The first Homecoming Queen was crowned by President E.G. Rohrbough. She hailed from Wirt County.

In 1939, Miss Jean McGee from Glenvillereigned as the second queen. Miss Ruth Annabell Hull, also of Glenville, was crowned on October

26, 1940. 1941's celebration crowned Miss Madlyn Conrad as GSC's fourth Homecoming Queen.

In October, 1942, a new President, D.L. Haught, crowned Miss June Wilson of Clarksburg.

Miss Katherine Hall, a resident of Hallway, reigned as Homecoming Queen in 1946.

For 1947, President Heflin crowned the seventh queen, Ellen Mae Scott of Beckley.

The student body, chose Miss Jo Ann Foreman of Porter to be Homecoming Queen in 1948.

Queen Alfreda Taylor reigned over the festivities in 1949. She hailed from Richwood.

The tenth Homecoming queen crowned in October of 1950, was Miss Nadine Clark from Cowen.

Miss Doris Perkins was crowned queen on October 20, 1951. She was from Nicholas County.

A St. Marys senior, Miss Dorothy Terril reigned as queen of the Homecoming festivities in 1952.

The thirteenth Homecoming queen was Miss Sally Waggoner of Elizabeth.

Huttonsville was the home of the 1954 queen - Miss Elaine Bell.

In 1955, Miss Mary Lee Foster was elected by the student body to reign over the 23rd Homecoming

The 24th Homecoming celebration crowned Miss Rose Mary Gwenn from Richwood.

Also from Richwood, Miss Leona Hamptor reigned as queen over the 25th annual festivities.

In 1959, Miss Flora Ann Dyer was crowned Homecomingqueen over the 26th annual Homecoming celebra-

tion - Flatwoods was her home. The 19th queen was crowned in Miss Mary Ann Graham hailed from South Charleston.

In 1961, the title of Homecoming Queen was held by Miss Shelia Wilmott of Millstone.

Miss Betty Ann Brown was elected by the student body as queen in 1962. She was from Orlando.

A native of Glenville, Miss Mary Jo Nocida was crowned Homecoming queen in 1963.

In 1964, Miss Maribell Taylor of Rainelle reigned over the 31st Homecoming activities.

The next fall, Miss Patsy Ruth was elected Homecoming queen. Miss Brake hailed from Brake.

Miss Sandra Kay Salyers from Parkersburg served as queen in 1966.

Banks Wilburn has received notification that the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education has reaccredited Glenville State College for a 10-year period to offer programs to prepare elementary and secondary teachers at the baccalaureate level. The anniversary date of this accreditation is September 1, 1974 which extends the accreditation until September 1,

The college was visited this past

March 24-27, 1974, by a team of educators from colleges and universities in the eastern and southeastern regions of the country. The report of the visiting team to the National Council was the basis on which the action resulting in reaccreditation was made .

With the reaccreditation by the National Council for Accreditations of Teacher Education, Glenville State College is now fully accredited by both a national and its regional accrediting agency. The North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools returned the College on March 22, 1972, to full accredita-

Mr. T. Scott Hamilton Selected Winner

Today Glenville State College will honor Terrance Scott Hamilton with the presentation of the twenty-second annual Frank Montrose Award.

Hamilton played an important role in the past season's runner-up position in the NAIA Division II football playoffs for GSC. Hamilton's success ranged farther than Glenville as this stellar performer was named to the WVIAC All-Conference Team in the years of 1970, 1972, and 1973. In 1973 Hamilton was also named Defensive Player of the Year by the coaches of all the teams of the conference.

Following the 1973 season and its success, Hamilton was named to the first team Kodak All-American Defensive Squad.

The Frank Montrose Award is given annually to the most prolific senior GSC athlete. The award was initiated in 1952 when the Student Council decided to showcase an outstanding senior athlete. The committee searched to find a man of athletic merit, outstanding scholastic average, and unimpeachable moral character. With the suggestion of Frank Montrose their search was ended.

In the year of 1939 Frank Montrose came to the GSC campus as a promising football prospect. By the second week of the regular season, Montrose had proved himself as a college gridder. Against rival Fairmont, Montrose scored two sixpointers while passing for a third. His first collegiate score came on a dazzling 63 yard punt return.

Against Shepherd, Montrose "did it all", setting up the Pioneer's first score on a 17 yard sweep. GSC's next score belonged to Montrose on a 12 yard scamper. A 59 yard open field jaunt was the next Montrose score which he followed up with a 46 yard interception return enabling the Pioneers to score again.

This stardom was short-lived as Montrose began to play less and less. The spring of 1940 brought disaster as Montrose was stricken with nephritis, causing him to lose his eyesight and to withdraw from school.

Shortly before Montrose left school, Mercury sports editor, Earl McDonald, shook his hand and quipped, "See you in September at training camp." But September never arrived as Frank Montrose died from his fight with nephritis on June 21.

Pioneer Is An Old Tradition

In the fall of 1933 the students of Glenville State College decided to elect a spirit leader for the athletic teams. The qualifications were that he must be a senior male in good academic standing and having never lettered in any sport. With this criteria in mind an election was held in which Charles Bennett was chosen as Glenville's first Pioneer.

His official duties in his new position were to attend the coronation of the Homecoming Queen, participate in the Homecoming parade, and fire up the student spirit for the Homecoming game.

Homer Blackhurst, the 1934 Pioneer, had the distinction of becoming the first Pioneer to be admitted for membership in the G-Club.

In 1942 John Fiddler was chosen to enthuse the teams and lead the student body at the games.

Then in 1954 GSC's Homecoming was a little dampened when the field flooded and Homecoming was cancelled. William Rumbaugh was the illustrious Pioneer that year.

In 1965 Pioneer Butch Hays had the unique experience of using three different muzzle loaders: a Kentucky Long Rifle, a double barrel muzzle loader, and finally a .69 caliber rifle. Of these three the first two exploded.

In this year of 1974 we at GSC are proud to have Rick Pierson to lead our spirit as Pioneer. Pierson is a senior business administration major from Milton, WV. He is vice-president of Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity and also an active letterman of the wrestling team.

Like the forty-two Pioneers behim, Pierson sports the garb of buckskins, coonskin cap, and beard.







Congress Approves Compromise Bill

By unanimous votes, both House and Senate Oct. 10 approved a new compromise bill raising GI educational benefits 23 percent retroactive to Sept. 1. The bill (HR 12628) now goes to the White House The measure also established a new loan program for veterans to supplement their benefits, and increases veterans maximum entitlement to the present 36 to 45 months of benefits, with the extra months usable only for undergraduate study.

Under the measure, the monthly benefit for a veteran studying full-time would be increased from \$220 to \$270, while the rate for a veteran with one dependent would rise from \$261 to \$321 and the rate for veterans with two dependents from \$298 to \$366. Proportionate increases would be provided for veterans studying three quarter and half time.

The loan program, to be run by the Veterans Administration, would provide loans up to \$600 to veterans who could not get help from other Federal loan programs.

Approval of the GI bill was one of many actions taken by Congress this week as it worked to clear the decks of legislation and start a month long election recess at the close of business Oct. 11. Congress is scheduled to resume sessions Nov. 12.

CLEP INFO RELEASED

Mr. Kermit Kinder, Director of Guidance, has released information concerning the College Level Examination Programs.

Beginning as of January 1, 1975 there will be an increment on general testing from \$15.00 to \$20.00, two tests on general areas remain \$30.00 while specific area tests on 3-5 subjects increase to \$40.00.

There is, however, still time to avoid the increase in fees. CLEP testing will take place November 6-11 and December 13-18 at present fees while the January 13-18 testing
