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Campus Is Scene Of Abandoned Well

Are you beginning to think that
you have exhausted the points of
interest on GSC's campus? Well...
You've probably missed one—a well. You've probably missed one—a well. Located in front of the Administration Building outside the Music Dept., is an abandoned well which until the 1920's, was used for drinking water by GSC students.

Although today there is no longer a pump attached to the well, it still

serves a very useful function. It is one of several wells throughout West Virginia which is used to compute the water table, or the ground water level, for the state. West Virginia, in turn, reports its water conditions to the U.S. Geological Survey

Every Monday morning, Mr. Clar-ence Bumgardner, Assistant Business Manager, takes the weekly water level measurement and records the amount of ground water. This process is done by lowering a metal tape measure 20 feet into the well (approx-imately 25 feet deep) and then gaging, to a thousandth of an inch, the level

of the water.

Mr. Bumgardner submits a monthly record of the area's ground water level to Morgantown where the entire state's water conditions are compiled by the W.Va. geological and mic survey

Mr. Bumgardner explained that ground water conditions are mainly affected by three situations. These are tree cutting, road building, and strip mining. Each of these ecological industries causes precipitation to go to rivers and streams rather than into

Glenville's well was first used for its present purpose in Nov. 1953. Lloyd M. Jones, former Business Manager, was the well reader at the

grams offered by many universities, the Pitt program lasts just one term, is not limited to the junior year and,

thus, need not interrupt the student's

course of study in his own college.

The curriculum is also flexible

and though it remains of special interest to undergraduate French ma-jors, it can meet the needs of stu-dents majoring in other fields as well.

Though the basic curriculum con-sists of six credits of language work and six credits in French literature

and civilization, a student may, with approval, add a study or research project to the program or substitute such a project for one course in the

standard program.

Income Tax Information Released For Veterans

Income tax information has been released concerning veterans. Veterans benefits are generally exempt from taxation and need not be reported as income on income tax returns, the

Veterans Administration announced.

The VA said the only reportable item is interest earned on GI insurance dividends left on deposit or credit with the VA since this is considered earned income and a veterans' benefit.

Other major tax exempt benefits are compensation and pension, GI Bill and other educational assistance. subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees, and grants for homes or autos to severly disabled



Sacred Lily Of India Plant Is A "Believe It Or Not"

There is a strange and beautiful
plant on campus, of which few
student or faculty members are aware.
This plant can be found on the four
th floor of the Science building and is the possession of Dr. Byron Turner.

Known by many names, Sacred Lily of India, Black Lily of the Nile, Smoke palm, and Devil's Tongue or by Dr. Turner's own pet name "Stink Plant," this plant is still unusual. It nas attracted the attention of Ripley's Believe It or Not, and has had very marked success at drawing crowds at garden shows.

Dr. Turner first became interested in these East Indian plants about twer ty years ago when presented one by his mother-in-law and has continued

to grow and record their growth rate.

The growth of this plant is as strange as its name. It is perennial and reproduces by corn division and by formation of new corns by growth form the parent corn. The corn itself is the bulb at the bottom of the stem from which the plant grows and recieves nourishment.

The plants growing here are div-isions of the original corn received twenty years ago. They are grown outdoors during the summer and about 3½ to 4 feet high, and have a large three-lobed leaf structure with a spread of 5 to 6 feet.

In the autumn the leaf dies or is killed by frost and is removed. The corns are lifted in dormant state and stored in a cool dry basement. If the

to as that foul-smelling llower, as evidenced by Dr. Turner's terming it "Stink Plant," but the odor is only, bad the second day, and is only a bad memory by the third, while the bloom lasts a week or more.

Botanically, the family of this plant is Arum, the Genur Amorpho-phallus or Hydrosme and species Rivieri. Dr. Turner urges those who haven't had the opportunity to actually see one of these fascinating plants plants to take a few minutes walk up to the top floor of the Science building.
