
The library has two Microfiche Readers located on the first floor. The Microfiche, which is the film used in the reader, is at the circulation desk. Presently the library has only ser-

The Society of American Foresters has recognized Glenville State College as exceeding the basic requirements of SAF's Minimum Guideline for Forest Technician Training. Glenville is one of 36 forest technician schools which were found to meet the SAF Minimum Guideline, 32 of which are in the United States and four in Canada. It is also the only school so recognized in West Virginia.

Singing star and sex idol Tom Jones appeared at the Charleston Civic Center Friday, July 16. A sell-out crowd waded through some really good entertainment by back-up groups but seemed a little on the disinterested side until Jones appeared. The band called "Jeff Sturgis Universe" and a female trio known as "The Blossoms" entertained the audience for about an hour. Then, after a 15-minute intermission, comedian Pat Henry warmed up the audience for Jones' appearance with some bright but often off-color material.
