Manley Announces Added Equipment

"After three years of planning, GSC now has the equipment necessary to provide nearly complete physical therapy treatment," so reports Dr. Manley, GSC physician.

Following major renovations last summer, Dr. Manley now has sufficient room to treat seven patients simultaneously. Three active patient treatment areas are now in use. The infirmary is equipped with three new machines for physical therapy treatment in addition to the X-ray facilities, whirlpool, infra-red and ultra violet lamps.

Hot moist packs can be utilized by means of the new Hydrocolator unit and is used for muscle injuries. Another modality purchased recently by the college is a "Medco-sono-This is a very sophisticated machine that combines muscle stimulation with high frequency sound wave treatment. The muscle stimulation increases blood flow while the ultra-sound breaks down fibrous tissue and congestion of the muscles and joint areas. A long-wave diatherny completes the new equipment and permits heat to be driven deeply into muscle areas

If you suffer from sore muscles, separations or torn ligaments, the infirmary awaits you.

Duke Tamburitzans Featured In Lyceum

The Duquesne University Tamburitzans will present their current concert production at the Glenville State College Auditorium on Friday, September 27, 1974, at 8:00 p.m.

The Tamburitzans will appear here under the sponsorship of the Lyceum-Convocation Committee.

Each year the Tamburitzans present an entirely new concert portraying the culture of the Slavic peoples of the world. The professional credits of Pittsburgh's collegiate performers extend over the United States, Canada, Europe and Latin America. Serving as goodwill ambassadors for our State Department and occasionally upon invitation by foreign governments, the Tamburitzans have made extended tours of Europe in 1950 and 1952, Yugoslavia and Italy in 1962, Latin America in the summer of 1968 and Rumania, Poland and the Soviet Union during the summer of 1969. Their most recent tour took place in the summer of 1972 when they made a nine week, four country tour of Czechoslovakia, France, Greece

This group of highly talented folk artists dedicated to the preservation of Slavic folk culture take their name from the musical instrument they play—the "tamburitzan." Using over five hundred authentic costumes in each concert, the Tamburitzans sing in a dozen different European languages and do the dances of as many countries. The performance is an exciting spectacle of music, color and dance.

Each Tamburitzan is a full-time student at Duquesne University and receives a complete scholarship in exchange for participation in the troupe. Candidates are chosen on the basis of academic achievement and proficiency as singers, dancers or instrumentalists.

\$11,600 in non-federal scholarships was awarded to 62 Glenville State College students for the fall semester of the 1974-1975 school year. Of this \$11,600, \$9,200 was awarded through the Claude W. Benedum Scholarship Fund with the remainder coming from the John C. Shaw Scholarship Fund.

These scholarships are awarded to W.Va. applicants with an overall grade average of 3.0 or better. The Benedum Scholarship is awarded primarily to freshmen and the Shaw Scholarship carries a moral stipulation which prohibits the recipient from using any alcoholic beverages or frequenting any type of tobacco product.

Season tickets for football games are \$2.00 under the new user fee. This will mark a saving of \$.50 for the five home games.

Also participating in scholarship awards at Glenville State College is the W. Va. Board of Regents and the W. Va. Scholarship Program. The Board of Regents Scholarship awards 75 students per year with funds to aid in financing their college education. The W. Va. Scholarship Program accomodates 20 new students per year with full payment of tuition for four school years.

Applications for both of these state-supported scholarships are open to any full time students at Glenville State College.

Dr. Joseph N. Riddel, now a professor of English at the University of California at Los Angeles, a graduate of Glenville State College in the Class of 1953, English and physical education, has published his third book in the field of literary

Recently, Dr. Riddel published The Inverted Bell, Modernism and the Counterpoetics of William Carlos Williams, at the Louisiana State University Press in Baton Rouge.

Previously, Dr. Riddel had published a book on C. Day Lewis, the English poet, and another work on Wallace Stevens, entitled, The Clairvoyant Eye, The Poetry and Poetics of Wallace Stevens.

While a student at Glenville State College, Professor Riddel, formerly of Grantsville in Calhoun County, lettered in three sports, football, basketball, and baseball.

Speed And Size Asset Chargers

The 1974 Hillsdale football team arrives in Glenville with a record of 0-1 after losing a heartbreaker to Ferris State of Michigan, 27-17. They are embarking on a new era with first year head coach Jack McAvoy who was the defensive coordinator since 1967.

The Chargers have not had a losing season since 1967 and McAvoy comments, "Our passing attack is the biggest question mark. If it comes through we'll have a good season. We should be tough defensively but you have to consider this a rebuilding year.

McAvoy will run a power I offensive with plenty of blocking required of the running backs. When Hillsdale has backs that can run the 100 yard dash in 9.9 seconds they do not need too much blocking.

The Chargers have many outstanding individuals that the Pioneer rooter should keep their eyes on. Leading the list are: Senior splitend, Mike Rudy (6-3, 185), an All-American his sophomore year. Expected to be drafted by the pros.


