The Vanguard Theatre is a pro fessional Pittsburgh-centered mobile theatre now completing its ninth year of operation under the management of Marcelle Felser, Creative Director; Thomas P. Struthers, Technical Director and Miriam M. Cherin. Administrative Director.

The original emphasis of the Vanguard Theatre was at the high school level, bringing fully-mounted productions into the high schools on a regularly scheduled basis, during the school day. Since 1962 Vanguard has toured 16 productions into high schools in and around Pittsburgh, playing to more than 500,000 young

This is the third annual College Tour of the Vanguard Theatre and will reach an even larger area than previously covered, going as far as 200 miles from Pittsburgh. The anticipated schedule for this year will provide for approximately 30 dates, on 26 campuses, with several days of experimental workshop sessions

The play is being sponsored by the Convocation-Lyceum Committee and affords students at GSC an opportunity to view the literary merits of a great playwright. Curtain time is promptly at 8 p.m.

Six New Courses Added To Schedule

However, Blue Bandit tackle Gary (Deacon) Jones knocked the ball loose from State's Singleton and Bob Lipscomb, the other Blue Bandit tackle, played Johnny-on-the-spot and recovered the fumble. From there, freshman quarterback Chris Anderson took over Anderson came in and fired a 17 yard pass to Rich Richmond and then an 11-yard strike to Ken Morrison. Moments later Anderson tossed a 39 yard bomb to freshman receiver Steve Buffington for a touchdown. Swisher's PAT was perfect and Glenville led

The Pioneers scored again in the final quarter on a 53 yard drive. The big play in the drive was a 35 yard pass from Anderson to Randy Modesitt. John Pratt scored his second TD of the day when he crashed over from the State two yard line behind the blocking of Harland Spencer, Craig Lipscomb, and Irvin Braniff. Swisher again added the PAT and the Pioneers won 21-2.
