## Dr. Wallace To Give Talk

Dr. Alfred F. Wallace, pastor of Johnson Memorial United Methodist Church in Huntington, W. Va. will give the Baccalaureate sermon on Thursday evening, May 27, at 8:30 p.m.

A native of Hopewell, Va., Dr. Wallace received his A.B. degree from Fairmont State College. He attained his Bachelor of Divinity degree from Duke University's Divinity School and was awarded an Honorary D.D. from West Virginia Wesleyan College.

Dr. Wallace, a retired Lt. Col., served as a chaplain in the U.S. Army Air Force during World War II.

He is affiliated with the Rotary and Masonic organizations and also served as chairman of the United Fund Campaign for 1970 in the Huntington area.

Reverend D. Edward Bayer of the Trinity Methodist Church in Glenville will participate with Dr. Wallace at the Baccalaureate sermon.

## Dr. Holt Will Be Speaker For Graduation Exercises

Dr. Andrew Holt, former President Emeritus of the University of Tennessee will be the Commencement speaker for this year's graduation ceremonies scheduled for 10 a.m. Friday, May 28. Dr. Holt has served in virtually every capacity of the educational field and was awarded the highest honor that America's teachers can bestow upon a member of their profession—President of the National Education Association.

Dr. Holt's activities in the field of education include his former position as Chairman of the U.S. Delegation to the World Organization of the Teaching Profession at Berne, Switzerland; and his position as a charter member of the Steering Committee of the Education Commission of the States. Presently, Dr. Holt is serving as educational consultant to American School, Delta Air Lines, and Holiday Inns, Inc.

Aside from his educational activities, Dr. Holt is a member of the Board of Directors of the South Central Bell Telephone and Tele-

graph Co., the Hamilton National Insurance Corp., the Provident Life and Accident Insurance Co., and the Hamilton National Bank of Knoxville. He was recently appointed by President Nixon to serve on the Board of Governors of the U.S. Postal Service.

Last year Dr. Holt addressed over 200 national, regional, and state organizations in 20 states and Canada. In January and February of this year he and Mrs. Holt made a trip around the world during which he addressed Rotary Clubs, alumni, and business groups in various countries of Europe and Asia.

The Commencement ceremonies will also include a greeting from the Honorable John E. Amos who will be representing the W. Va. State Board of Regents. The Reverend Charles S. Scott, minister of the Glenville Baptist Church, will give the vocation and pronounce the benediction. The Honorable Frank E. Taylor will extend greetings on behalf of the GSC Advisory Board.

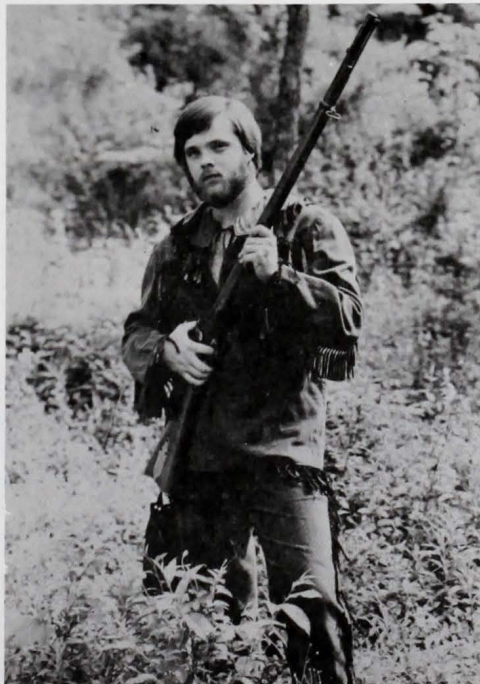

## Radio Station WGSC Defended In Spite Of Lack Of Financial Aid

Dear Editor:

I would like to take this opportunity to report to the students on the condition of their radio station. (Which according to President Wilburn is owned by the Board of Regents).

First of all, WGSC will not have a news service next year since the Board of Regents turned down the referendum. This veto was, however, contrary to the vote of the students. I guess I have been sadly mistaken by thinking that this was an educational institution which should want the students to keep up on current events. (I would like to compare notes concerning the cost of the wire with President Wilburn. Mine showed that we could afford it.)

Secondly, the studio renovation which was planned for last summer has not materialized. I guess it doesn't matter if we have to put up with background noise or with the heat since there is no ventilation in the control room.

As it stands now, those students not able to attend the home sports events will not be able to listen to them on the radio because the present policy set forth by the Athletic Committee forbids WGSC to broadcast home events to the dorms. (I guess it doesn't matter if the students have already paid to see the events).

The staff of WGSC is still not receiving any financial support for their continual 20-30 hour work week. Reports from the staff are that they do not wish to continue to sacrifice, for some, a third year, without pay. So what do we do next? This is not to mention the difficulty in finding personnel to fill the open positions.

Also we would like to apologize to the residents of Women's Hall because of the lack of a working transmitter. Their transmitter is on the way back to the shop after burning out five times. If everything goes well, they will be able to listen again in summer school.

On the lighter side, we are receiving more of the top music through the courtesy of the record industry, and we have expanded our hours to 3:00 p.m. to 1:00 p.m. Present plans call for broadcasting during summer school and hopefully this fall if an arrangement can be made with the Financial Aid Committee, plus expanded broadcasting of away sports events made possible through the raise in student fees.

The Ladies of the White Rose initiated seven girls Wednesday evening, May 12.

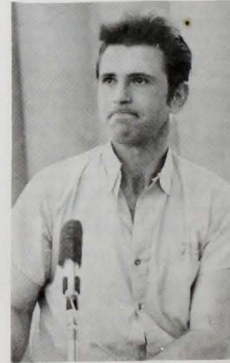

## Class Attendance Policy Is Adopted; Each Instructor Will Determine Limits

The policy concerning class attendance which was developed by an Ad Hoc Committee including members of the Attendance Committee, Academic Affairs Committee and an equal number of students, was recommended to President Wilburn and approved by the College Council on Friday, April 23, 1971. The policy will become effective with the beginning of the 1971-72 academic year August 23, 1971.

It is the policy of Glenville State

College that: 1) Class attendance regulations are to be determined by each instructor and plainly stated to all of his classes. 2) Absences such as those due to health, death in the family, or similar reasons should be reported to the instructor and the instructor provide an opportunity to make up the work missed. 3) Institutional absences are to be approved by the Dean of the College and honored by each instructor. Institutional absences include those which result from participation in an activity sponsored by the college such as activities music, field trips and other activities approved by the academic dean. Students who are absent for such reasons are expected to make up their work but should receive no undue penalty. 4) If irregular attendance is endangering the class work of the student the instructor is to so inform the student by letter with a copy of the letter to the Division Chairman, the Dean of the College, and the Student's Advisor. 5) In the event the instructor recommends suspension from class because of irregular attendance his recommendation is subject of the approval of the Chairman of the Division and the Dean of the College. The student is to be notified in writing of the recommended suspension. 6) The student is to be notified in writing by the Dean of the College of the action taken. If the student is suspended from class he may appeal his suspension to the Academic Affairs Committee with the right to be present and have counsel, either a fellow student, faculty member or parents, at the hearing. The appeal, in writing, is to be submitted to the Chairman of the Academic Affairs Committee within 5 days of his suspension.

## Student Congress Sponsors Meeting

Approximately 112 women students attended a meeting on May 18 with President D. Banks Wilburn as speaker. The meeting was sponsored by the Student Congress.

At the meeting, Dr. Wilburn gave his reasons for recommending to the Board of Regents that women's closing hours for next year be 10 p.m. Sunday-Thursday and 2 a.m. Friday-Saturday. He stated that he based his decision on these factors: 1. on what the college can afford and 2. on the replies he received from the women's parents. Dr. Wilburn also stated that his recommendation had not been acted upon yet by the Board.

The Student Congress also had the women fill out surveys which depicted their views on women's hours. A copy of each participating woman's survey will be sent to her and her parents will be asked to either confirm or reject their decision as being like that of their daughter.

During first semester, sociology 425-"Community Development: The Process" will be taught. This will be a revised course; a similar course was taught a few years ago.

A new course Sociology 403-"Community Development: Problems" will be taught second semester.

The courses will be taught by Dr. Ronald Burke of the Community Development Center. The courses will provide opportunities for students to have academic as well as field experience in learning how committees function in solving their problems.

The courses are elective courses and may be used toward meeting the 15 hours of required work necessary for a minor in sociology.

## Advent Of '71 Semester Brings Foundation Studies

Commencing with the 1971 fall semester, a program of foundation studies in reading, English, mathematics, and science will be offered to students who might, in the judgment of the college and the student, benefit from this special instruction. Since this is the first year of the Foundation Studies Program, the College will probably be unable to serve all students who will qualify.

Realize that each student's particular academic strengths and weaknesses will vary, GSC is offering a program which will permit four phases of placement of students as they are admitted to the College:

(1) Advance placement: College credit may be given in certain courses and the student would enroll in the next level course; (2) regular college-level course; (3) combination of foundation courses and regular college-level courses; (4) a combination of, all of these.

Glenville State College revised its admission policy in such a manner that more young people might take advantage of this special program and in turn improve their chances of completing a college education.

The revised admission policy as it pertains to West Virginia residents, which was approved by the West Virginia Board of Regents on May 11, 1971, is as follows:

To be admitted to Glenville State College a person must have been graduated from an approved high school with a minimum of 17 units. A person 18 years of age or older who was not graduated from an approved West Virginia high school may be admitted on the basis of an interview and test evaluation. If it is determined that any person being admitted may benefit from a foundation studies program, he may be required to complete satisfactorily certain foundation studies prior to being

fully admitted to a degree-granting program. The College reserves the right to evaluate special cases and to refuse admission to a person when considered advisable in the best interest of the person and the College.

According to President D. Banks Wilburn, "We do not in any way, suggest that academic standards be relaxed or that admission provide entry for those who will not or could not benefit from post high school education. We are, however, deeply concerned about the hundreds of students who have the potential to succeed, but do not. It is our firm belief, that the foundation studies program and the revised admissions policy will provide the necessary implements for reaching capable students and for providing a margin of success for those who elect to continue their education beyond high school."

## Dr. David Smith Invited To Deliver Fall Address

Dr. David Smith, head of the Forestry Department, has been invited by the Council of Forestry School Executives to address the Society of American Foresters annual meeting on the subject of 'Goals in Technician Training Programs.' This meeting will be this fall on Sept. 25. The meeting is also usually attended by Canadian Forestry Representatives.

Dr. Smith will be chairman of the American Council of Technical Forestry Schools Executives meeting in Cleveland on Sept. 26. There will be a total of 70 forest technology schools represented, from the U.S. and Canada.

The remaining portion of the staff will be selected by the new staff members. The positions include sports staff, layout staff, art staff, business staff, copywriters and proofreaders.

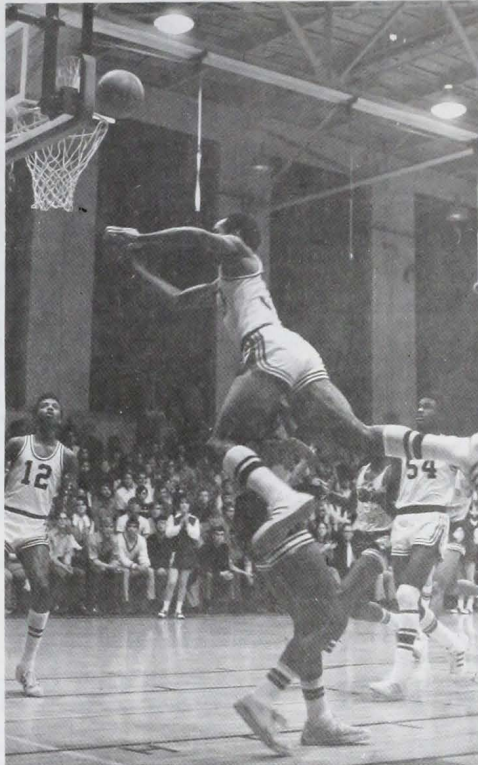

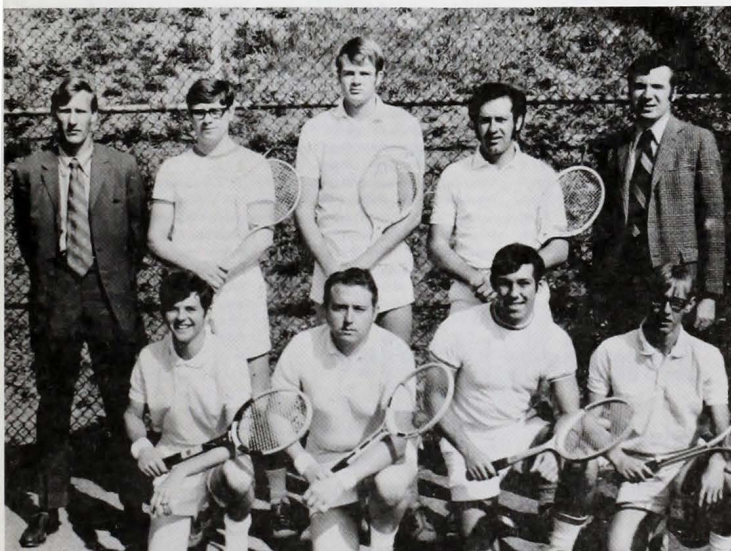

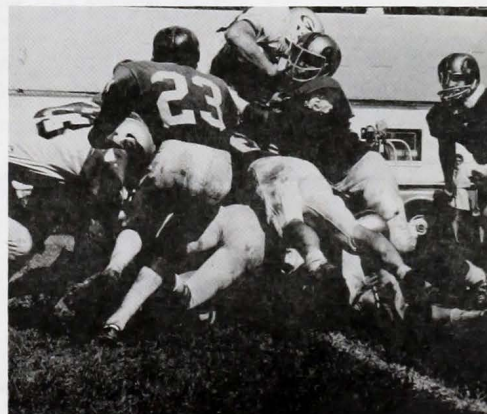
