Latos entered two ceramic pieces in the art show which was open to all Wheeling tri-state artists receiving instruction. Both of Latos' pieces were stoneware lidded jars. The winning selection was glazed dark brown with a leaf design on the front. It was approximately ten inches tall.

Gerald Ratliff Announces GSC Drama Performance

Mr. Gerald Ratliff is announcing his farewell dramatic performance at Glenville State College. He is joining the staff of UCLA but will direct the play, Marat/Sade, this semester.

The play is by Peter Weiss and Mr. Ratlifff has received permission to rewrite sections of it. In 1965 the play won the Drama Critics award and the Tony award.

The play concerns inmates of Charenton Asylum who were confined for political and social reasons. Among the inmates were Marquis De Sade who was condemned for his pornographic writings. While there, he stages various plays with the inmates to pass time.

The GSC performance will combine acting, music, song, dance, and pantomine. It will be representative of total involvement theatre in which members of the cast will talk directly to the audience; enter and exit through the auditorium and directly confront members of the audience by harrassing them.

The climax of the tragedy results when the patients turn on their keepers and mutilate them. The lesson is obvious.

Tryouts for Marat/Sade will be held this Monday at 6 p.m. in the auditorium. The director is seeking unusual types who can-dance, sing, or play a musical instrument and who have periods of insanity they

would like to share with other students and faculty members.

The cast will be announced next week and it will have 15-20 members.

GSC Forestry Program Registers 11 With SAF

According to a letter from Donald R. Theol, Director of Professional Programs, Glenville State College now has 11 members of Forest Technology enrolled as members of Society of American Foresters. This is surpassed only by Paul Smith College, New York, with 47 registered with the society.

GSC is the only college in the United States which offers the forestry program directly on campus.

Board Of Regents' Ruling For Dorms Is Announced

All unmarried students (freshmen, sophomores, juniors, and seniors) under 21 years of age who do not commute and who do not reside with their immediate families (parents, legal guardians, grandparents, brothers or sisters) are required to reside on campus in the College's residence halls so long as space is available. (This regulation has been established by the West Virginia Board of Regents in keeping with the bond agreement between the Board and the Federal Government and private bondholders).

Procedures and circumstances for exceptions include: financial hard-ship-all students applying for financial exceptions must apply for financial aid to the Financial Aids Office. If the student shows financial need and is unable to obtain aid from the college his request for exception will be considered. Documentation will be required from the Financial Aid Office; medical reasons-students requesting exceptions to the housing policy because of special medical problems must furnish written confirmation from a physician to effect: (1) a medical problem does exist; (2) how long the condition has existed: (3) last date treated for the condition; and (4) estimated duration of the condition; residing with relatives-requests based on this will have to be substantiated with a written statement from the relative (s) The statement must contain: (1) their relationship to the student; (2) the full address of the relative(s); and (3) their agreement to housing the student for the semester; residence with employer-if a student is required, as a condition of his employment to reside with his employer, a written confirmation of such arrangement from the employer must be attached to the application.

All requests for exceptions to the policy must be presented on an official form provided by the Office of Student Affairs. It is the students' responsibility to attach to this form all substantiating information outlined under procedures. Incomplete requests will not be accepted. Completed forms are to be returned to the Office of Student Affairs.

Exceptions will be granted on semester or summer session basis unless certain circumstances would justify granting an exception for the academic year; therefore, all students who may be granted an exception must request renewal if an exception is desired for the following semester or summer term.

Requests for exceptions must be presented no later than May 1, for

the summer term, August 1, for the fall term, and December 1, for the spring term.

After a decision to approve or deny a request has been made, the decision will be communicated in writing to the student by the Dean of Women or the Dean of Men.

Reed & Barton Offer Valuable Awards

During the months of February and March, Reed & Barton, America's oldest major silversmiths, are conducting a "Silver Opinion Competition" in which valuable scholarships totalling \$2,500 are being offered to duly enrolled women students at a few selected colleges and universities.

In the 1972 "Silver Opinion Competition," an entry form illustrates twelve designs of sterling with eight designs of both china and crystal. Scholarships and awards will be made to those entries matching or coming closest to the unanimous selections of Table-Setting editors from three of the nation's leading magazines.

Glenville Defeats Eagles; Loses To Davis and Elkins

Glenville vs Morris Harvey

The Glenville State Pioneers fighting off a strong Morris Harvey rally defeated the Golden Eagles by a score of 57-56.

Morris Harvey led only once in the game at 1-0 on a free throw by Wesley. From there on the Pioneers took over and jumped out to a nine point lead throughout most of the game

The Golden Eagles regrouped in final five minutes and began to cut the Glenville lead down. seconds to go the score was 57-54 in favor of the Pioneers. Glenville dropped back as Jim Garnett missed a one-and-one situation; Kevin Merchant made the final Eagle points with only a couple seconds left

Steve Datcher led the Pioneers in scoring with 20 points. Ron Jones had 12 points and Earl Hawkins added 11. Datcher and Hawkins also top rebounding honors with 12. The Pioneers had a total of 44

From the floor Glenville shot making 24 of 63 Pioneers hit only 9 of 20 from the charity stripe.

Glenville vs Wesleyan

Glenville built up a fantastic 50-16 lead at the half and went on to take an easy 94-55 victory over the Bob-cats of Wesleyan College.

Balanced scoring was the main feature in the Pioneers' easy triumph. Steve Datcher tallied 20 points for the winners with Earl Hawkins, Dale Tawney, Ron Jones, and Ralph Cook all putting in 12 points.

Glenville hit 38 of 89 shots for a

44% shooting average. The Pioneers made 18 of 24 free throws.

Coach Lilly's cagers pulled down season high total of 64 rebounds. Steve Datcher led the Pioneers with 11 snatches.

Glenville vs Concord

Glenville's highly touted defense completely shut off the Mountain Lions of Concord as the Pioneers blitzed past out-manned Concord,

Star forward Steve Datcher gunned in 22 of his 31 points in the first half and sparked the Glenville Pioneers to a 88-80 over West Virginia State last Saturday.

The Yellow Jackets were in front 22-21 at the 10 minute mark in the first half, but then Datcher began finding the mark tossing in 14 points during the final 10 minutes pushing Glenville in front. The Pioneers held a tight 45-43 lead at the half.

State scored first in the se and the Jackets led briefly at 47-45 on a goal by Dwight Street

After that, Glenville steadily pulled away after intermission and was on top 67-57 with 12 minutes left. The Pioneers held their biggest lead of the game 82-62, with about five minutes left.

Coach Lilly began clearing his bench at this point with the reserves finishing the rest of the game.

Datcher led both teams in scoring despite the fact of sitting out the last eight minutes of the game.

Earl Hawkins took up where Datcher left off in the second half com-ing through with 12 points. Hawkins finished with 23 points, grabbed 12 rebounds and blocked four Yellow

Other Pioneers in double figures Ken Ledbetter with 12 points and Ron Jones with 11.

NEH Conducts Programs For Support of Humanities

Washington, D.C. - The National Endowment for the Humanities has begun a program of grants for support of humanities porjects initiated and conducted by young peo-ple. NEH thereby becomes one of the few Federal agencies so involved. Announcement of the new program was made by Dr. Ronald S. Berman, the Endowment's Chairman, who said that NEH is encouraging projects effective immediately.

Created in line with a recommendation made last year by the National Council on the Humanities, the new program-called "Youthgrants in the Humanities"-will consider applications from both students and young persons out of school. In announcing the program, Mr. Berman des-cribed it as "an important thrust in the Endowment's continuing efforts to interest and involve all sectors of the population in the humanities." The program will offer young people an opportunity to translate their educational and ethical concerns into concrete projects and to reflect critically on their own beliefs and values as well as those held by the larger society

March 17th has been set as the first deadline for "Youthgrants" applications for projects scheduled to begin during the summer or fall of 1972. Proposals will be evaluated comparatively by a panel of young people prior to submission to the National Council of the Humanities, which makes final recommendations all applications for Endowment
