Participants will be schooled in the art of the Folk Song by Dr. Patrick Gainer, West Virginia authority on the folk song. Franklin George, the undisputed virtuoso of folk instruments will make the mountain instruments come alive. And, Charles Scott, Professor of Art at Glenville State College, and a recognized figure in the folk arts, will help you get involved in such mountain crafts as chair bottom weaving and mountain toy making. He will be joined by native craftsmen from the immediate area. You will learn to square dance in the streets at night during the festival.

Registration for the course will be conducted on Sunday, June 15 at 6:00 p.m. Those taking part in the course may stay in our residence hall and eat in our cafeteria. Entire cost for room, board, tuition, and fees will be $\$ 57.29$. Those who take the course and stay elsewhere will pay $\$ 22.00$. Two credit hours may be earned in the course, or it may be audit. ## Enrollment



Mack Samples has released the summary head-count enrollment for this semester, the second of the ' $744^{\prime} 75$ Academic year. A total of 1406 are enrolled for resident credits while eight more are enrolled for noncredit Of these, 1174 are on full-time status, while 240 are in the part-time category. The totalcount for West Virginia residents is 1327. Out-of-state students number 87

Men outnumbered women this semester 747 to 667 . Broken down into classes Glenville State has 385 registered freshmen, along with 331 sophomores, 263 juniors, and 270 seniors. Unclassed personnel number 157.

In all, enrollment comparisons of this semester with last spring include a summary total decrease of 94 students. This is a $6.3 \%$ drop from the second semester of 1973-74 academic year. These decreases include a 44 drop of in-state students and a 15 deficit of out-of-state students.

Beginning this summer, GSC will serve as a branch campus for the West Virginia University graduate school. WVU faculty and some of our own faculty will be offering graduate level courses in such areas as education and administration.

This will enable students to get a Masters in three summers. This is part of an overall plan which will offer year-round classes at Jackson's Mill.

The Board of Regents also recently announced a new program where former students who did not finish due to academic failure or withdrawal may return to any of the West Virginia state schools to finish their degree. Special credit allowances will also be made for practical work experience.

Yes, Glenville has some new ideas with which to try. We only hope, those who complain of inadequacies take note of these advances.
