Homecoming Starts With Thuse Oct. 5

This evening, Oct. 5 there will be a thuse at 8:30 in the amphitheater, followed by a "50's-60's" record hop in the ballroom from 9 p.m.-12 a.m.

Beginning at 10:30 a.m. tomorrow, Sat. Oct. 6 the annual Homecoming Parade begins featuring numerous floats plus bands from Richwood, Gilmer, Clay, Spencer, Braxton, Calhoun, and the GSC Pioneer Marching Band.

At 11:30 coronation of the queen will take place in the amphitheater (auditorium if raining). The queen and her court are: queen, Bobbi Shomo; senior princess, Pam Sumpter; junior princess, Lesa Thrash; sophomore princess, Susie Schurick; freshman princess, Susan Wilson; crown bearer, John Maze; and train bearer, Natalie Tennant.

Beginning at 12 there will be a lunch for all participating bands in the breezeway of the Pioneer Center.

At 12:30 pre-game ceremonies begin with the visiting bands performing first. This will be followed by the Homecoming football game featuring the GSC Pioneers vs. the Wesleyan Bobcats at Rohrbough Stadium.

Following the game will be an alumni buffet in the Multi-purpose room followed by a Lyceum program featuring the "WVU Percussion Ensemble," at 8:00 p.m. in the auditorium.

From 10:00 p.m. until 1:00 a.m. will be the Homecoming dance featuring "Judas" in the student union and in the ballroom. There will be a \$1 admission charge. At the dance the queen and her court will be presented at 11:00 p.m. in the ballroom.

The Convocation-Lyceum Committee extends an invitation to alumni to attend this evenings lyceum program in the auditorium. The program will commence at 8:00 p.m. and features the West Virginia University Percussion Ensemble. Tickets for the percussion variety show will be on sale at the door.

December graduates must have applications and credit forms into the placement office soon. Both papers will be sent to the counties which you have selected by the office. Also it is advisable for seniors to get interviews with the various counties and job centers that are presently on campus.

May and August graduates may participate in the interviews now being held.

Beryl Langford Is Parade Marshall

Mr. Beryl Langford, retired Director of Admissions and Registrar has been named this year's Parade Marshall of Glenville State College's Homecoming Festivities. Mr. Langford, retired since June 30, served GSC with dedication and devoted service since 1962.

Mr. Langford as well as Mrs. Langford are both natives of Gilmer County. They returned to Glenville in 1962 after Mr. Langford completed a distinguished career in the Department of Public Safety in the state of West Virginia. Mr. Langford began his service with the W.Va. Department of Public Safety in 1935. He served as Detachment Commander and Officer in charge of Accident Prevention Bureau in the Department Headquarters in Charleston, with the responsibility for the administration and supervision of Driver Licensing and Driver Employment, Motor Vehicles Inspection, and Traffic Accident Records and Analysis.

From 1953-56, Mr. Langford served on the board of governors of the Southern Safety Conference composed of ten states.

In 1965, Mr. Langford accepted a position as Consultant and Assistant Professor with the Highway Traffic Center and School of Criminal Justice at Michigan State University, he received his Master of Arts Degree.

In 1962, Mr. Langford came to Glenville State College as the Director of Admissions. He has seen the enrollment of the College grow from 726 to the present 1527.

During Mr. Langford's professional career, he has been the author of several publications, including Police Tactics, Guide to Uniform Traffic Law and Enforcement, published by the Michigan association of Chief of Police Awards. Citations having come to Mr. Langford include Outstanding Service to Safety Council, presented to him in New York City, April 1956, and the West Virginia Education Award presented by the West Virginia Department of Education, 1965.

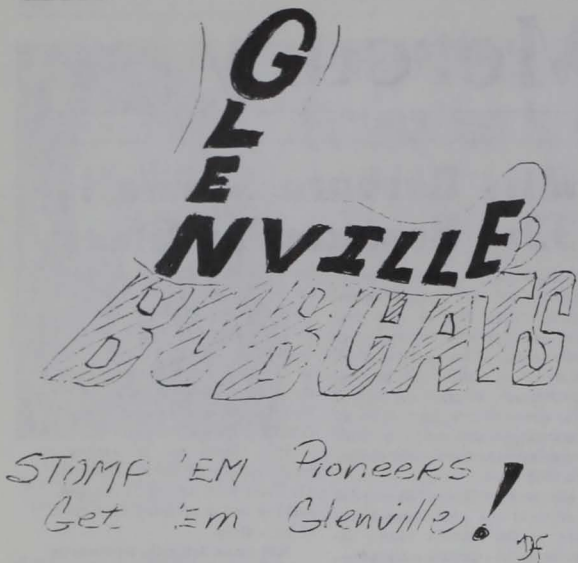

Pioneer Tradition, History Reviewed From '33-Pres.

"He wears a buckskin suit, coonskin cap, has a beard, carries a muzzle-loading rifle, and a jug that varies." The guy that was just described could be every GSC Pioneer since 1933. The name "Pioneer" was given to the GSC campus in 1933 because it was just that: a pioneer, in the educational field. That same year a senior male, Charles Barnett, was selected by his fellow students as a symbol of GSC and morale booster for the football team. "Since this time the Pioneer has become truly an instigation of spirit and loyalty to the athletic teams and campus."

To be a pioneer one must: be a male senior, have good academic standards, never have lettered in a sport in college and must grow a beard.

Interesting highlights in the history of the GSC pioneer are: Charles Barnett, selected in 1933 who rode in an ox cart pulled by a team of oxen in the Homecoming parade. This was to be part of the pioneer tradition.

In 1934, Pioneer Homer Blackhurst was the first of many Pioneers to be chosen into the G-men Club. As a member of the G-men the honored Pioneers would receive an athletic letter sweater.

World War II in 1942 caused Homecoming to cease until 1946. John Tyson was then the GSC figure-head.

The Homecoming tradition started again in 1942. John Fiddler's career as Pioneer was interesting as that has

RESA Established, GSC In Region 5

RESA, Regional Education Service Agency was set up under Senate Bill 183 by the 1972 Legislature authorizes West Virginia Board of Education to establish a multi-county agency to effectively administer existing regional education programs.

West Virginia is divided into five regions for the new Regional Education Service Agency. In each region, RESA has set up a Teachers' Education Center as a cooperative approach to the student teacher programs. The centers have been functional since June, 1973.

Under the regional divisions, Glenville State College will fall under Region five consisting of the counties Jackson, Pleasants, Ritchie, Roane, Tyler, Wirt, and Wood. Other colleges in Region five are Marietta College, West Virginia University, and West Virginia Wesleyan College.

Under the new program, student teachers will still continue to be supervised by their colleges. Dr. Lawrence Nuzum will serve as Glenville's representative and will attend monthly meetings of RESA for improving the guidelines of the Student Teacher programs.

Region five RESAoffice is located adjacent to the Wood County Board of Education Office at 210-13th Street, Parkersburg. Presently Glenville State College has student placement in five of seven counties in Region 5. Under RESA the Student Teacher Center Coordinator is Miss Dorothea L. Davis.

The RESA services for student teachers will include a Diagnostic and Prescriptive Center for Educational Environments, a Reading Center, a Film Library, a Curriculum Library, a Career Education Center, a Title I Regional Specialist, and the Teacher Education Center.

Glenville State Stuns Falcons

Last Saturday at Fairmont, the Glenville Pioneers displayed one trait that any team has to have to be considered of championship caliber. The G-Men showed that they had the ability to fight back and win after falling behind.

The ballgame was played on a very wet field and drizzle continued for most of the contest. The Pioneers won the toss and received on their own 30 yd. line. After failing to make a first down, the Blue-Wave punted to the Falcons 25. The host team then drove the ball down to the Glenville 46 but an illegal procedure penalty forced Fairmont into a punting situation, and the G-Men took over on their own 24 with 10:13 to go in the first period. On the next play, the Pioneers fumbled on their own 29 yd. line. However, the Glenville defense rose up and forced the Falcons to fumble three plays later and co-captain Mark Reger recovered a fumble on the Blue 31 yd. line.

After the Pioneers and Falcons exchanged punts, Glenville moved to their own 43 yd. line where the Falcons picked off an Anderson pass and the drive was halted. Fairmont

then moved into scoring territory but on fourth and three from the G-ville 21, a 28 yd. field goal attempt was wide. The Pioneers were once again forced to punt and on the third play from scrimmage, Bernie Buttrey recovered a fumble on the Falcon 43 yd. line. Unluckily the Pioneers were unable to generate any offense and the Falcons took over after a punt on their 23 yd. line. From the 27 yd. line on the second play, the Falcons connected on a 73 yd. scoring strike and after the extra point, the score stood 7-0 in favor of Fairmont. At the half, Fairmont led by the same score.

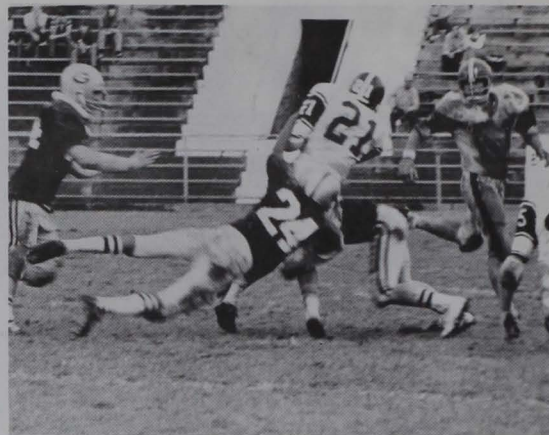
In the second half, the Pioneer's came out with a completely different attitude. The defensive and offensive lines of the Pioneers came out and carried the contest to the Falcons. The Falcons did drive to the Pioneer 37 yd. line but Bernie Buttrey dumped the Fairmont quarterback attempting to pass. Subsequently, Fairmont punted, and after a good run-back the Pioneers had excellent field position in Falcon territory. However, a Fairmont defender picked-off a G-ville pass and stopped the Pioneers. Late in the third quarter, Glenville took over the football on their own

44. With Chris Anderson firing completions, the Pioneers moved to the Falcon's 14 yd. line. There on 2 and 9, Anderson hit Jim Carter with a 16 yd. scoring strike and after Chambers' kick the score stood Glenville 7, Fairmont 7.

The Glenville defense then gave the Pioneers a big break. Scotty Hamilton picked off a Falcon pass on the Fairmont 38 yd. line. While being hit, Hamilton lateralized to Gerald Matheny and after a 20 yd. runback, Glenville had the ball on the Falcon 18 yd. line. After the Glenville drive halted on the Fairmont 10 yd. line, Jay Chambers came on and booted the go-ahead field goal for the Pioneers.

Late in the game, the Falcons drove to the Pioneer 25 but a dropped pass ensured victory for the charges of Coach Bill Hanlin.

Fullback and Co-Captain, John Pratt, led the Pioneer ground attack with 68 yds. on nine carries. Chris Anderson hit Pioneer receivers on six of eight attempts for 48 yds. Once again the Blue defense was superb with Hamilton, Buttrey, Reger, Taylor, and Rice leading the way and stopping the Falcon offense on key situations.

Homecomings Reviewed

1931—"The first homecoming game ever to be staged in the history of Glenville State Teachers College will be played here Nov. 14, when Potomac State will send eleven husky men on Rohrbough Field for the scalps of the Glenville Pioneers." "1,200 spectators were gayer and noisier after the final whistle and the last blast of the Pioneer band, for Glenville won 38-7. This was the worst defeat they ever gave a Potomac team."

1933—"Fifteen-hundred persons see Concord overwhelmed here. The game was scheduled for 2:00, but the crowd was late in arriving, and had not fully assembled until the Pioneers scored their first two touchdowns. The final score was 32-0."

1934—"One thousand people see Glenville defeat Concord on Homecoming day, 14-6."

1935—"The parade was followed by the annual Homecoming football game won by Glenville 14-12."

1937—"Trailing 12-6 at the third period, the rampant Pioneer football team staged a brilliant rally in the final canto to register a 19-12 triumph over Morris Harvey's Golden Eagles in the college's seventh annual Homecoming game here Saturday."

1938—"The tenth newest building on campus was dedicated-Louis Bennett Hall. Following the morning activities, the annual game was played and won by Concord 7-0."

1939—"Pioneers go on scoring rampage to win a 30 to 7 decision over Bethany Bisons before ninth annual Homecoming crowd."

1940—"Concord Lions upset Pioneers 6-0. A hard driving rain-soaked Rohrbough stadium and a few scattered spectators watched Saturday afternoon as Concord Mt. Lions shoved across a lone TD early in the third quarter to ruin Glenville's tenth annual Homecoming."

1941—"In a feature attraction of a perfect Homecoming day, the Glenville State Teachers College Pioneers came from behind twice in a real thriller to subdue the previously undefeated West Virginia Tech Golden Bears, 14-12."

1942—"The Glenville Pioneers fell from the ranks of the undefeated by a 20-13 score at the hands of the Hilltoppers from West Liberty in a local 12th annual Homecoming game."

1946—"The Pioneers and Concord Lions played to a scoreless tie before a Homecoming crowd (cont. on p.5)

N. Christianson Wins Montrose Award

The 1973 Montrose Award winner is Neil Christianson.

Christianson is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Christianson of Parkersburg. He was born in Columbus, Ohio and attended Parkersburg High School.

He attended the University of Miami one year prior to coming to Glenville. Christianson graduated from Glenville in December of 1972 with an A.B. in Business Administration and a minor in English. He graduated with a 3.290 overall average.

Letting three years in football at the defensive end position, Christianson was elected by his teammates as captain of the 1972 squad. He lettered two years in golf and during 1970-71, he was elected to the all-conference golf team, and was the second leading golfer in the WVIAC. During the 1971-72 season, he was elected captain of the golf team which won the conference and went to the Nationals in Roswell, New Mexico where he had the best

score of all the Glenville golfers.

He resides at the Colonial Trailer Court, Rt. 1, Parkersburg with his wife, JoAnn, and daughter, Jeannie.

The Frank Montrose Award was initiated in the spring of 1952 when the Student Council decided to give an award to the outstanding Senior Athlete. Seeing limited action as a freshman in the first five games under "Nate" Rohrbough, Frank got his chance against Bethany turning the game around passing for the decisive touchdown, winning the game for the Pioneers. Although a freshman seeing limited action, he came on in the latter part of the season and received All-Conference mention.

The following spring disaster fell. Frank went blind and was forced to drop out of school. On June 21, 1940, the 21 year old football star died of nephritis in a Baltimore hospital.

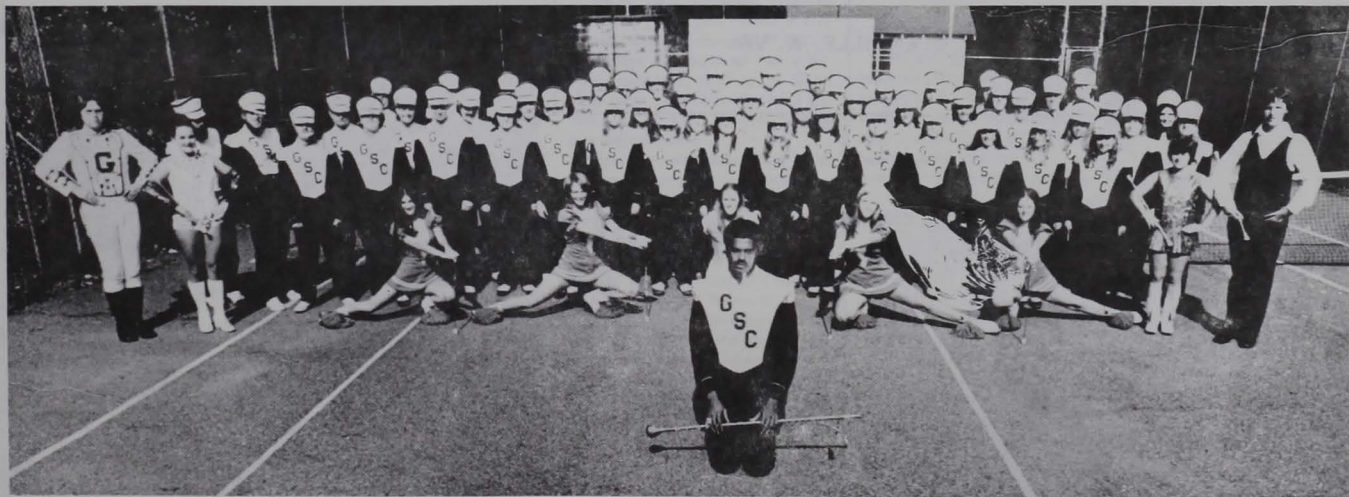
