# Pioneers Crush Bobcats, Led By HB Carl Alloway

The Glenville State Pioneers led by the running of halfback Carl Alloway crushed the Wesleyan Bobcats 43-10 for their first victory of the season here Saturday afternoon.

Alloway scored three half touch-downs and rushed for 150 yards in the first half. Alloway's touch-downs came on runs of 65 yards, seven yards, and 12 yards.

The Pioneers led at the midway point 19-3 and added three TD's and a Ray Swisher field goal while the Blue Bandits allowed Wesleyan only one touchdown in the final half.

The first Pioneer score came when Carl Alloway raced seven yards for a TD. The score was set up when Paul Ashby punted the ball into the Bobcat coffin corner at the two yard line. The Bobcats moved the ball to the 15 yard line when a fumble on the handoff was recovered by Pioneer Bob Lipscomb. The offense then took quick advantage of the break and scored in three plays. Swisher's point from placement was true and Glenville led 7-0.

The Bobcats moved the ball to the Pioneer five yard line before their drive stalled and Joe Calaci booted a 27 yard field goal.

Moments later the Pioneers scored again when Alloway capped an 80 yard drive with a twelve yard spurt into the end zone. The kick by Swisher was wide and the Pioneers led 13-3. The drive was led by the running of Alloway and quarterback Randy Jeffries.

With less than two minutes in the first half Carl Alloway took a handoff form Jeffries on his own 35 yard stripe and raced straight through the Bobcat defense 65 yards for a score. The try for the point by Swisher was blocked. The half-time scofe was Pioneers 19 - Wesleyan

The second half was all Glenville

as the Pioneers scored 17 points in the third period. The Pioneers scored when Roger Bonnette picked off a Bobcat pass and returned it to the Wesleyan 22 yard line. A 15 yard pass play from Jeffries to Ken Morrison set up a one yard plunge for the score by Mike Robinson. A two point conversion from Jeffries to Morrison was good and Glenville led 27-3.

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Wesleyan then drove 83 yards with Dennis Hingensmith going in from five yards out. Joe Calaci kicked the point and the score stood at Pioneers 27 - Wesleyan 10. Ray mond Swisher put Glenville in the board again with a 36 yard field goal. The last score of the third quarter came when "Ramblin" Randy Jeffries tossed a five yard scoring strike to wide receiver Richard Richmond to complete a 44 yard drive. The try for the point by Swisher was blocked.

The final score came when Glenville lined up for a Swisher field goal attempt. Wesleyan rushed everybody and Jeffries cooly dropped back and hit Mike Robinson in the end zone for a 17 yard score. Swisher kicked the point and the 43-10 score in favor of the Pioneers was final.
