gree of Doctor of Jurisprudence.

Judge Haden was married Priscilla Ann Miller on June 2, 1956 Mrs. Haden is a teacher in the Kana wha County, West Virginia, schools. The Hadens are the parents of three hildren, Charles H., III, Timothy Michael, and Amy Sue

In professional life, Judge Haden has been practicing attorney, teacher, and public official. He has served in all three branches of State Government: West Virginia Legislature, House of Delegates, 1963-64; State Tax Commissioner, 1969-72; Judge, Supreme Court of Appeals of West Virginia by appointment by Governor Arch A. Moore, Jr., on June 21, 1972, to fill the unexpired term of the late Judge Frank C. Haymond, and Judge Haden vas elected to the office on Novem-

GSC To Offer Two-Year Assoc. Science Degree

Beginning in June 1973, Glenville State College will offer a new Paraprofessional Education Program. This two-year terminal program leads to an Associate in Science Degree. The 64 credit hours comprising

The 64 credit hours comprising the Paraprofessional Program for Teacher Aides have been selected to afford the student a beneficial combination of theoretical and practical course work. Upon completion of the program, the student will have received adequate background and experience to function effectively as either a clerical or instructional aide in the public schools. The program is designed to accommodate the professional interests of the student in that he may concentrate on becoming an early childhood, elementary, or secondary school paraprofessional.

The new offering in Paraprofessional Education will be of interest not only to those prospective students aspiring to become paraprofessionals in education, but also to those persons presently employed as teachers aides who wish to upgrade their employment status. A unique feature of this new program is that the course requirements leading to the Associate in Science Degree may be readily applied to the four-year Baccalaureate Degree if the student should later elect to seek a teaching degree.


