Members of the West Virginia Board of Regents met on the Glenville State College campus Tuesday and Wednesday for their regular September meeting. Following their arrival on Tuesday afternoon, they were guests at a dinner in the Multipurpose room at which student leaders were also guests.

The president's reception for new faculty followed at 7:30 p.m. Regent members were introduced to faculty members in a social atmosphere.

Wednesday's meeting took place in the Multipurpose room with members of the press and other visitors present. Among business concluded during the meeting was the appointment of Mr. Jerry Lee Jones as president of Parkersburg Community College.

Teacher Education Requires Planning

In 1931 Glenville State Teacher's College produced only teachers but as times change, so has our college. In 1943 the institution changed its name to Glenville State College. Today Glenville produces forestry majors, liberal arts majors, and business majors but teacher education still tilts the scales heavily in their favor as some 80 percent of the GSC enrollment is headed towards education degrees.

Teacher education usually begins during one's freshman year when education is taken. This course is an indoctrination towards teaching and its many facets. Following closely is Education 201 where the student is first thrust into the teaching experience as one is required ten hours of outside activities such as the program Headstart. If by now the student still has the intestinal fortitude to strive to become a teacher, sometime between Education 201 and Education 301, he must apply for admission to teacher education. Upon acceptance, he enrolls in Education 301 thus continuing his culminating experience in teacher education. This class is generally regarded as the beginning of the learning theory. Following the 301 experience, one then applies for acceptance to student teaching and the block.

Certain requirements must be fulfilled before acceptance is cleared. A student must carry a "C" average or better in his major field as well as having written recommendations from his 301 instructor advisor, department head and Dean of Academic Affairs.

Upon acceptance into the block or professional semester, the first seven weeks of the semester is dedicated to learning the history and philosophy of teaching as well as the special methods which are necessary for one to competently cope with most any situation.

The final eleven weeks of the professional semester is reserved for the actual classroom teaching experience. In these eleven weeks the student teacher is expected to become familiar with the faculty, administration and school policy.

When student teaching, one main entity is stressed total involvement. This involvement is stressed to the student teachers and the fulltime teachers to utilize his time for the betterment of the students, school, and system.

The final evaluation is made by the college supervisor, department representative and the supervisor of the institution.

In February of one's junior year, a meeting is held where the potential student teachers make the choice of where they want to do their student teaching.

Placement of student teachers is one of the main concerns of the personnel involved. An honest effort is made to consider every factor involved in placement. Some of the important elements are ample space at the institution involved contacting administration on availability, the economic strains of the student teachers, transportation involved, and the equalization process of distribution of student teachers to counties.

If the involved students would understand and follow procedure throughout their college career relatively few difficulties would occur.

Enrollment 4.5% Lower

At the close of registration for the first semester, 1974-75, Thursday, August 29, 1974, the resident enrollment at Glenville State College stands at 1,410. This number is 67 less than at the beginning of the first semester, 1973-74. The decrease in enrollment represents a 4.5 per cent decline.

The figures listed above do not include any off-campus enrollments in extension classes that will be organized after September 3, in the following locations Braxton County High School, Sutton; Clay County High School, Clay; Lewis County High School, Weston; Nicholas County High School, Summersville; Harrisville High School, Harrisville, and in Webster County at a location to be determined. The plot shows how Tony, attractive young son of the Kirbys, falls in love with Alice Sycamore and brings his parents to dine at the Sycamore home on the wrong evening. The shock sustained by the Kirbys who are invited to eat cheap food, shows Alice that marriage with Tony is out of the question. The Sycamores however, though sympathetic to Alice, find it hard to realize her point of view.

Meantime Tony, who knows the Sycamores are right and his own people wrong, will not give her up, and in the end Mr. Kirby is converted to the happy madness of the Sycamores, particularly since he happens in during a visit by an ex-Grand Duchess earning her living as a waitress. Matters are complicated by a mother that writes pornographic plays on a typewriter delivered by mistake, a daughter that studies ballet in the parlor, a son-in-law that distributes revolutionary propaganda in home-made candy, a father that manufactures fireworks in the cellar, and a grandfather that has evaded the Internal Revenue since 1914.

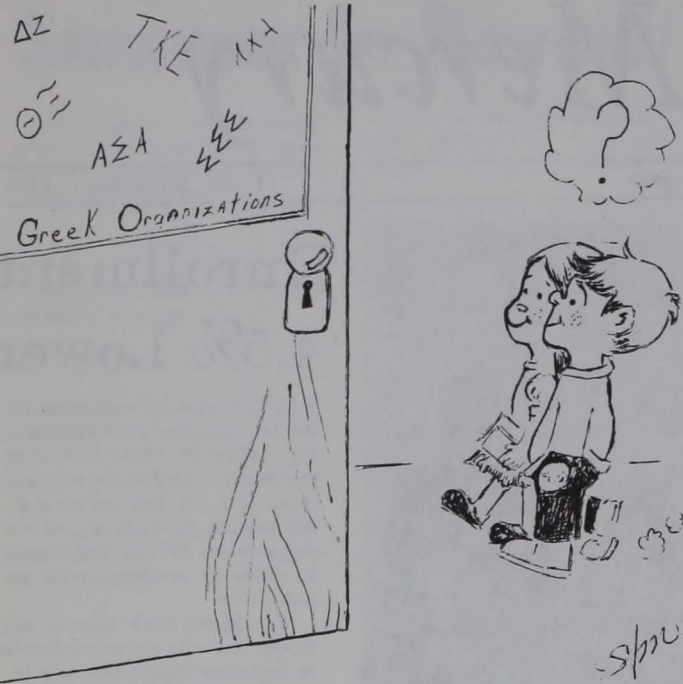
Stewart Is Mgr. Workshop Given

Dr. Alfred T. Billips, Dean of Student Affairs, has released that "friendly moving day" for residents of Pickens and Louis Bennett Halls will be Sunday Sept. 15, 1974, from 6:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m.

No moves may be made prior to the designated hours or forfeiture of right to move will be the result. Moves must be mutually agreeable between the parties involved and no one can be asked to vacate or forced to vacate their original room assignment.

Procedure for movement involves both parties reporting to the residence hall office and presenting their keys to the residence hall staff member in charge. After a record is made of the change and a key is formally issued, the students may return to their room, obtain their possessions, and move to the permanently assigned room.

Men may move between halls if they have a replacement from the hall they intend to enter and thus replace the vacancy they create.

The second production of the season will be Arthur Miller's tremendously impressive drama *All My Sons*. He received the Drama Critics Award for the best new American play of the Broadway season.

The play requires six men and four women. *All My Sons* will open February 26 and will run through the 28th with curtain at 8:00 p.m. each performance.

The story is concerned with the fortunes of the Keller and Deever families. During the war Joe Keller and Herbert Deever ran a machine shop which made airplane parts. Deever was sent to prison because the firm turned out defective parts, causing the deaths of many men. Keller went free and made a lot of money. The turn shadows of this catastrophe and the fact that the young Keller son was reported missing during the war dominate the action. The love affair of Chris Keller and Ann Deever, the bitterness of George Deever returned from the war to find his father in prison and his father's partner free, are all set in a structure of almost unbearable

power. The climax showing the reactions of a son to his guilty father is a fitting conclusion to a play electrifying in its intensity.

The third production of the season will be A.A. Milne's enchanting children's story *Winnie-the-Pooh*. The cast of 13 will present the show April 15 and 16 with performances at 10:30 a.m., 1:30 p.m., and 8:00 p.m.

The story revolves around Winnie-the-Pooh, Christopher Robin's fat little bear of Very Little Brain, who would like to drift peacefully through life humming tunes and stopping frequently to eat "a little something." However, he finds himself involved in all sorts of frantic adventures assisted by such friends as the dismal Eeyore, Piglet, and Rabbit, with his countless relations.

A.A. Milne's wit and special understanding of what will interest and amuse an audience will be presented in this amusing dramatization.

Theta Xi

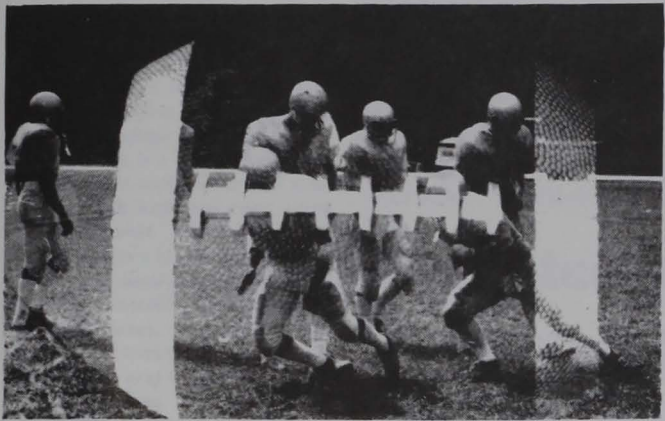
The Theta Xi's will be having open house Sept. 14, for the first football game.

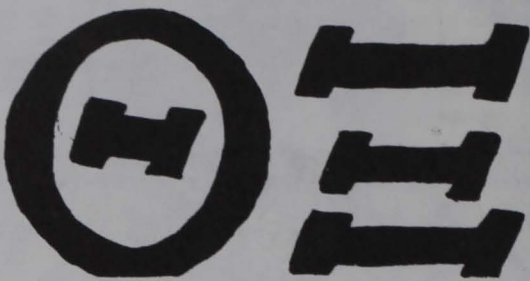
