Two members of the GSC faculty have been chosen Outstanding Educators of America for 1974. The two, Mr. Bernard McKown and Dr. Frank Jenio, were selected for this honor on the basis of their professional and civic achievements.

Outstanding Educators of America is an annual awards program honoring distinguished men and women for their exceptional service, achievements, and leadership in the field of education.

Mr. McKown graduated from GSC with an AB degree in math and physical science. He received the MA degree in 1960 from West Virginia University. He was recipient of the National Science Foundation Scholarship for High School Science and Mathematics Teachers and other scholarships to Case Institute of Technology, Cornell University, and Marshall University.

He is a member of the Masonic

Lodge, the NEA, VWEA, Association of Higher Education, and the National Science Teachers' Association.

Mr. McKown is married and the father of three children.

Dr. Jenio received his BS degree in 1964 and his MS degree in 1967 from Eastern Michigan University. He received his Ph.D. in 1972 from Southern Illinois University. His doctorate degree is in the field of Zoology. His research interest is the Ecology and Biology of Fresh Water Animals, especially crustaceans.

Dr. Jenio has been at GSC for three years teaching primarily Zoology classes. He has a number of students doing research projects. He and Dr. Chisler have recently co-authored a student study guide for general biology textbook.

Dr. Jenio is the past president of FAO. His hobbies are photography, camping, and some sports. He is married and the father of two boys.

Dean's List Is Raised To 3.5

The 1974 Commencement will be held on Friday, May 10, at 11:00 a.m., in the Health and Physical Education Building, at which time 337 degrees will be conferred.

The speaker for the occasion will be The Honorable Elizabeth Harden Gilmore, Vice President of the West Virginia Board of Regents.

Mrs. Gilmore is a fourth generation Charlestonian. She was graduated from Garnett High School, Charleston, West Virginia; attended West Virginia State College; Bethune Cookman College, Daytona Beach, Florida. She was the first woman to be licensed as a Funeral Director and has held a license since 1940. Mrs. Gilmore has been a Sunday School Teacher for 27 years and served as superintendent of the Church School, Simpson Memorial United Methodist Church, Charleston, West Virginia, and was a Girl Scout Leader for 24 years.

Mrs. Gilmore was a charter mem-

ber of Child Care Centers, Incorporated, serving six years as President, five years as Treasurer, and 21 years as a volunteer worker and member of the Board of Directors.

Mrs. Gilmore's community activities include the following: Member of the Charleston Area League of Women Voters, former member Advisory Committee - Volunteer Service Bureau (six terms), Nation Committee for the Day Care of Children, panel of American Women (former coordinator), Education Task Force - Charleston Area Chamber of Commerce, and individual member - Community Council.

Mrs. Gilmore is the owner and operator of Harden and Harden Funeral Home, Charleston, West Virginia.

Her daughter is Mrs. Elizabeth Harden Bridges, Programmer in the Applied Research and Aerodynamic Design Compressor Unit of General Electric, Cincinnati, Ohio.

As with every editorial, I've dreaded writing this and procrastinated enough to find time for writing several editorials. I've looked up editorials on the same subject, as usual. I've asked Mrs. King and the Mercury Staff for advice as usual. Now, the time has come when this editorial must be written and here I sit, with my yellow pad and pen, on my own, with little time, as usual. Before I go on, I must defend myself and say that I don't dislike writing - it's that I dislike writing editorials, particularly because it is extremely tiring (and a bit defeating) to have each editorial viciously attacked on a number of different counts by those on campus more intellectually sophisticated than I.

But, it's about time that I gave this paper up to someone else and they can hassle with it. I have worked as reporter, feature editor, news editor, assistant editor and finally as Editor-in-Chief. And now since my academic life is a few days from its end, I yield this paper to Chuck White. But first, a few final observations:

It is sad, and a bit frightening to me personally that, after four years at Glenville, the college suddenly has become the victim of several senseless destructive acts of violence. For no apparent reason, four plate glass windows were destroyed at the Robert F. Kidd Library, the lights in front of Clark Hall were broken, the very expensive and treasured violins and violas were stolen from the music department and (this probably the vilest act of all) obscene words were painted across the dedication plaques for Pickens Hall. The persons responsible for these acts of vandalism are still unknown. Whether one person was responsible or several is also unknown, but these facts are irrelevant. Instead, it is frightening that people with the ability to viciously destroy property are here, perhaps, on GSC's campus. These are the things that we read about - that happen to everyone but us. Until now, I felt quite removed from campus violence. Then, at the end of the year, in beautiful weather, on a nice quiet day, for no reason at all, someone with a deranged mind or a misguided concept of ideals chose to commit these crimes.

Perhaps one of the nicest aspects of Glenville (despite the complaints of most students) is its serenity. When a freshman, I thought as a freshman. College life was dull compared to the vivid stories I'd heard and GSC didn't live up to my expectations. So, as with the majority, I complained about this "hole" and went home on every week-end. As I proceeded to my sophomore year and, being a little more independent, I got into weekends at other colleges, visiting friends instead of week-ends at home. My junior year, I found myself at Glenville more often than not, yet I still had an antipathy toward this place and wished for graduation. Then I became a senior and my attitude suddenly changed. I became affected with that strange emotion, sentimentality that overcomes all seniors. All of a sudden, Glenville's serenity is kind of nice. The campus also holds a certain beauty as the students and places are all reminders of good times. And, now, I've jumped on the bandwagon again and joined the rest of the seniors in my regret to leave. So, Glenville has become important to me. Instructors, students, friends, sorority sisters, and many others have made this college and my four years here fantastic. I say this because I feel that I'm speaking not only for myself but for a majority of seniors. Perhaps a big mistake was waiting until now to realize all of this.

But, these feelings have been somewhat soured by what happened last week. I sincerely hope that the \$500 reward money will be collected. I only regret that such an unpleasant method had to be employed, it kind of emphasizes the ugliness of the situation to me. Somehow I'd like to believe that the vandals weren't GSC students . . .

I regret that I had to write my last editorial on such a tasteless subject and undoubtedly, there will be criticism. This is probably my biggest regret of all as editor, that I had to hassle with being pulled in every direction over this editorial page. Many complained that we weren't controversial enough, yet many were critical of our few attempts to approach liberal issues. Almost everyone complained about something at one time or another. Despite this, the Mercury has been a challenging and rewarding experience and I'd like to thank a very patient and loyal advisor for more than I could possibly express here. I'd also like to thank the over-worked, underpaid, and dedicated 1973-74 staff. Finally, I want to express my sincerest and deepest appreciation to two very close and loyal Mercury supporters, Dr. D. Banks Wilburn and Mrs. Jean Wright for their consideration and confidence.

My very best wishes to Chuck White and his versatile 1974-75 staff.

The Glenville College golf team Tuesday stroked its way into the NAIA national tournament with a victory in the West Virginia Inter-collegiate Athletic golf tournament.

The Pioneers with 631 outshot Fairmont and West Liberty, which tied for second place at 636.

Alderson-Broadus' Ron Povich with the tourney's individual leader, carding a five-under-par 149 for the two-day, 36-hole event at the Pipestem golf course.

Povich heads the all-WVIAC squad, which includes John Herdic of West Liberty, Larry Spotloe of Fairmont, Don Erickson of Salem and Bob Weaner of Davis & Elkins.

Glenville will represent District 28 in the NAIA national championships June 4 at Aberdeen, S.D.

Davis & Elkins finished third at 650, followed by Alderson-Broadus, 665; Concord, 666; Shepherd, 671; Morris Harvey, 684; Salem 689; Bluefield, 704; West Virginia Tech, 743; and West Virginia State, 781.

Bob Wilson, a graduate of South Charleston High School and the son of Mr. and Mrs. C.E. Wilson of South Charleston, ended the regular season with an average of 80.6. The 3 year letter-winner and a 1973 All-WVIAC performer has been a good influence on the young linksters at Glenville. He is pleased the youngsters have done so well. Bob was a member of the 1972 Golf team that attended the NAIA tournament in New Mexico.

Joe Keener, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph B. Keener of Parkersburg, is a 1971 graduate of Parkersburg High School. Joe has averaged 85.8 for his 10 rounds of golf this season. Joe played golf and lettered 3 years in high school.
