Nat'l Chi Beta Phi Convention Slated

Chi Beta Phi originated in the mind of John Howard Green during his senior year at Randolph-Macon College, Ashland, Virginia. While working in the laboratory, Mr. Green conceived the idea of a general science and mathematics fraternity which would give to undergraduates special opportunities to discuss the latest achievements in science and the outstanding problems in these fields of endeavor. Mr. Green talked over his project with some of his classmates and finally with three professors in the science department at Randolph-Macon, and the fraternity was organized in April, 1916

Since this beginning, Chi Beta Phi has grown to twenty-eight chapters. These chapters expand from New York to Alabama and from Virginia to Arkansas. Glenville State College was chartered as Alpha Iota chapter in 1963. This is purely an honorary fraternity and the goals are to promote interest in the fields nce and mathematics.

This past Thursday, November 1974, the Alpha Iota chapter initiated five new members who meet these requirements. The requirements for membership in Chi Beta Phi are that (1) the candidate must be a science or mathematics major; (2) he or she must have com-

mathematics courses; (3) they must e a cumulative average of 2.4 or higher; and (4) they must have an average of 3.0 or higher in their field of major. These new members are Joseph Boggs, a sophomore biolmajor from St. Albans; John , a senior mathematics major from Alum Bridge; Joseph McCray, senior chemistry major from Smithville, Calvin Morrison, a senior mathematics major from Jane Lew; and Charles Stewart, a senior biology major from Glenville. The induction was held in the Multi-purpose room and a reception followed.

Each year the fraternity holds a national convention to be held on one of the chapters' campuses. This year it is the honor of Alpha Iota chapter of Glenville State College to be the host chapter. At the present time, we are making plans for this convention which will be held from March 20-22. Also next spring we will hold a banquet for the new members of this semester and the spring semester. The old members and faculty members of the science departments will be invited. The date for this banquet has not been decided, but will be announced at a later date. This proves to be a very exciting and eventful year for the Alpha Iota chapter of Chi Beta Phi.

1st Place Pentathlon Trophy Captured By West Virginian

Leisering of the Speech Department, the Glenville State College Forensics Team finished fourth out of 28 schools at the Mid-East Individual Events Tournament held this past weekend at Parkersburg Community College and produced its first pentathlon winner since the team was formed two and a half years ago. Glenville was beaten on total points only by Ohio University, Eastern Michigan and Oberlin each of which had more than double the entries that Glenville had. Glenville easily finished first among W. Va. schools entered including Parkersburg Community College, Fairmont, W Va. State and Marshall University. The team also beat such schools as: Penr. State, Carlow, U. of N. Carolina, Otterbein, Lorraine County Community College, Wright State, Bowling Green, Toledo U, Akron U., Georgetown, Ky., Western Ky., and California State.

Skip Kincaid in her best overall performance yet finished first in Pentathlon (those who entered five events). This is the first pentathlon winner Glenville has ever had and the first pentathlon winner from W. Va. Pentathlon is a grueling ordeal, requiring talent, stamina and desire. Ms. Kincaid showed she had all that and more as she swept to the semifinals in all five of her events and to the finals in three of those five, tying for a finals finish in a fourth event and missing out by one point on the secondary scoring system.

Ms. Kincaid semi-finaled in Prose Interpretation, Drama Duo Interpretation (with Art Wilt), Informative Speaking and Humorous Speaking and finaled in Prose, placing second out of 120 entries with her professional presentation of a cutting from Paper Moon by Joe David Brown Humorous placing second out of 40 entries with a speech poking fun at our over involvement with sports; and poetry placing sixth out of 90 entries with her interpretation of "My Pa" by Herbert Martin and "Daddy" by Sylvia Plath.

As Pentathlon winner, Ms. Kincaid won over 25 other pentathlon entrants and can therefore be considered the best speaker of the 270

contestants in the contest. One of the most highly respected performers on the forensics circuit, Ms. Kinreceived a standing ovation from all the contestants and coaches at the awards ceremonies. Her judges used such adjectives to describe her as "tremendous," "miraculous," and

Glenville's fifth trophy at the contest came as the result of Art Wilt's first place finish in the Sales Talk category. Mr. Wilt moved easily three preliminary through the rounds, semi finals and finals winning over 42 other contestants with his sales effort on Steinway pianos. With the exception of Ms. Kincaid's first place pentathlon victory. Mr. Wilt holds the only first place trophy won by Glenville at the contest and Glenville's only first place trophy won in an individual category at the contest. In addition to this, Mr. Wilt, also a pentathlon entry finishing eighth, reached the semi-finals in four out of five events: Impromptu, Extemporaneous Speaking (in only his second attempt in this category), and Drama Duo (with Skip Kincaid). It was his first attempt in an Interpretive Event.

Glenville also had two other semifinalists at the contest: Brenda Maylee in Humorous Speaking and the team Dave Brown and Judy Ditlow

Returning Students Register In Dec.

The Registrar has announced the schedule for pre-registration for second semester. All students who will be returning may register any day Dec.9 to 13 between 9 am and 12 noon and again from 1 pm til 4 pm After completing the following steps, students who pay their fees during pre-registration need only to begin classes in January The steps are: 1. Students should see their advisor, work out their schedule and complete a blue and a yellow card 2. Go to the basement of the Administration Building and update profile sheets before going to the Registrar's Office. 3. Bring the blue and yellow card to the Registrar's Office. 4. (a) The Registrar's Office will take your blue and yellow cards and pull your course cards. If you want to pay your fees at that time, your blue card will be returned and you can go to the Business Office and pay your fees. (b) If you are receiving financial aid, you may pick up your check(s) on January 6 or 7 in the Little Theater. (c) If you are not receiving financial aid and want to wait until later to pay your fees, the Registrar's Office will keep both your cards. Your blue card will be returned when you pay your fees If you pay your fees by mail you should stop by the Business Office and pick up your blue card when you return in January. Fees may be paid until 4:00 pmon January 7.
Those students who do not reg-

ister during the pre-registration period in December may register only on January 7 from 8:30 am til 4:00

Glenville has again moved ahead on the forensics circuit. Last year saw a tenth place sweepstakes finish for Glenville at this contest and Ms. Kincaid finished fifth in Pentathlon.

Acting on several complaints from the student populace pertaining to student legal rights and dorm regulations, the Student Congress, with the untiring aid of Tony Franklin, initiated an opinion poll throughout the dorms. The results of this poll clearly indicated a dislike towards the present regulations which then activated responsibility in the Student Congress to amend those regulations in question. It then became evident that to do this properly the aid of an attorney would be vital so as to provide the correct legal information necessary. Since the Student Congress operates on a limited budget dependant upon the size of the enrollment retaining an attorney would be quite impossible However, there existed one last resort within our budget. That of course would be to educate ourselves in the field of student legal rights.

Needless to say, the Student Congress took the latter course of action and sent Tony Franklin and Dennis Pack to the First National Conference of Student Legal Rights which was held in New York City last weekend. However, until now the success of our operation can only be attributed to a few but the future success is dependent upon the total support of the Student Body. Already, the governing board of the respective dorms are active in their support and have even contributed money toward the initial trip and education. Now that the trip is over and our education has been earned, there remains the work of amending the out-dated regulations. Your support is necessary so show you are concerned. Participate by asking questions and answering ours, for in the future we hope to enlist several of the GSC students to participate in the amending process.

Once again, I would like to thank all of you who have participated so far

and I would also like to encourage those who are yet interested to join your Student Congress in a venture that will be remembered for years to come.

Pioneers Terminate '74 Pigskin Season

The Concord Mt. Lions shut off the Glenville Pioneers' offense in the second half of last Saturday's Southern Division title game for a come from behind 26-15 win.

Concord jumped off to an early lead when freshman quarterback Jeff Boyles hit Alex Castaneda on a 34 yard touchdown pass early in the first quarter. Terry Hughes kicked extra point making the score 7-0.

Glenville immediately closed the p when they marched down to the Lion's 17-vard line but were halted and forced to kick a 34 yard field goal by freshman Bob Casto.

The Pioneers moved ahead of the Mt. Lions late in the first quarter by the score of 9-7 when senior running back Ed Wilson drove it in from the four-yard line. But Casto's extra point attempt was wide.

Concord once again got things going in the second stanza when Boyles connected with Castaneda for their second TD combination of the day. Hughes' PAT was missed but still the Mt. Lions were ahead 13-9.

The Pioneers' freshman quarterback Tom Cowan, who was playing in place of the injured Joe Mitchem, scored the G-Men's final TD of the game and of the season when he ran it in from two yards out. Casto's PAT was once again wide but the Pioneers led 15-13 at the half.

In the second half, it was all Concord Quarterback Herb Ford who was playing in place of the injured Jeff Boyles, scored the deciding points of the game when he ran it over from one yard out. Hughes again kicked PAT making the score

In the fourth quarter, the Mountain Lions scored an insurance touch-down when Ford hit Henry Ramsey on a 59 yard aerial. They went for two on the PAT but the pass failed.

Concord dominated the statis-tics with 437 yards total offense compared to the Pioneers' 251. Ed Wilson was leading rusher for the G-men with 48 yards in 13 carries.

The Pioneers finished the 1974 season with a 5-4 record while Concord raised its record to 6-4. Concord will play in the Shrine Bowl tomorrow night as Southern Divisi-on Champions.

GS Bowling Teams Compete In Tourney

The 1974-75 GSC men's and omen's bowling teams opened up their season last Saturday in Huntington where they bowled against Marshall, WVU and Parkersburg Community College. The men did not fare too well as they came in third place while the women showed their skills and came in second place.
