Enrollment Given By Majors, Fields

Clarence Maze, Jr., Dean of Academic Affairs has released the enrollment of students in the different fields. All information concerning majors and different fields was taken from the Student Profile sheets.

Students seeking AB Education degrees lead the enrollment with 942 students, as compared to 957 last year. Two-hundred and two of the students are in Elementary Education. Two-hundred and seventeen were enrolled last year. Early Childhood majors total 106 with 90 last year. Students enrolled in Secondary Education total 634, with 650 enrolled last year.

Dr. Ohmer Milton Is Guest Speaker At Faculty Development Program

The Faculty Development Program with Dr. Ohmer Milton of the University of Tennessee, was presented Oct. 31, Nov. 1 and 2.

A dinner meeting of faculty and spouses was held Wednesday night. Dr. Milton delivered a general address on improvement of instruction and learning.

On Thursday, four seminars on improvement of instruction were led by Dr. Milton. Divisions of Fine Arts and Languages, Health, Physical Education; Science and Mathematics; Forestry and Land Surveying; Education and Foundations; Business; and Social Science divisions attended these seminars.

A general faculty meeting where Dr. Milton summarized and reacted toward some of the ideas developed over the previous two days was held this morning at 9 a.m.

Dr. Ohmer Milton, originally from Lynchburg, Va. received an A.B. degree in psychology from Berea College, Berea Ky.; his M.A. degree in psychology from University of Kentucky, and a Ph. D. degree in psychology from the University of Michigan.

Dr. Milton's research and publications include the following: **Behavior Disorders: Perspectives and Trends.** Philadelphia: J. B. Lippincott, Third Edition (with Robert G. Wahler), 1973; "The Changing Nature of Instruction," *Journal of Research and Development in Education*, No. 2, 6:115-125, Winter, 1973; *Alternatives to the Traditional: How Professors Teach and How Students Learn.* San Francisco: Jossey-Bass, 1972; and "Teaching or Learning?" *Research Report*, No. 6, Washington, D.C.: American Association for Higher Education, 1971.

Dr. Milton is a member of the National Examination Committee, American Association of State Psychology Boards and a member of the Advisory Board to the Association for Innovation in Higher Education. He is presently a professor of psychology at the University of Tennessee.

E. Zerbest Retires After Sixteen Years

On Wednesday, October 31, Mr. Everett Zerbest, long time employee of Glenville State College maintenance department, retired. He had served GSC for a little over 16 years.

Mr. Zerbest was born in Comanche County, Texas, on Oct. 22, 1911. He served in the Army for 39 months during World War II. He came to Glenville in 1946. He helped to build the old Student Union building and the Medical School at Morgantown.

Most students are unfamiliar with Mr. Zerbest, but he can be seen daily with a stick and pole with which he keeps the GSC campus free of paper.

"I don't mind picking up the paper and keeping the place beautiful," according to Mr. Zerbest. The duty of picking of paper was appointed to Mr. Zerbest by the maintenance department, but this isn't his only duty. He works with other members of the maintenance department throughout the day and week.

Mr. Zerbest says that his health has prompted him to leave. He merely feels that after so many years it is time to retire.

When asked about anything exciting that has happened to him over the years he has been here, Mr. Zerbest says he remembers the time he rode a lawn mower over the hill by the men's dorm. This occurred as he was pushing the mower up the hill and the handles reversed on him. He jumped on it to try and stop it, but in the process hit his thumb and burnt it a little.

His plans after retirement, according to Mr. Zerbest are to travel a little if the situation presents itself, and whatever he and his wife decide to do.

Mr. Zerbest was quick to say that "I am going to miss working at GSC," and that "my fellow workers have all been good men, good to work with, and I have had no trouble getting along with any of them." His fellow workers in turn state that "Mr. Zerbest is a good fellow to work with."

A retirement dinner was held for Mr. Zerbest last Wednesday at which he received many gifts. He says that he enjoyed and appreciated them all.

One can be sure that where ever Mr. Zerbest goes he will be a success and many of us at GSC will miss him. Mr. Zerbest, we wish you well.

Pioneers Crush W. Va. State, Division Championship Won

The Glenville Pioneers romped over a supposedly fired up W. Va. State team last Saturday to capture the WVIAC Southern Division championship. The G-Men used their outstanding defense and powerful offense to crush the Yellowjackets.

Early in the game Roger Bonnette returned a State punt 40 yards to the Yellowjackets' 12 yard line. The Pioneers suffered a bad break when they fumbled on the 10. However, State's elation was short-lived because three plays later Bernie Buttrely blocked a Yellowjacket pass and intercepted it on State's 9 yd. line. From there it took the G-Men just three plays to score with Chris Anderson hitting Ken Morrison on a 2 yd. scoring strike. Jay Chambers added the extra point and Glenville led 7-0.

One minute later Scotty Hamilton picked up a State fumble and raced 40 yds. for the Pioneers' second TD. Chambers again added the

extra point and Glenville led 14-0 with still 8 minutes to play in the first quarter. The Pioneers scored again in the first quarter when Jim Carter completed a 57 yard scoring position with a 17 yard run. Chambers booted the extra point and Glenville led 21-0 at the end of the first quarter.

After the Pioneers were forced to punt, Steve Buffington gave the Pioneers another scoring opportunity when he recovered a State fumble on the 18 yd. line of the Yellowjackets. Carter and Pratt moved the ball closer to goal line territory and Carter scored on a 4 yard burst. Chambers added still another extra point and the Pioneers led 28-0. Late in the second quarter State began a scoring drive when they were aided by a pair of 15 yard penalties moving the ball from State's 35 yard line to Glenville's 35. However, Jerome Fruit picked off a State pass in the endzone and Glen-

ville took a 28-0 lead into the locker room at halftime.

Midway through the third quarter Glenville again scored, this time on a 9 yard run by Pratt. Pratt's running and a 12 yard Anderson to Buffington pass helped set up the score. From then on Coach Hanlin went to his reserves, but Glenville still kept scoring. The Pioneers drove 62 yards with running by freshman tailback Don Brady spearheading the drive. Brady picked up 54 yards in the drive and moved the ball into scoring position where Mike Robison bulled in for the score. Chamber's kick gave Glenville a 42-0 lead. State finally scored against the reserves on an 8-yard pass play and after adding a 2 point conversion the score stood 42-8, Glenville's favor.

The Pioneers still weren't finished scoring. With only a minute to go in the game Joe Mitchell hit Les Facemyer on a 40 yard bomb. After Chambers' kick the final score stood Glenville 49, State 8.

According to Dr. Robert Dolgener, Glenville Athletic Director, advanced tickets for the WVIAC Shrine Bowl Game are on sale at the athletic office in the Health Building on campus. The game will be played Saturday, Nov. 17, 1973, at 7 p.m. at Stadium Field in Parkersburg, W. Va.

The advanced tickets on sale are \$1.50 for students and \$2.50 for adults. Tickets at the gate will cost \$2.00 for students and \$3.00 for adults.

As the Mercury went to press we were informed that Shepherd has an outside chance of winning the championship if West Liberty beats Fairmont and Shepherd beats Salem.

The game tomorrow against Concord will be played at 1:30. Also the merchants of Glenville will be honored at halftime.

Four Profiled Players Contribute To Program

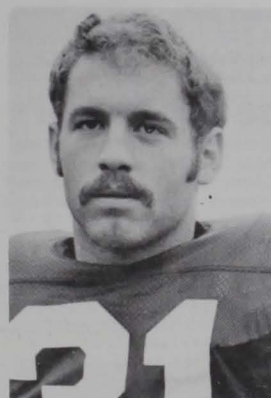

Jay Chambers is a senior physical education major from Ripley. Chambers' main duties this year has been placekick and so far he has done an excellent job. Chambers is second leading scorer on the team with 45 points this season. He is 30 for 31 on extra points and 5 for 8 on field goals.

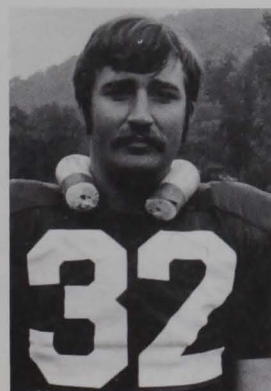

Rick Lemley Leads Nation

At the beginning of the 1973 season, Rick Lemley was alternating with senior Jimmy Carter at the tailback position. Lemley is a 5' 6", 155 pound sophomore. Coach Bill Hanlin, in analyzing the results of alternating the two players, felt the team would be better with a regular tailback playing all of the time. He chose Carter to be the regular tailback because of experience and his previous record. Lemley had to be disappointed with the decision, but he did not give up. He was put on the punt return team and an example of how character is fostered can be seen in his accomplishments.

First of all, Rick does not appreciate the thought that being "little" indicates you have no ability. He does not like to be referred to as "the diminutive Rick Lemley." His present record proves his theory.

Lemley is the national leader for punt returns for all of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletic teams. He has returned 10 punts for 224 yards and an average of 22.4 yards per return. He also has 2 kick-off returns for 19 yards

and he has carried the ball 25 times from scrimmage for 64 yards. He has scored 2 touchdowns; one on a 58 yard punt return against W. Va. Wesleyan and the other on a 73 yard punt return against Bluefield State. This year he has set the school record for punt returns in a season and still has at least 2 games to play.

Lemley graduated from St. Marys High School in 1971. He played football three years and was all-Little Kanawha Conference and all-state his senior year.

After graduation, Rick enrolled at West Virginia Tech. He spent one year at Tech and transferred to Glenville in 1972. He is preparing to teach special education and he has ambitions of becoming a coach. His greatest thrill at Glenville is being a part of this great team and the success the team is enjoying.

Lemley said, "It is great playing for an unbeaten team. I feel we can win a National Championship because this team is so well coordinated and unselfish. Every player pulls for every other player."

GSC Clinches Title Win Latest Victory

The Glenville State Pioneer football team clinched 1st place in the Southern Division of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference by defeating West Virginia State College 49-8 last Saturday.

The victory was the 8th straight game won this year and the 10th straight for the Pioneers who are ranked 3rd nationally in Division II of the National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics. The game also marked the 40th victory at Glenville for coach Bill Hanlin. Coach Hanlin's Glenville teams have a winning percentage of .576 which places him in first among all coaches in won-lost percentage at Glenville.

Coach Hanlin said, "We are putting all our emphasis on Concord. In order to have a perfect season, we must defeat Concord this Saturday. We are not looking ahead to the play off," he concluded.

Winning the Southern Division Championship assures the Glenville team of being one of the participants in the 1st annual Shriner's Bowl in Parkersburg on November 17th. The game will decide the WVIAC conference champion. The Northern Division Championship has not been decided and will not be determined until West Liberty, Fairmont, and Shepard finish their division schedules. Any one of the three schools could be the opponent of Glenville for the bowl game.

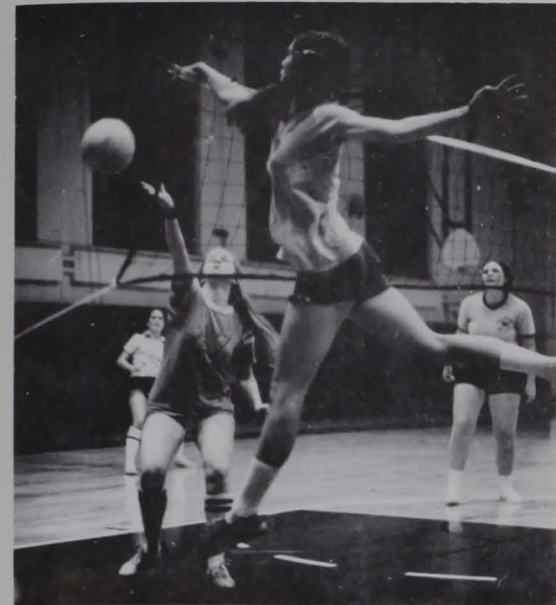

State was supposed to have a strong team, one that could challenge the Pioneers for the Southern division championship, but they sure didn't look like a contender against the G-Men. Glenville dominated every statistic. The defense held State's 100 yd.-rushing-per-game man, Fred Venson, to 9 yds. in 11 carries. The offense decimated the State defense for 350 yds. total offense, 258 of that came on the ground. Jim Carter had 57 yds. in 19 carries. John Pratt had 62 yds. in 10 attempts. Les Facemyer had 27 yds. in 3 attempts. Don Brady had 51 yds. in 9 carries, Mike Robinson had 17 yds. in 4 carries, and Joe Mitchum had 41 yds. in 2 carries. All in all, Glenville completely ran State off the field to clinch the Southern division crown.

Tomorrow Glenville plays the winless Concord Lions. Concord was supposed to have a pretty good team, but injuries have decimated the Lion's offensive line. One interesting sidelight of the game is that it will be the fourth consecutive match-up of the Pratt brothers. John Pratt, senior fullback for Glenville, will be playing against his brother Steve who is a halfback for Concord.

This Saturday night West Liberty and Fairmont square-off for the Northern division crown at Fairmont East-West Stadium. Glenville played both of these teams this year. The Pioneers beat Fairmont 10-7 and West Liberty 14-12. Both times the winning margin was provided by Jay Chambers' toe. Chambers is currently 30 for 31 on extra point attempts and 5 for 8 on field goals.

Glenville is averaging 29.9 points

per game while allowing their opponents 6.8 points per game.

The Glenville defense is ranked tenth nationally on overall performance, and 22nd against the rush. Rick Lemley who is ranked number one nationally in punt returns with a 22 yd. per carry average is featured in an article this week. Jack Deloplane of Salem is number 2 in the nation with a 19 yd. average.

Tomorrow is the last home game for 13 Glenville seniors. Scott Hamilton, Jay Chambers, Mike Robinson, Brian Taylor, Ed Williams, John Pratt, Jim Carter, Irving Braniff, Tom Harvey, Larry Chapman, Mark Reger, Marcus Rice, and Ken Morrison will all be playing their last home game for the Blue and White. Everyone owes these men a big thanks for putting Glenville on the national football map.

Glenville State is also one of the 30 undefeated colleges in America, that includes NAIA, NCAA and Small College.

Everyone should get their tickets early for Nov. 17 conference championship game. It looks like a sure sell-out.

Dave Harsh, a freshman linebacker played well in place of Paul Frederick in last week's State game. Frederick has a back injury but is expected to return in time for the conference play-offs. Don Brady and Dave Neuner are two other freshmen playing exceptionally well.

The coaching staff of this year's Pioneer team has done an outstanding job. Head Coach Bill Hanlin, and assistants Earl Adolfson, Bob Summers, Jerry Milliken and James Riffle all deserve a big round of thanks.
