## **New Profile Sheets** Introduced In Fall

One of the latest data-gathering instruments initiated by the College is the Student Profile Sheet. To be completed by each student during the registration process, the Student Prefile Sheet is designed to secure essential information about the student to provide cumulative numerical data for the West Virginia Board of Regents, state and federal governments, and appropriate accrediting agencies.

To expedite the registration process, each student is encouraged obtain a Student Profile Sheet (including an illustration and a coding sheet) from his advisor and then com plete it prior to entering the Ballroom of Pioneer Center. Upon submitting his form, the student then proceeds to enroll in classes.

The Student Profile Sheets will then be processed by personnel in the Computer Center. More than three million keystrokes will be necessary to prepare the information for computer utilization and the eventual reports.

the procedure progresses satis-If factorily, there's a plus for the student! Instead of having to complete a new Profile Sheet each semester, the student will review a printout of his previous data to determine whether it is presently appropriate. The student will provide only new information or indicate changes since completing the last form

### Registration Aids To Help

For the first time at Glenville State College, registering students will find student advisers (peer advisers) available in the registration area to assist them in making schedule changes. If a student finds that the section which he has scheduled is closed out, he can go to the peer advising table for assistance in selecting time and professor.

It should be pointed out, however, that if a student needs to substitute one course for another (i.e., history for English), then he should ask for assistance from his faculty adviser. The peer advisers have been selec-

ted on the basis of registration exper-ience and have been thoroughly briefed on the new procedure.

### New, Successful Classes Reinstated This Fall Sem.

Two successful ventures last Fall have again been incorporated into this year's schedule. Mrs. Sandy Lessig, Director of the Wendy Ward program in Parkersburg, will provide instruction in modeling and personal development for young women at Glenville State College. Two classes have been scheduled – one begins at 2:00 p.m. on Thursday and the second one begins at 3:30 p.m. on the same day. Classes will meet from August 30 until October 4. No textbooks are required for this course and no special fees are collected

Among the course topics for this course, which is offered as Business 399, are: modeling, personality development, poise, good nutrition habits, proper body posture, good grooming, clothing selection, and etiquette. The class is available to young women enrolled on campus on a first-come, first-enrolled basis. Each section will be limited to approximately twentyfive students.

A number of students have requested a course in business machines. The purpose of this course would be to provide instruction on electronic calculators, adding machines, printing calculators, offset and spirit duplicating machines, and the IBM Mag Card II automatic typewriter. Responding to student requests, the Division of Business is scheduling Business 399 – Section 03 – for spring 1974 at 7:30 on Wednesday nights from March 12 until May 7. The class is to be instructed by Mr. Smith.

RPG-II instruction will be provided this fall by Computer Center Director Mr. M. Gene Bailey. The class will meet on Monday evenings, beginning at 6:00. RPG-II, which represents Report Program Generator, is the primary language of new IBM systems. Programming in the College's Computer Center is heavily oriented toward RPG-II, although FORTRAN IV, a mathematics and science oriented language, is also available. Students with an excellent preparation in mathematics and/or business may enroll in this course. Actual problems will be studied by the class and programming solutions developed, tested, and printed out on the System/3 computer.

#### Advising Method Given By Division of Business

Since there was no advance regis tration nor pre-advising for Fall semester and with a large enrollment expected, advising in the Division of Business is being scheduled on an an appointment basis by most of the members of the faculty. Faculty meeting are being held until 2:00 p.m. on August 20, but members of the Divi sion of Business faculty will be available in their offices to advise students after that time. In some cases, advising will be held in the evening hours to accommodate all students. On Tuesday, August 21, advising will continue to be the prime function of the faculty members throughout the day Students are encouraged to check the bulletin boards on the first floor of the Adminstration Building for appointments as they arrive on camp Generally, advising responsibilities fol-

low this pattern: Seniors are being advised by Mr. Ernest Smith; Juniors, by Mrs. Anna Slack; Sophomores, by Mr. James Hinter; Freshmen, by Mrs. Virginia Hays; transfer students, by Mr. Howard Warren; and all Business Education and two-year students (not previously assigned to one of the other faculty members), by Dr. McCreary.

### Miss Myers Dies, 70-Year Teacher

Miss Ivy Lee Myers, former education instructor here at Glenville, was buried in the Elmwood Cemetary July 24, 1973. She was born November 22, 1882 at Wayne, W.Va. as the first child of Martin F. and America Mansfield Myers. She is survived by her sisters Rachel of Parkersburg and Emma of Huntington and a brother Dr. Charles Everett Myers of Richmond, Virginia.

Miss Myers began her teaching career in the Wilson's Creek School at the age of seventeen and ended it as a Kindergarten teacher in the St. Paul's Methodist Church in Parkersburg at the age of eighty-seven—a seventy year record. Meantime, she taught the home school at "Spunky," taught in the Huntington Schools, in the Nicholas County and Pine Grove High Schools and was Director of the Training School in Glenville State College at the time of required retirement. She was then Supervisor of Instruction in Calhoun County before opening the Methodist Kindergarten with her younger sister Rachel, in Parkersburg.

A most skilled teacher, Miss Myers was a dedicated Christian. During her long career, several thousand students passed through her classes better equipped and inspired to live a fuller, richer life.

### Dean Maze Announces Fall Schedule Changes

Dr. Clarence Maze, Academic Dean of Glenville State College, announced changes in class schedule for the fall semester today.

Schedule changes in English include Mr. DelCol's English 101-11 class, previously set at 6:30 p.m. on Monday, now scheduled for 10:00 a.m. on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. All of Mrs. Trimmier's English classes will be taught by another instructor, for she has resigned and as of yet, has not been replaced.

In the field of Social Studies, all of Ed Smith's classes have been cancelled. Mr. Smith has resigned and, according to Dr. Maze, will not be replaced for the fall semester. Cancelled classes include Soc. 205-03, Soc. 205-06, Social Stratification 325-01, and Social Psychology 330-01. Dr. Maze emphasized the addition

Dr. Maze emphasized the addition of psychology classes to this fall's schedule. Psychology, which has not been offered at GSC for several years, may now be taken as a Social Science elective in the new General Studies Program which became effective June 11, 1973.

This new program includes 18 hours in the humanities, 11 hours in Natural Science and Mathematics, 12 hours in the Social Sciences, and 3 hours in Health and Physical Education for a total of 44 hours.

tion for a total of 44 hours. Dr. Maze added that, "any student may switch to this General Studies Program if they, switch completely." This is to say, for example, that a student may not select his humanities studies from the new program and his science studies from the old one.

Mrs. Campbell's Curr. & Meth. for Tch. the Mentally Retarded (Ed. 440-01), pre viously set for 1:00-2:30 has been re-scheduled to meet at 3:30-5:00 on the same days.

### Mr. Smith Attends Workshop At Tenn.

Mr. Ernest H. Smith, instructor of business at Glenville State College, was recently selected as the only West Virginian among 26 participants in a workshop at the University of Tennessee. The Experimental session in Business Education was conducted from June 16-30.

A new concept in office education dealing in methods of training office personnel was introduced during the workshop. This new concept. 'simulation' brings the job into the classroom by setting up distinct offices as students might find them on the job.

The method was developed by a Glenville State College graduate, Bill Radcliff, a native of Calhoun Co., in conjunction with Mrs. Robert Warren, a high school teacher in Cleveland, Tenn. Mr. Radcliff is now a member of the University of Tennessee staff.

of the University of Tennessee staff. Simulation' affords students the opportunity of rotation from position to position until they are qualified to hold the six office positions of: receptionist, tales manager, accounting clerk, office manager, shipping clerk, and simulation clerk (banker). With Serendipity Cosmetic Company as the simulated business concern, orders may be received, processed, and shipped entailing the flow of paper work involved in the actual procedure.

Mr. Smith anticipates the adoption of this new concept at Glenville State within the near future.

July's advance registration for freshmen indicated sixty students were entering fields of study in the Division of Business. This is the largest number for the Division of Business since advance registration dates were established.
