Athletic Dept. Holds Camp

Dr. Robert Dollgener, athletic director, has announced that the Glenville State College Athletic Department will have its first football camp this summer. The first session will be June 20-25, the second session will be June 29-July 2. This camp will be opened to all jr. high and high school football players. The purpose of the camp will be to teach all the basic fundamental skills related to football. It will be under the direction of Mr. Bill Hanlin, the head football coach at Glenville.

Mr. Hanlin will be assisted by members of the Glenville State College Athletic Department and specialists. The specialists include such persons as Dave Nusz, Mississippi State University; Ron Rice, assistant coach at the University of Maryland; Dale Evans, W.Va. University; Frank Vincent, football coach and athletic director at Charleston High School; Walter Barr, from James Wood, Virginia; Larry Blackstone, head football coach at Grafton High School.

The cost of the camp will be \$45.00 per person per session and it has been sanctioned by the West Virginia Secondary Schools Activities Commission.

Concord Sponsors Dirty Pic. Contest

The Concord College Environmental Protection Group has announced a DIRTY PICTURE CONTEST to be held as a part of the activities of Earth Day. The contest is open to anyone who would like to express in a visual form their feelings about what is happening to our environment.

Dirty Pictures include photographs, drawings, paintings, cartoons, posters, mobiles and other visual expressions of the pollution problem. Entries will be divided into two age groups, below 16 and above 16. Entries in the contest will be judged in three classes: (1) Photographs, (2) Drawings and Cartoons, (3) Miscellaneous media.

Entries should be sent to: Geography Department, Concord College, Athens, W.Va. 24712. A label with the age group, name and address of the entrant should be attached to the back of each entry. Return postage should be included, if the entry is to be returned. All entries must be received by May 1, 1971.

The best examples of Dirty Pictures selected by the judges will be displayed at Concord College from May 4 to May 9. Prizes for the winning entries will be announced later.

Jackson's Mill To Be Site Of W. Va. Speech Festival

The annual W. Va. Intercollegiate Speech Association Festival will be held this year on April 22, 23, and 24 at Jackson's Mill.

Glenville State College is one of the 22 member schools which will compete for honors in debate, extemporaneous speaking, oratory, radio (announcing and documentary), oral interpretation and drama.

This year's extemporaneous speaking topic is "Population Control: Problems and Solutions." The time limit for speeches is five to six minutes.

In the oratorical contest, the orations, original persuasive speeches delivered without notes, may be concerned with any worthwhile subject. The orations should not exceed ten minutes.

The radio division includes both announcing and documentary. In the

announcing contest, each contestant will be furnished with a packet containing national news copy, PSA's, and commercials. Each contestant will be allowed 15 minutes to edit, organize, and rehearse before recording.

For the radio documentary contest, each contestant will prepare and record a 15-minute radio documentary prior to the Festival.

The oral interpretation division involves both poetry and prose readings. Readers should select prose and poetry selections of literary merit. The time limit for reading is six minutes, excluding a one-minute introduction.

In the drama division, GSC will present Anton Chekhov's one-act comedy *The Marriage Proposal*. The play, directed by Lonnie Brewster, was recently presented on campus. It stars Benny Linn, Robert Dotson, and Marilyn Nichols.

At Glenville State College, Miss Hardman is a sophomore math major and chemistry minor. She is an active member of Sigma Sigma Sigma sorority and serves as recording secretary. She is also secretary of Chi Beta Phi, national science and math honorary, vice-president of Collegiate Order of Rainbow Girls, a member of the Order of Diana, and a Dean's List student.

Miss Hardman's talent in the pageant was a gymnastic routine which she performed on a balance beam to the song "Close to You."

First runner-up was Miss Cheryl Lynn Chaddock. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles P. Chaddock of Gassaway. Miss Chaddock, 19, is a sophomore elementary major. She is a member of Delta Zeta sorority which she serves as treasurer and Ohnigohow Players. The pageant consisted of three major contests. They were the evening gown division, talent competition, and the bathing suit division. Cost Varies For W. Hall

With the completion of the new wing at Women's Hall, housing facilities will be much improved. The present building has center corridors with rooms on each side, but the new wing will have outside corridors and suites with four rooms and a bath to each suite.

The cost varies according to the number of students in each room, regardless of which wing the student chooses to stay in, or whether or not she is a West Virginia resident. Only rooms on fifth and sixth floors will accommodate up to three people.

Room rent, plus three per cent sales tax is as follows: two to a room, \$207.00; three to a room, \$198.00; four to a room, \$180.00.

There will be six one bedroom apartments which will rent for 75 dollars per person per month. These apartments can accommodate two persons, and if one student rents the apartment, it will be 85 dollars per month. If students do not rent all six apartments, unmarried female teachers will then be allowed to rent them. However, women students get first choice.

Telephone jacks will be installed in each suite in the new wing. If the women in the suite desire a phone to be installed, they must pay for it themselves.

The rooms will be painted in pastel colors. The furniture will have bright colors to match the walls. Rooms on first floor will be designed for the handicapped. The windows of the new wing will be small, for the future installation of air conditioning units. One large elevator will also be installed in the new wing.

Glenville Student Apathy Viewed; Seen As Fear Of Punitive Actions

Dear Editor:

Daily the complaints of Women's Hall inmates are heard echoing on campus. Alas, they seem to fall on deaf ears. Many are the persecuted, and my words to you are these: "Succumb to your fate. Fight not the powers mightier than mighty. For, here at GSC, the battle is lost before it is begun. It is over, really, before it is even conceived. We hear that we are apathetic. I say we are more likely doomed."

Remember the spring of '69—surely not one could say the students were apathetic then. We need a leader, it is said. I say, where are the followers? Oh, I condemn you not—I realize there is much to lose. Threats of expulsion, withholding of grades, social probation, or forfeit of financial assistance are far more than adequate to cause great contemplation before action. A prospective leader, or follower, would of necessity have to be a "tragic fool."

Yet, we see many such "fools" on other campuses. Take, for instance, the one who dared to question the regulations on the WVU campus—fate smiled on her. The case is recorded in the March 3 issue of the *News Leader*, of which the following is an excerpt: "The Resident Hall Association Judicial Appeals Board, at West Virginia University, overturned a University regulation requiring freshmen women dormitory residents to observe hours restrictions. The Residence Hall Association students appeals board upheld an appeal by a dormitory resident who had been restricted for one night after she returned to her dormitory, after the required time...the young woman...appealed on the grounds the restriction was too severe but argued her case on the ground that the hours restriction discriminated along sexual lines...the board upheld her appeal on the grounds that the State Board of Regents code of conduct forbids any student body from discriminating against a student because of sex."

It appears though, that at GSC, everything is unisexual. Even the Board of Regents seems to have no precedence here. We are isolated in our curse. We may pick a rose only to be pricked with the thorns. So—be apathetic if you wish. There seems to be little choice. At GSC, the rose by any other name smells just as sweet!!!!
