Convocation Set for Tues.

Glenville State will honor its first century with a convocation set for Tuesday, Jan. 25, in the College auditorium. Mistress-of-ceremonies will be Mrs. Yvonne King, instructor in journalism.

The opening introduction, by Mrs. King, will be followed by slides and commentary. Mr. John Spears will present the slides which were arranged by Dr. James G. Jones and Mr. Nelson Wells. Intermingled with the slides will be songs, dances, and costume modeling.

Background music and accompaniments will be presented by M. S. (Mike) Barnhouse. The Barbershop Quartet will sing a special selection, "Aura Lee" from the 1900's. Members of the Quartet are Irvin Hoyt, Dave Bush, Dale Miller, and Rick Butler.

The dances will range between the years of 1920 and 1970. Anna Tassan, sophomore at Charleston Catholic High School, will be dancing to "Five Foot Two" right out of the 1920's. Stephanie Shimer and Randy Hunt, freshmen students at Glenville State, will dance adagio to the 1940 "Warsaw Concerto." The period from 1960 to 1970 will be presented by a jazz and acrobatic routine presented by Connie Pecozzi, instructor of dance at "Connie's School of Creative Dance" in Charleston.

The costumes depicting different eras in Glenville State history will be modeled by individual girls from the three social sororities on campus. Sigma Sigma Sigma will model the 1900's costumes, 1920's clothing will be modeled by Delta Zeta girls and Alpha Sigma Alpha will model the clothing from the 1970's.

There will be a display of clothing from the different eras inside the auditorium. Both the clothes for the display and modeling are a contribution of Miss Alice Arbuckle; former GSC librarian, Mrs. Nelson Wells, and Mrs. Fern Rollyson.

The GSC choral group, under the direction of James Baldwin, will offer a live presentation of the Alma Mater.

The convocation of Glenville State's first century or "The Times they are A Changing" will cover the periods of 1872, 1900, 1920's, 1930's, 1940's, 1960's, and 1970's.

The convocation is admission free and open to the public.

Stage property and lighting committees are being handled by Mr. Gerald Ratliff and Douglas Morrison; instrumental music handled by Mr. David Harry; and public address system and taping by Dr. Byron J. Turner.

The Centennial historical committee is in charge of the convocation, according to Dr. Delmer K. Somerville, chairman and Director of the Centennial. Members of the committee include: Dr. James G. Financial Estimation Explained, Outlined

The Loans and Scholarship Committee met Jan. 11 to approve basic need costs for financial aid for the academic year of 1972-73. The results are:

The only changes from this year's costs are a \$36 increase in board and the inclusion of \$450 in personal expenses in addition to the costs outlined on page 48 in the new College Bulletin. There is no change in tuition, fees, or room costs. Any activity fee increase must be passed by student vote.

Rounded off to the closest hundred, the base need is \$2400 for out-of-state students; \$1700 for in-state

students living in residence halls. Commuting student's total costs are \$1000; off-campus, non-commuting students, \$1200; living off-campus and out-of-state off-campus students, \$1900.

The base need is a variable, a formula filed with Health Education and Welfare office and used by the Financial Aid Office here on campus to evaluate student need. Financial need is based on a student's contribution (summer work-male is expected to earn \$300, female \$200) and parental contribution to his education. All contributions are deducted from base need to arrive at a figure needed for the student to attend college. Regardless of whether he earns summer wages, the need is figured on \$1400.

Information for parental contribution is derived from income information from the IRS 1040 form plus the number of dependents the parents have.

There will be increased financial aid next year, according to Dr. Alfred T. Billips, Dean of Student Affairs. The deadline for applications for financial aid is March 1, 1972.

Sams Joins Political Race

"Youth, honesty, and responsible leadership for Gilmer County" is the campaign slogan of a senior business administration major and history minor at Glenville State College who has "thrown his hat" in the local political contest for the position of sheriff of Gilmer County.

Ronald L. Sams, 21, a former Parkersburg resident and a graduate of Parkersburg South High School, filed for the office of sheriff of Gilmer County on Monday, Jan. 10. He will be running on the Democratic ticket; at the present, two other candidates have filed for this office.

When he was asked why he decided to run for the office, Sams replied that he felt "a better relationship between county and college" could be established if someone either directly or indirectly associated with the College were elected to a county position.

Sams also stated that he felt that future enrollment at GSC would be

given "a good shot in the arm" if the students were to have a voice in the local government.

Although campaign managers have not yet been named, Sams has already formulated general campaign plans. He plans to utilize posters and letters in his campaign as well as personal contact with the people of Gilmer County. In addition to seeking the support of the campus Young Democrats organization, Sams is planning to personally appeal to other campus organizations for their support.

Sams is married to the former Nancy L. Miller and they are the parents of a 14-month-old son, Ronald L. Sams, II. They reside at 309 Powell Street in Glenville. For the past three years, Sams has been an active member of the GSC bowling team.

Sams also indicated that he would like to remain in Gilmer County after his graduation in May even if he loses the primary nomination for sheriff.

Voter Registration; A Student's Right!

Usually this newspaper is only concerned with campus problems, but a state and national event has direct bearing on the actions of Glenville State College students and deserves airing. On May 9 and then again on November 7, most of our students will be eligible to vote in national, state, and local elections because of the new voting laws allowing 18-year-olds the franchise.

Politics is a cut-throat business and the last few weeks have been no encouraging example for the new voters. Yet, college students are among the most informed and best qualified of all voters.

It is essential that new voters register and vote. Why? Do you like the way the Nixon administration has handled the Vietnam War and the economy? Do you feel that all the corruption we've experienced in West Virginia is really being arrested? Do you really like the way the police officers in Gilmer County enjoy serving the college students?

As you are most certainly aware, you must register. But you may not be aware that the law states you must register by March 10 — 60 days before the primary. Qualifications to register in Gilmer County are simply that you must have been a West Virginia resident for at least one year and have lived in this precinct 60 days prior to May 9.

If you are wondering whether to register in Gilmer County or your home county, you might remember that for most of your college days you will be in Gilmer County and are expected to follow the laws and officials of it. That means that if you decide not to vote in Glenville, you will have no say concerning curfew hours, opening or closing of local establishments, and the laws governing arrest and incarceration of college students.

This year, with at least one GSC student running for county office and many more contests of vital concern to us, we should make a promise to ourselves to take the five minutes needed to stop at the county clerk's office in the Gilmer County Courthouse.

"We can make a difference" as you have heard many times. A lot of people are holding their breath in anticipation over the amount of new voters who will actively participate in the coming election. A college student was elected mayor of Newcomerstown, Ohio, because students made their majority vote count. If you don't do it in Glenville, it won't get done!

In the past, I feel that I have been very fair and reasonable. I want to continue to be that way with your help. In the future, I will need a great deal of co operation from those of you who give a darn about the House. Please do not bring any liquor or minors into the House. Remember, I am open for you, not for your money. Everyone is welcome as long as they don't cause trouble. Help me help you! Let's keep the House of the Rising Sun from setting!

Panhellenic, a council governing sororities on this campus, has established rules that will be in effect during this rush period. The following will be a guideline to all those interested in rushing a sorority.

Those eligible are all women who have 12 accumulative hours and a 2.0 minimum grade point average.

Formal rush will begin with a rush party sponsored by Panhellenic on Jan. 23 at 7 p.m. in the Ballroom. In the following 2 weeks each sorority will hold 3 rush parties. The first week each sorority will hold an informal coke party. The second week formal rush begins with formal theme parties and preference parties, all of which are by invitation.

At the joint rush party a statement with cost information as well as displays will be presented to each rusher.

All invitations to all rush parties are RSVP at the Panhellenic Office (Office of the Dean of Women) by 4 p.m. the day of the party.

A silence period (a period of time during which no communication is permitted between sorority women and rushees) will be observed by all sororities from 5:00 p.m. the day of the preferential parties until 4 p.m. the following day when each sorority will meet and recognize their pledges.

On the night of the preference parties, any woman desiring to pledge a sorority must sign and indicate her sorority preference in the office of the Dean of Women between 9 and 10 p.m.

The Dean of Women will notify each prospective pledge who has been given a bid by a sorority; and the prospective pledge may accept a bid in the office of the Dean of Women on the day after the bids are signed at 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

In their opening home appearance the Glenville Pioneers' matmen, showing good conditioning, soundly defeated the Concord Mountain Lions by a score of 49-6.

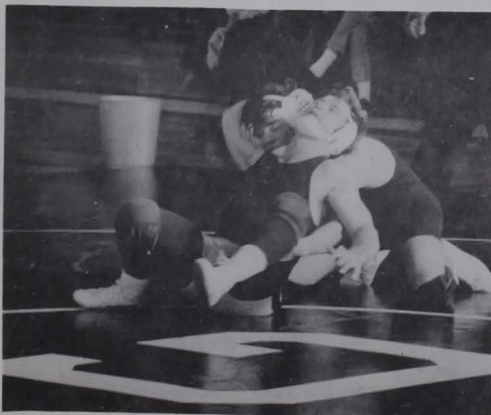

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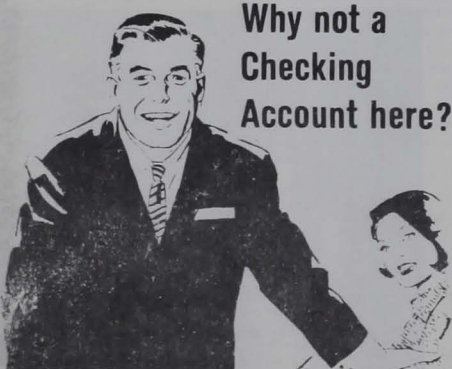
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Vet Club Shows Top-Rated Films
