second Lieutenants in the U.S. Army. They must agree to serve a minimum of two years as commissioned officers after completing this training.

The Army OCS Team visiting the local campus is one of ten touring selected colleges and universities throughout the nation.

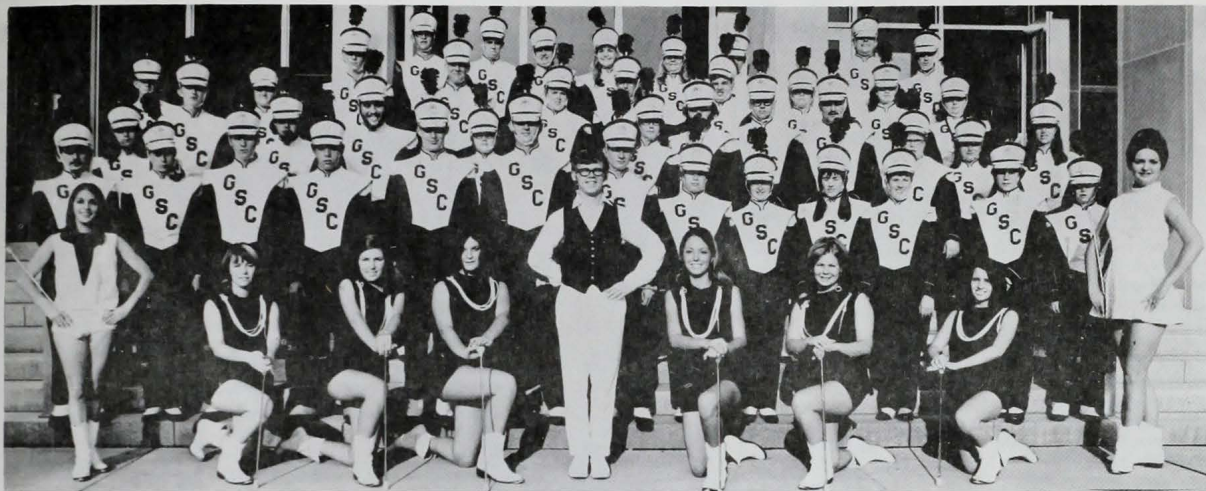
