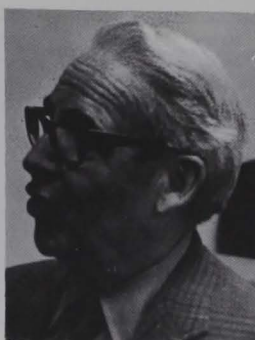

Five Instructors Retire This Year

Five Glenville State College instructors are retiring this year. Mr. Loren McCartney, Mrs. Lillian Chaddock and Mr. Howard Warren will retire in May, while Mr. Victor T. Berry will retire in June and Mr. Lawrence Nuzum in August.

Mr. McCartney has been an assistant Professor of History at Glenville since 1962. He received his AB from Glenville in 1940 and received his MA from the University of Pittsburgh in 1953. He has also done graduate work in History at the University of Edinburgh. Mr. McCartney resides in Glenville with his wife, Georgia, and his daughter, Kathy. He has three married sons; Patrick, Michael, and Terry.

Mrs. Lillian Chaddock has been an associate professor of Home Economics at Glenville since 1949. She received her BS from West Virginia University in 1938 and her MS degree from the same school in 1952. Mrs. Chaddock resides in Glenville with her husband, Howard, and her son, Mike.

Mr. Warren has been an assistant professor of Business Administration since 1965. He received his BS degree from Concord College in 1961 and his MS degree from Virginia Poly. Institute in 1962. Mr. Warren has a wife, Sallie, and two daughters, Mrs. Leeta Gae Sink and Deborah.

Mr. Victor Berry has been a college co-ordinator for Glenville State College since 1962. He received his AB in Elementary Education from Glenville in 1948 and his MA in administration from West Virginia University in 1950. Mr. Berry and his wife, Mary live in Glenville.

Dr. Lawrence Nuzum has been Director of Student Teaching since 1970.

He received his AB in math from Fairmont State College in 1930, his MA in Education Administration from W.Va. University in 1935 and his Doctorate in Education Administration from the University of Tennessee in 1959.

GSC National Forensics Team Finishes Fifteenth In The Country

The Glenville State College National Forensics Team under the direction of Katherine J. Leisnering of the Speech Department finished fifteenth in the nation as Glenville completed competition in its first National Individual Events Tournament. Glenville, with only four people and fifteen entries, for example, won out over eighty nine other colleges and universities from across the nation. Some of the schools Glenville beat were: Kent State University, Penn State University, Loyola University, University of North Carolina, Brooklyn College, Ball State University, Bowling Green State University, Akron University, University of Southern California, Berkeley, Defiance, Wright State University, University of Wisconsin, Syracuse, Temple, Wayne State University, La Salle, City College of New York and five branches of the State University of New York. In addition to this, Glenville finished first among the West Virginia schools, winning out over Marshall, Fairmont, and Parkersburg Community College. Only Glenville and Fairmont won National trophies from West Virginia.

Skip Kincaid, in her usual outstanding effort, placed fourth in the nation in Poetry Interpretation with an interpretation her judges described as "very powerfully presented," "absolutely excellent," "a cathartic experience," and "dynamite."

Ms. Kincaid herself was touted as "a magnificent credit to this contest" and an "astounding talent." Her fourth place win takes on added significance when it is considered that in order to get to the semifinals, a contestant had to be first or second on every ballot received. Ms. Kincaid had only one second place ranking on all her preliminary ballots.

4 Professors Are Honored

Dedication of Picken's Hall will take place this Saturday at 1:30 p.m. with Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, President of Glenville State College, presiding.

The residence hall, formerly called Woman's Hall, is being renamed in honor of Miss Pearl Pickens, first Dean of Women at Glenville State College.

The three wings of the hall will be named in honor of three well-known retired members of the Glenville State College faculty. 'C' Wing is named for Mrs. Bessie Boyd Bell Scott, former history instructor.

'B' Wing is named for Miss Clarissa Williams, associate professor of physical education, and 'A' Wing is named for John R. Wagner, professor of mathematics and physics.

At the ceremony on Saturday, individuals will pay tribute to these four individuals. Dr. Wilburn will give the welcome; Mrs. Yvonne King will speak for Miss Pickens and Mrs. Dorothy Gandee of Clendenin will speak for Miss Williams.

Mr. Fred Barnett will bring honor to Mrs. Scott and Mr. Michael Ferrell will speak for Mr. Wagner.

Each honoree will respond and unveil the plaque bearing his name.

Mr. Daniel Taylor, senior, at GSC, will render the Alma Mater. Invocation and benediction will be given by Dr. Alfred T. Billips, Jr.

The ceremony, in the formal lounge of Picken's Hall is open to students, alumni and friends of the College.

Miss Pickens, a graduate of Glenville Normal School and West Virginia University, taught in Gilmer, Kanawha, Harrison and Randolph counties and served as principal at Troy, Tanner and Glenville High Schools before coming to Glenville State College in 1947. She was Dean of Women and English instructor here until 1964.

Mrs. Scott is a graduate of Glenville State Normal, West Virginia University and the University of Chicago. Mrs. Scott, former teacher in Glenville Public Schools, East Bank High School, and St. Marys High School, began teaching history at Glenville State in 1918. She remained in this capacity until 1957.

Miss Williams graduated from the American Gymnastics, Marshall University and Columbia University.

She taught in St. Paul, Minn., Huntington High School and at Marshall University before joining Glenville State faculty as an associate professor of physical education in 1947. She served in this capacity and as cheerleader sponsor until 1964.

Mr. Wagner was graduated from East Stroudsburg Normal School,

Editor Welcomes Returning Alumni

For the past several weeks this office has been under a literal barrage of material from the Alumni Office. News releases, biographical forms for award winners, newsletters, program information and news galore have been sent by Mrs. Judy Meads for the Mercury and for release to area newspapers. All of this has been in preparation for an event which, heretofore has escaped the notice of this particular student and I am sure, many others as well. Alumni Day. The efforts of the Alumni Association, under the direction of Mrs. Meads, and countless others have resulted in a special day of activities and a banquet honoring many distinguished alumni of Glenville State College, especially Dr. Patrick Gainer, Alumnus of the Year for 1974. It is my understanding that the alumni graduating in the years 1924, 1954 and 1964 are to receive special recognition this Saturday, so I took a look back into time (courtesy of old issues of the Tower and the Mercury) and would like to reminisce a little with the alumni of these years.

Back when the student publication of Glenville Normal School was named The Tower and published five times a year, some headlines ran like this: GNS OFF IN FRONT WINS GOOD FAST GAME FROM MORRIS HARVEY, "Skeeb" Win Bout! EASILY OUTPOINTS KNOCKOUT O'CONNOR, Football Team Motors To Morgantown and Armistice Day Program Presented By Glee Club. There were stories of George Firestone, Miss Willa Brand and Paul Dawson. The class of 1924 was named the George Firestone class. The class colors were orange and black. The Lyceum Program consisted three attractions: The Ladies Rainbow Orchestra, Noah Bulharz, Impersonator and Reader and The Ghost Between, a play. The Tower made note that these were some of the highest priced attractions available and were also the most expensive ones the Normal had ever arranged to bring to Glenville. The Boys' and Girls' Glee Clubs performed at Friday morning sessions of chapel and there appeared in the Tower a "Personals" column letting the readers know the social gossip of the week. For example, "Miss Mary Hefner of Burnsville visited Erna Engle on Sunday."

In the last issue of April in 1954, The Mercury news included: President Heflin's attendance of the inauguration of Dr. William J. L. Wallace as the fourth president of W.Va. State College. The names of seven seniors doing their student teaching in Gilmer County Schools were released. The Holy Roller Court (TKE) and Kappa Sigma Kappa (Theta Xi) appeared in "Frat Chat" while Sorority Simmerings included Kappa Chi Kappa (Alpha Sigma) and Xi Beta Tau (DZ). Yvonne Hart (Mrs. Yvonne King) was a reporter for the Mercury. And finally a fourth page ad saluted GSC from Roane County. 1964's April 22 edition of the Mercury featured a front page picture of Holy Roller Court members meeting to plan the annual Court Ball. The student body chose officers including Robert "Butch" Hays as treasurer and Patrick Briscoe as President. A picture of Theta Xi pledges dominated the second page as well as a story about Mothers Day Sing, sponsored by Kappa Chi Kappa. The sophomores won the annual class basketball tournament by defeating the juniors in the championship game 88-72. Bidding was announced for the Louis Bennett Hall addition and a story described the features of the new addition. Finally, the Peterson Library Award establishment was announced.

Hopefully, a few of these news items will bring back a memory or two for the alumni of 1924, 54 and 64. Maybe they will even hit home with returning alumni from other graduating years. More importantly, I hope this weekend will be a great experience for those Glenville grads that have returned. Each and every alumnus has our warmest welcome and best wishes.

The minimum wage, effective May 1 to Dec. 31, will be \$1.615 per hour. Starting Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1975, \$1.70 will be the effective rate. January 1 to Dec. 31, 1976... \$1.87 per hour and Jan. 1, 1977 and thereafter, \$1.955 will be the minimum wage as it pertains to students.

Dr. Gainer Chosen For Alumni Honor

Dr. Patrick Ward Gainer, a member of this year's Golden Anniversary Class of 1924 has been selected Alumnus of the Year for 1974.

Dr. Gainer is a widely renowned folklorist, musician, educator, perpetuator of Appalachian culture, and founder of the West Virginia State Folk Festival which is held every June in Glenville.

Dr. Gainer was first an instructor and then, an assistant professor at St. Louis University. He taught at West Virginia University from 1946 until his retirement in 1972.

Dr. Gainer is the author of several articles in scholarship journals. In 1963 he compiled the West Virginia Centennial Book of 100 songs. He also has a record album called Folk Songs of the Alleghenies on which he sings and plays some of his favorite melodies. Dr. Gainer is widely known as a lecturer on folklore and music and mountain culture. He has appeared as a guest on numerous television and radio programs.

On Alumni Day, Dr. Gainer will be the guest of honor and the speaker at the 1974 Alumni Banquet.

James Dickey's *Falling*, as fourth place winner was the highest finish in W.Va. and won out over 212 other entries from across the U.S. Additionally, Ms. Kincaid placed eleventh in the nation in pentathlon, having been entered in six events: Prose and Poetry Interp., Drama Duo (with Dave Brown), Persuasion, After Dinner Speaking, and Expository Speaking. This means, in essence, that Ms. Kincaid is the eleventh top speaker in the United States.

Glenville's other three entries, Woody Wilson, Dave Brown, and Vicki McGraner contributed the remaining sweepstakes points to push Glenville to its high national position. Mr. Wilson, also a pentathlon entry contributed 26½ sweepstakes points to Glenville's total. Mr. Wilson was entered in: Expository Speaking, Persuasion, After Dinner Speaking, Prose and Poetry Interp. Dave Brown was entered in four events: Impromptu Speaking, Prose Interp., Expository Speaking and Drama Duo (with Skip Kincaid). Vicki McGraner entered in Expository Speaking finished well in only her second contest.

Glenville had a total of 21 first place ballots in the four preliminary rounds. Glenville's fifteenth place national finish is a somewhat phenomenal outcome with only four team members and fifteen total entries. Glenville State College is now nationally recognized in the field of forensics.

The last tournament for Glenville is the Interstate National Oratory Finals at Pueblo State University, Pueblo, Colorado, May 1-3—Skip Kincaid is one of two representatives from West Virginia competing in Persuasion. Ms. Kincaid's oration is a problem/solution/persuasive speech on the Pet Population Explosion. The speech has already won two trophies and hopefully will do well at Pueblo.
