Childhood Ed. Open For Program Change

The Early Childhood Education Program at Glenville State College will be revised to meet new standards and to make it more relevant to present needs according to Dr. Delmer K. Somerville, Dean of the College. The West Virginia Board of Education has recently approved a revision of the current state standards for Early Childhood Education. Dean Somerville cruid node Education. Dean somervice served as chairman of the state-wide committee which developed the revised program. He has requested the faculty of the Division of Educa-tion and Psychology to study the current program and to recommend changes to the Committee on Teacher Education.

The new program will train teachers for Early Childhood in grades N-K-3 rather than for grades N-K-6. as provided by the current program.

Dean Somerville stated that "the 60th session of the West Virginia Legislature mandated a state-wide early childhood education program to go into full effect by the 1972-73 school year. This means that the demand for teachers who are certi-fied in this area will be in great demand. The revision of our present program will mean that we will have an up-dated program to meet the demand for better trained early childhood teachers. Glenville State College had the first such program in West Virginia and we intend to maintain adership in this area

Information regarding procedure for application is given, in addition to a listing of fellowship allocations to an institution, and the total number of programs approved in that state. Also, the name of each approved program in which fellowships may be awarded at an institution

A National Defense Graduate Fel-lowship is normally a 3-year award subject to the continued availability of appropriations and satisfactory stu-dent progress toward the degree. The award provides a stipend of

\$2,400 per 12-month year for the first year, \$2,600 for the second year, and \$2,800 for the third year, together with an allowance of \$500 a

genera with an allowance of \$500 a year for each dependent. Fellowship candidates apply di-rectly to graduate schools. These schools then send their nominations for awards to the Commissioner of Character Enteret Education. Fellowships are tenable only in the approved programs at the institutions to which they have been llocated. They are not transferable to another institution
