Apathy Is Apparent By Lack Of Voters

During the typical election at Glenville State College, 500 out of 1400 students take the five minutes necessary to sign their names, mark ballots, and get I.D. cards punched. Though Miss Sparks had a good argument for fear over apathy, this lack of enthusiasm on the part of students during elections is truly apathetic.

At Glenville where the Student Congress is the only chance for the student body to take any positive action in the direction of their desired goals it seems that students would be more willing to take time to vote for its members. Yet, last year far below half the enrollment voted. In other words, a minority is choosing the people who work for policy changes for all.

Do you know what the function of the Student Congress is? Do you know the candidates for membership to be voted on next week? Did you attend the platform meeting yesterday? Do you know what the past Congress has tried to achieve and what other steps they might have taken? If your answer is no to most of these, then perhaps you are one of those who falls under the apathetic category.

It is important we vote, particularly now when the Congress of the United States is working for the ratification by the many states of a law giving practically all college students full franchise. If we are uncaring here, doesn't that indicate that we may carry this attitude away from Glenville aftergraduation (or whatever)?

Algernon Moncrief, played by Harry Curlis, is the nephew of the aristocratic Lady Bracknell, played by Betsy Wingfield. He is compelled, by necessity, to lead a more or less double life so as to escape his aunt's dull dinner parties. Hence, he invents a fictitious friend, Bunbury, whose precarious state of health requires Algy's absence whenever he is summoned by his aunt.

Algernon's friend, John Worthing,

Algernon's friend, John Worthing, played by Gerald Ratliff, is also forced by circumstances to devise as escape plan. It is for a different reason, however. Worthing has under his care a young ward, Cecily Cardew, portrayed by Linda Potasnik, who lives at his country house. Worthing thinks it necessary to preserve a high moral tone in the presence of Cecily and her governess. To escape from this atmosphere of restraint, he invents an imaginary brother named Ernest. Ernest is supposed to be somewhat deprayed and Worthing assumes his name and mode of behavior during his frequent trips to London.

Both Algernon and John Worthing find themselves in love with two women who are, in turn, in love with the same man, the imaginary Ernest, whose identity Algernon and Worthing have both assumed.
