Pulitzer Prize Winner Returns For Homecoming Encore Show

Homecoming at GSC will take a dramatic twist this year as the Speech Department hosts the 1952 cast of You Can't Take It With You at their October 18th performance of that Pulitzer Prize winning comedy

In a human interest interview with Dean Clarence Maze, cast then as Paul Sycamore, we found theatre in 1952 an important and enthusiastic element of the college community.

"Four hundred students and thirty five faculty members contributed to a closely knit group and an excellent communication system. Every Thursday morning, all students would gather for an assembly at which time announcements were made. Theatre tryouts and technical crews were well supported.'

1952 stage director, Marjory Skelton was a popular personality on campus promoting the excitement theatre offers still today. "All cast members, except one," mused Dean Maze, ' were in academicareas other than Speech and Drama. Several star football players had roles in You Can't Take It With You. Paul Lanham, now assistant coach of the Washington Redskins, was a member of the cast.'

In recalling the facilities of the former Speech Dept., Dr. Maze noted the area as located in what is

now the business dept. in the basement floor of the administration building. Plays were also done experimentally and riser seats were placed in the single large room that was occupied by the department. Ohnimgohow, Alpha Psi Omega theatre fraternity and forensics were strong.

You Can't Take It With You was performed only once as were most of the plays while GSC was at a smaller enrollment. The plays were greeted with enthusiasm, appreciation and pride.

In adding a comparative note, Dr. Maze recognized the GSC theatre of 1952 as being "excellent in its time...but the theatre at GSC in 1974 is staged technically more professionally and acting techniques are more superior."

"It was a time of fun, excitement and great reward," concluded Dean Maze .

"All these plans we make ... what happens to them? It's only a handful of the lucky ones that can look back and say that they even came close."

The Mercury, Alumni Director, Judy Meads and Dean Maze contributed the names and present occupations of that hilarious group who made You Can't Take It With You a hit in 1952.

Jill Cummings is a reporter from Poca, W.Va. She is a freshman and her major is liberal arts. Jill is a member of the cast of You Can't Take It With You.





The football coaching staff was pleased with the junior varsity showing last Monday night with their win over the Salem Tiger J. V., 21-0.



Salem Tigers Defeat G-Men

The Salem Tigers came out roar ing the second half of last Saturday's game to take a hard fought 14-6 win over the Pioneers. The loss was the second of the year for the Pioneers, while the Tigers stayed unbeaten with a 4-0 mark.

Salem opened the scoring with 2:31 left in the first quarter when All-Conference running back Jack Deloplaine galloped fifteen yards for the touchdown. The extra point try was missed

With the Tigers ahead 6-0 the Pioneers put together a 56 yard eight play drive that tied the score at 6-6. Rick Lemley crossed the goal from the three yard line with 9:38 left in the half to score the only GSC touchdown of the night. L'arry Wolfe's extra point try was wide to the left.

Near the end of the first half Glenville mounted another scoring threat, but Wolfe again pulled his 31 yard field goal attempt to the left, leaving the score knotted at 6-6.

The final and winning score of the night came in the third stanza when quarterback Dave Wright engineered a 55 yard seven play drive. Wright rambled over from the nine yard line. Deloplaine scored the final points when he ran for the two point conversion.

The Pioneers never threatened in the closing minutes of play when Salem smothered both the passing and running attacks of the Pioneers.

Statistically, both teams collected 12 first downs, but Salem rushed for 172 yards on the ground compared to 62 vards for Glenville, GSC held the aerial advantage with 88 yards to 44 yards for Salem.

Individually, Ed Wilson led the Pioneer running attack with 20 yards in 17 carries; Lemley and Mitchem carried the ball for 18 and 15 yards respectively.

Glenville hosts the powerful archrival Fairmont Falcons this coming Saturday at Rohrbough Field starting at 1:30 p.m.


Neither team scored in the second or third quarters when the defensive units of both teams tightened

GSC Pioneers Set For Bird Plucking

Coming into Glenville Saturday are arch-rivals,, the Fairmont Falcons, who are supporting a 4-0 conference record and an overall record of 4-1. The last time the Pioneers played the Falcons was for the WVIAC Conference Championship in Parkersburg last year where the "birds" upset the eventual NAIA runner-up Pioneers.

Coach Bill Kerr's forces are one of the strongest opponents Glenville will face this year. Salem, one can say, was another strong opponent. Fairmont has won eight out of their last nine contests dating back into last year's season. This year the Falcons have beaten Shepherd, Bluefield, WV Wesleyan, and WV State, Their only loss was inflicted by Edinboro College by the score of 12-7.

Fairmont State has many outstanding individuals on their squad. On offensive, Fullback Mike Maxim and tailback John Paul Jones, provide most of the running game for the Falcons. Fall Golf Season Begins With Dual Match Loss




