Raise In Entertainment Fees Proposed To Provide Bigger Name Performers

A noticable desire on the part of GSC students for both additional and bigger name entertainment prompted proposal of an increase in student entertainment fee

The Convocation-Lyceum Commitresponsibility is that of providing cultural and light entertaining programming, has been func-tioning for several years with one of the lowest budgets of all West Virginia colleges and universities. The budget has been limited to some \$6,500 a year, yet despite a small increase of fifty cents per student per semester, this past year the budget has not grown. The decline in enrollment since 1969 of about 200 full time students brought about a decline in the budget. thus making the 1969 budget of \$2 GSC Students Invited per person, per semester as large as our current budget of \$2.50 per student, per semester.

Fees throughout the state range from \$2-\$25 a semester which in turn is multiplied by the number of full time students. Currently GSC students paying a fee that ranks near the bottom in comparison with other while the colleges enter-

tainment budget is the state's lowest.
It is not difficult to understand the problems of trying to provide programming of both quality and quantity with a budget of \$6,500 while other schools in the state are operating on \$20,000 to \$300,000 per year.

The request for a fee increase and subsequent referendum should clearly represent the students' desires of more and better entertainment. The change in fee would increase both quality and quantity of current


programming and bring at least one big program a year, or with selective shopping, possibly two big name choices such as Ace Trucking Co., Sha Na Na, Tommy, If, or Superstar. The increase of \$2.50 per student, per semester would give a working budget of \$13,000 for 1973-74. Any fee increase less than that proposed would not provide the kind of entertainment! most generally mentioned and pro-posed by students. Thus the Convocation-Lyceum Committee urges full consideration and approval of the proposed increase. The referendum will be held Feb. 6, and all students are

Defense of the GSC Yearbook

This year's yearbook, which recently came in was the subject of many conversations, at least for a few days. People have hated it, and others have liked it. It is my purpose here to answer some of the "charges" against the Kanawhachen, to explain a few things, and to justify a few more. Now, my authority on yearbook production is somewhat limited, because I have never

authority on yearbook production is somewhat imited, occause I nave never worked on one, but I have had a class entitled "High School Newspaper and Yearbook Production" in which I learned a few of the basics.

The biggest complaint was its lateness. This, I agree, should never have happened. However, the fault here was the GSC photographer who never got around to taking or developing pictures, consequently leaving the yearbook very stuck for pictures. As a result, the duty of getting pictures was left to Chuck White, the Mercury photographer who not only takes pictures for the Mercury, but for weddings, brochures, sorority and fraternity composites, ball teams, and play casts, and 90,000 other things. Chuck is to be commended for getting anything done at all. The other photographer must have had some really good reason for letting the school down, like a girl, or a fraternity or

Some people said that pictures of underclassmen should have been included. There is validity to this complaint. When someone asks a student if they know so-and-so, they might not be able to find them in the yearbook. A yearbook is a sort of social-reference book. On the other hand, for whom is the yearbook except for seniors? And their pictures are included. There is also something to be said against "mug shots". Maybe it's my imagination, but it seems to me that such pictures always make the better looking people look gorgeous, and people like me that "need a break" look like they've been run over by a truck. Also, my sources tell me that only about 300 underclassmen showed up to have their pictures taken. But that's par for the course around here: don't show up to have your picture taken and then scream when its not in the yearbook

As for the Kansas City NAIA pictures, what happened was this. The printer put the wrong color down first, and then put the other on top of it. It was supposed to look like the pictures on pages 4 and 5. Meanwhile, look at them under a black light. You ought to be able to see them, then, and if you're in a

good mood you'll have fun, too.

Another slip of the printer's was that they were supposed to put a page in the center telling the readers to turn the book around. But if you're not smart enough to do that without being told, read it upside down, I don't care.

Two arguments against the yearbook don't even deserve rebuttal. One is that the yearbook is "too much art." But what is a yearbook except photographic artistry? Another is that it was too full of centennial pictures. I think it is only proper for a book, the purpose of which is primarily reminiscence. printed in a year when every activity was centered around reminiscence, be

composed of those remembrances of the past.

True, the 1972 Kanawhachen has it's faults. Few will dispute that. But it is a reminder of our Centennial year.

Solutions Suggested For Parking

It has been almost a year since the Glenville State College basketball team went to Kansas City to play in the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) tournament. At that time I wrote a letter to the editor of the Mercury denouncing the parking situation here.

In my letter to the editor I suggested a commuter parking lot be estab-

lished. I also suggested that more space be needed. Neither has been accomplished although parking was included in the Board of Regents plan for this

The only progress in this parking situation, since the NAIA tournament, s been the paving of the large parking lot below the Administration building. Although this didn't increase the available space, it did add to the convenience of parking in that lot.

On two mornings of this semester I arrived here with about ten or 15 minutes left before class. By the time I had checked all parking lots and found that I had to park about five minutes'walk away, I had little time left. One of the mornings I was late for class; another I had about five minutes before On one of these mornings I also noticed Dean Jean Wright having trouble finding a place to park and she had a reserved staff spacethat I didn't have available to me.

I believe that the immediate answer to the parking problem is to enforce no parking stickers rule for anyone under 21, unless they commute. This would make more spaces available for those who do not live within a five minute walk of the school. A better solution, but more expensive and one that would take more time to make available, would be another 25-50 space

Although the ones who are in the best position to do something ab the parking situation are the least affected (which is usually the case at GSC) the ones of us who are most affected should let them know our feelings on the subject and get something done if not for us at least for those to follow

Glenville State College broke open a tight ballgame the first ten minutes of the second half to go from a 29 - 27 halftime lead to a Sc lead with 9:25 left in the contest, enroute to a 78 - 52 victory over Beckley College Friday night.

The Pioneers shot poorly in the first half as the blue wave did not make a field goal until Steve Datcher's layup with 14:22 remaining in the half. The game was tied four times at 8, 10, 12 and 14 before the Pioneers held a 25 - 21 lead with 2:45 to go in the half.

Beckley came roaring back on six straight points by Mike Wicks to give the Hawks a brief 27 - 25 lead. Ron Jones came right back on o layups to give the G-men a - 27 lead at half.

The Pioneers came out running and shooting the second half to outscore Beckley 27 - 4 the first ten minutes of the half. Earl Hawkins,

Steve Datcher and Ralph Cook con bined for 20 points during this period of play. Many of these baskets came off fast break situations set up by the fine passing of Jim Garnett and Gene King, who had replaced Ron Jones when "Itchy" picked up his fourth foul with 17:19 remaining in the game. John Hudson also did a fine job replacing Steve Datcher who picked up his fourth foul with 14:17 to go in the half.

The blue wave stretched a 56 - 31 lead out to 76 - 48 with 1:05 in the contest before rolling up the final count of 78 - 52.

GSC was led in scoring by Earl Hawkins with 20 points. John Hud-son, Steve Datcher and Ron Jones came in with 14, 13 and 10 markers respectively.
