


President Wilburn crowned Queen Barbara I, Homecoming Queen at the coronation last Saturday.

Cafeteria Situation Remains Unsettled

It has been almost a month now since the beef freeze has been lifted and according to the food service manager, Mr. Wayne Harkins, the situation has not improved to any great extent.

According to the prices, beef was up about 3 per cent. Flour is now running short. At the present there is a shortage of margarine. Just a few weeks ago milk went up in Elkins eight cents per gallon. The food service is not at a loss for milk because it is contracted for.

Eggs are now being limited to two cartons per person at retail markets. Mr. Harkins commented that vegetables will be loosening up because the crops are coming in. Asked if they had the same problem with making out the menu, Mr. Harkins says that it remains the same.

The biggest loss comes in the fruit or dessert line, and apples create the worst problem. Applesauce is still hard to get, according to Mr. Harkins, due to the 40 per centdrop in the apple crop of the early spring. Cottage cheese is also limited.

It Is National Newspaper Week

Considering the apparent relationship and relativity of the Mercury to National Newspaper Week, Oct. 7 - 14, it is important for this editor, to at least make mention of the week and its significance.

Oct. 7 - 14 is a special way of recognizing the press and the role it plays in American public life. On a national level the aspects are limitless. Especially in the last year the newspapers have undauntedly worked at exposing for example, corruption in the government, at the rush of the journalist own personal freedom. The press has been instrumental in making the public aware of social ills such as drug abuse, child beating, veneral disease, etc. Still, sensationalism is leveled, and accusations of criticism are offered with every page of print. Sensationalism - no! Constructive - yes! By exposing anything, no matter how sordid or gruesome, the public is, at least, made aware, and almost always, encouraged to act. Criticisms of this ever informative, ever inquisitive press are numerous and without question invalid. The journalist crusades for the right that entitles every American to know the who, what, where, when, why, and how of any relevant situation. Sentimental? Probably so. But as an object of much criticism regardless of the effort and devotion produced by this staff, any sentimentality is justified.

To bring this to a local level – one request. Think before you utter this criticism that leaks back to the Mercury office after publication each week. We are 12 staff members, 1 advisor, and 7 reporters, working around classes, extra-curricular activities, and personal lives to put out a newspaper each week. If we cut stories, it is a necessity; if we deem some news more important-it is an objective opinion; if we are late or have errors it is due to stress or mechanical errors. One statement can be made without reservation. work, we put in 100% effort-that is a fact. Criticism if often needed, if it is constructive. But the only possible solution of the Mercury's faults is man-power. Care to volunteer?





After receiving the kickoff, the Pioneers drove down the field and in eleven plays they tallied their first score of the afternoon. The last 16 yards of the drive were gained on a Chris Anderson passtoKenny Morrison. Big plays in the drive were Jim Carter's 12 yard run, a 14 yd. pass from Anderson to Steve Buffington and a 15 yd. pass from Anderson to John Pratt.

Wesleyan then received the ensuing kickoff but the Bobcats could go nowhere and were forced to punt. The Wesleyan punt was taken by Rick Lemley on the Pioneer 41. After waiting for the interference to form Lemley followed his blockers down the sideline and Glenville had a 14-0 lead at 7:57 to go in the first quarter.

Wesleyan couldn't get an offense generated and once again punted. This time Lemley took the ball on his own 30 yd. line and ran the ball 30 yds. to the Bobcat 40. The Bobcat defense stiffened and Wesleyan regained the ball after Jay Chambers' punt landed in the end zone. Wesleyan gained 7 yd. in three plays and were forced to punt to the Glenville 47 yd. line. The Pioneers then moved into Bobcat territory and with two seconds to go in the first period, Chambers kicked a 38 yd. field goal, giving Glenville a 17-0 lead.

The second quarter was much the same as the G-men dominated every statistic. Glenville took the ball over on the Bobcat 40 when Roger Bonnett intercepted a Wesleyan pass. Three palys later, Anderson hit Buffington with a 34 yd. T.D. toss and the Glenville lead jumped to 24-0. Minutes later Jerome Fruit picked off a Wesleyan aerial and returned it to the Bobcat 15. After 3 running plays, Jim Carter broke into the Wesleyan end zone and after Chambers' kick, Pioneers had a 31-0 lead with 3:34 to go in the 2nd quarter.

With seconds to go in the first half, Glenville again crossed the Bob-cat scoring line with Anderson hitting Ken Morrison on a 15 yd. scoring At the half Glenville had an astounding 38-0 lead over Wesleyan. Much of the 3rd quarter was devoted to defense as the Pioneers failed to muster any scoring drives. Wesleyan had their only scoring chance halted at the Pioneer 2 yd. line when the middle of the Glenville line stopped the Bobcats. Soon after the quarter began, Chambers added his second field goal, this time from 37 yd. out. Wesleyan could muster little offense and once again punted. Reserve quarterback Joe Mitchem then directed the Pioneers on yd. scoring drive. A 12 yd. Mitchem-to-Art Keith pass enabled the Pioneers to hold a 48-0 advantage over the Bobcats. The final Glenville score came when Mitchem found Mark Toney behind the Bobcat defenders for a 45 yard T. D. bomb. After Chambers' kick, the Pioneers had an amazing 55-0 win over the hapless Wesleyan Bobcats.

Pritt Wins In Tennis

The second annual Fall Tennis Tournament was completed last Friday with the finals being played in both the singles and doubles. Ken Pritt won the singles division beating Paul Ayers 10-3 and Ken Pritt teamed up with Dave Wright, had little troubles, beating the team of Dave Merchant and Mark Huffman 10-0.

In NAIA national rankings, Glenville is rated as eighth after they crushed W. Va. Wesleyan.

After five games several Pioneers are doing quite well in the Glenville rushing categories. Jimmy Carter has rushed for 383 yds. in 92 carries for 4.2 yds. per carry. John Pratt has gained 234 yds. in 54 carries for a 4.3 average. Don Brady, a freshman, has gained 146 yds. in 28 carries for a 5.2 average. Rick Lemley has 59 yds. in 23 carries for a 2.6 average, and Mike Robinson has 37 yds. in 10 carries for a 3.7 average.

In the passing category, Chris Anderson has completed 37 of his 62 passes for 50l yds. and eight touchdowns. He has been intercepted five times. Joe Mitchem is 4 of 8 for 92 yds. and two touchdowns.

On the receiving end, Steve Buffington has caught II passes for 188 yds. and 3 TD's; Ken Morrison has caught 8 tosses for 105 yds. and 2 TD's; Les Facemyer has caught 7 passes for 100 yds. and 2 TD's; Jim Carter has received 6 passes for 57 yds. and 1 TD; and John Pratt has caught 4 passes for 44 yds.

Jay Chambers is averaging 35.2 yds. per punt. Jim Carter is averaging 42 yds. per return on kickoffs and 23 yds. per punt return. Rick Lemley is also averaging 23 yds. on punt returns. Scott Hamilton and Jerome Fruit lead the Pio-

neers in interceptions with two apiece. In scoring, Carter has 38 points, Chambers 26, Buffington 18, Morrison, Pratt and Facemyer 12, and Robinson, Lemley, Keith, and Toney, six apiece.

As a team Glenville has outscored their opponents 142 to 28 and outgained their opponents 1497 yds. to 974 vds.

Glenville needs a win Saturday to gain first place in the WVIAC Southern Division. Even though they have the best record in the conference, if the Pioneers lose they will not get a shot at the playoffs because Bluefield would finish with a 4-0 record within the division.

The cheering section for the Pioneers has been outstanding this season. At Fairmont, Glenville had more supporters and a louder cheering section than the Falcon rooters even though it was Fairmont's Homecoming. If you get a chance, go to the game and let's all pull for the Pioneers.

Another oddity of the conference division set-up is apparent if you look at the conference standings. Do you realize that even though the Pioneers have already defeated Fairmont that the Falcons and Glenville could be playing in the conference playoffs on Nov. 17? Fairmont is currently leading the Northern Division with a 2-0 record.

Awards Revealed For 1973-74 Year

Mr. Larry Lamb, Financial Aid Officer, has announced the total number of scholarships, loans, grants, workships, and work studies awarded for the fiscal year '73-74.

A total of 214 students are receiving the National Direct Student Loan which amounts to \$150,000. Supplementary Opportunity Grants are awarded to 124, amounting to \$74,000.

Approximately 110 students are under the work-study plan which totals for the year to \$85,000. Another 85 students are on the work-ship program.

Some 200 students depend on the Guaranteed Student Loan which they receive from their hometown bank. The amount awarded is based upon the need of the individual student. The Basic Education Opportunity Grant, which is awarded only to freshmen, totals \$18,000 which is divided among 80 students.

The John C. Shaw Scholarship

The John C. Shaw Scholarship is now given to 15 students attending GSC. This award is given in the amount of \$150 each year for four years. The Claude W. Benedum Scholarship was awarded to 41 students at \$200 each. This amounts to \$8200.
