Dr. Maze To Leave

Dr. Clarence Maze Jr., Dean of Academic Affairs at Glenville State College was named as the new president of Richard Bland College, a two year state supported branch of the College of William and Mary. He will become president of RBC effective August 1, and will be leaving Glenville sometime during the middle of the summer at a yet to be determined date.

Dr. Maze was born in Big Bend, W. Va., and is now married to the former Marlene Dotson. They have two sons, John and Tom. Maze received a Bachelors Degree in 1953 from Glenville State College, a Masters at W. Va. University in 1956, and a Doctors Degree from Indiana University in 1962.

He has been listed in Who's Who's In American Education, Dictionary of International Biography, Leaders in Education, and Personalities of the South. Maze is also responsible for numerous publications and research projects. He has held teaching and administrative posts at Glenville State College, the University of Tennessee in Knoxville, and Ohio University.

Maze, who has been associated with Glenville State as a student, faculty member, and administrator over a period of 25 years, will succeed Dr. Cornelius Laban, who has been acting president of Richard Bland since 1973.

Dr. Hylbert Given GSC Alumni Honor

The Executive Council of the GSC Alumni Association is pleased to announce that Dr. Kenneth William Hylbert has been selected as Alumnus of the Year for 1975.

This honor is accorded annually to the alumnus who because of his outstanding achievements in his field of endeavor, has brought recognition and distinction to himself and his Alma Mater.

Currently, Dr. Hylbert is a Professor of Education and Director of the Rehabilitation Education Programs of The Pennsylvania State University Park, Pa. His academic and professional achievements rank him among the outstanding educators of America today.

Dr. Hylbert was born at Reedy. He attended Grace Elementary School and graduated from Spencer High School in 1934. He is married to the former Doris Agatha Bryan, a native of Elizabeth. The Hylberts have three children.

In 1936 Dr. Hylbert earned a Standard Normal Certificate from Glenville, and an AB Degree in Elementary Education in 1940.

In 1951, he earned an MA degree in Elementary Education from West Virginia University. In 1953, he earned a D. Ed. in guidance from The Pennsylvania State University in what was then considered to be record time of 17 months. His doctoral dissertation was the first comprehensive study of the content of graduate programs in counselor education in the United States.

Since 1955, he has been at The Pennsylvania State University where he developed and still heads a graduate program for the preparation of rehabilitation counselors to work in public and private rehabilitation programs.

With Dr. Hylbert as the one individual most responsible for the development and implementation of the concept, Penn State was the first university in the country to offer ar-

ticultated Rehabilitation Education at the undergraduate, masters, and doctoral levels.

In 1971, Dr. Hylbert was one of two persons named Man of the Year by the University of Scranton Chapter of the Rehabilitation Counseling Association. The award is presented annually to Pennsylvanians who have made outstanding contributions to rehabilitation.

From 1970 to 1972 he was appointed as a consultant in the area of rehabilitation to the U.S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington D. C. He was responsible for aiding in the development of curriculum guidelines to be followed by colleges and universities in establishing undergraduate studies in the Social and Rehabilitation Services.

Dr. Hylbert is a member of Phi Delta Kappa (national professional education Fraternity), American Personnel and Guidance Association, American Psychological Association, of Workers for the Blind, National Rehabilitation Counseling Association, American Rehabilitation Council (cont. on page 6)

Ms. Beverly Hurst Appointed

Miss Beverly Ann Hurst, a 1970 graduate of Glenville State, has been appointed to GSC's advisory board. She is replacing Mr. John H. McCutcheon, whose term expired January 1, 1975. Miss Hurst's appointment will expire January 1, 1982.

Three recommendations were submitted by Dr. D. Banks Wilburn to the Board of Regents. The Board then approved of Miss Hurst's recommendation during the February meeting. Her term officially began at that time.

After earning an AB degree in vocational home economics, she worked for her Masters degree in special education at the W. Va. Col-

lege of Graduate Studies at Institute. She has taken additional advanced credits in learning disabilities and guidance counseling.

A native of Logan, W. Va., Beverly Hurst is presently a teacher of severely handicapped children and adults at the Shawnee Hills Regional Center in Kanawha County.

Among Miss Hurst's accomplishments include recognition as an Outstanding Teacher of Exceptional Children, 1974. This is a nationwide honor. She was co-author of An Assessment Instrument, (DASH), to determine the performance level of children entering the Shawnee Hills Regional Center.

Miss Hurst has also published a multi-level training aid entitled "Map It Out, Travel About - Who Are You? Where Are You Going?"

Beverly's appointment is the second on the board of a woman, following the appointment, of Mrs. Christine Coley of Clarksburg. Chairman of the Advisory Board is Mr. H. Laban White, also of Clarksburg.

Other members include Mr. Fred H. Barnett, Parkersburg, Mr. Robert K. Park, II, Ravenswood, Mr. W. Quentin Smith, Parkersburg, and Judge Elmer David Strickler, Summersville. This Advisory Board is an advisory group to the President of the college on all general and administrative policies.

Job Hunting, Hub?

All of us are staring into nightly newscasts and morning headlines which project a bleak picture, for job hunters. The national unemployment figure has passed the eight per cent mark and depending on who one talks to, one hears "it should drop off soon" or "I wouldn't be surprised if it hits nine and a half." The only open job market seems to be in governmental advisory positions. The president has enough advisors now, that if he were to take each of their "two cents worth" he could wipe out the national debt.

Johnny Carson has had a series of reports of where some of our precious tax funds and thereby justifying why no one on capitol hill wishes for tax cuts. Hundreds of thousands of dollars go to studying each of the following and many more: the reproduction of crabs, why people fall in love, why people say "ain't", and the life cycle of bats in Mexico. (Concerning the latter, when asked what good became of his study, the professor in charge reported, "give me another grant and I'll find out." CBS news has found that similar studies have been made at enormous congressional outlay of funds, even to the point where a study was made on how to make a study.

Now these studies may be filled with earth shaking revelations to some but here, in a situation where we have been told to drop the physics, chemistry, and home economics and then cutback six staff positions, paying out more money than I'll ever earn teaching to find out why I say "ain't", ain't my idea of belt tightening.

On a recent inquiry into the immediate future of Glenville graduates (actually getting paid to teach) is a figure of around 80%, however, there are three considerations the job hunter will need to make. First, one should be willing to pull up roots and go where the work is, second, he must be prepared to work when (if) he gets the job, and then brace himself for the sad reality that the upper tax brackets will remain something to shoot for, at least for the first few years anyway.



In the year of 1914 a great rivalry developed between the Juniors and Seniors. One afternoon we found their colors were hanging from a window above the arch of the front entrance to Old Main. We surveyed the situation and became busy. We pulled the fire hose from a rack on the wall and turned the water on full. The colors were soon melted away. While this was going on President O. S. Bond ran through the hall pulling his hair, crying, wringing his hands and screaming Please, Please, Please. He appeared to have gone Bananna. The only casualty was the floor. It had six inches of water on it.

Some weeks later, on a rainy spring morning, I went up for an early class and discovered the colors again on the tower, high up out of reach of the fire hose.

There was a trap door in the ceiling of the upstairs hall which George Firestone would use when he went up to wind the tower clock. The Juniors had used this door to place the colors high as possible. They also had placed one of their men above to prevent us from getting through.

Micky Kennedy, Tom Copley, Stack Gerwig and I held a conference. Stack and I went to town, borrowed a pair of gum boots, a shot gun and some ammunition. I stuck the gun barrel down one boot and covered the stock with my rain coat. We started back to the hill. While we were doing this, Tom and Micky had fastened the trap door so it could not be opened especially from above.

The four of us were the only ones who knew that a man was locked in the attic. We agreed to not mention the fact, however, after sixty years and as I am the only surviving member I believe it will do no harm.

Many years later when Old Main was being renovated the workmen discovered the skeleton of a man far back in a dark and remote corner under the roof. This discovery was not made public. The College Administration made sure of that.

The ghost of this man has been rambling about the campus during all these years. Sometimes he comes down and enters the cemetery to visit. With his visit ended, he goes back to his home in the attic. He failed to close the gate on his way out.

'Henry IV' Thrills Audience With Shakespearian Humor

Who could ever think that the material of a man who lived and comprised his many historical works over 200 years ago would still persist in being delightfully funny, entertaining and so full of life? Well surely everyone who attended William Shakespeare's Henry IV, Part I will agree that these are the qualities which enhanced Monday night's production. A variety of students, faculty, and staff comprised the good sized crowd in attendance, with many seeing their first Shakespearean play.

The lights dimmed and the crowd readied themselves for the production and on stage appeared King Henry himself. It was a strain to consume his first speech since he spoke at a rapid speed and his enunciation seemed a bit muffled. However, as the play progressed the audience became more accustomed to the English accents with which the actors spoke and the lines were more easily grasped by the listeners.

It's quite obvious that Shakespeare had a delightful sense of humor evident by the characterization of Sir John Falstaff and his antics throughout the play. The costumes donned by the National Players were a bit less than would be expected of a touring stage group but the quality of their acting was evidence of much practicing and perfecting of their parts making Henry IV, Part I enjoyable for all who attended.

C. Franklin Writes On Social Freedom

Do you ever sit in your room and ponder about your freedoms granted to you as a citizen of the United States? Do you ever wonder if you're really free? Do you ever feel like a frustrated robot, dealing constantly with ideas intimately but not with people intimately. Do you ever feel that G. S. C. is projecting to much authority governing your social life? If you perceive things in these aspects, the old adage that only the prisoner sitting in his cell come to know the true meaning of freedom should become strikingly clear to you. The parallel is somewhat frightening. This analogy leads me to further pondering, but on college campus freedom is at least the right to come and go from your own room as you please, to do whatever you want to do in your room with whomever you want to do it. Freedom is the right to be left alone to regulate your personal affairs.

Freedom begins with no bans on intervisitation, no bans on liquor or alcohol, no *in loco parentis* barriers to privacy, intimacy, and mistake-making. Gaining freedom, and learning the process of gaining freedom means eliminating arbitrary social rules.

Freedom on the college campus today means students asserting their adulthood, and refusing to postpone the acceptance of adult responsibilities.

The dilemma of the students can be seen in its complete context. The entering student, with sophisticated expectations of pursuing adulthood development in the college setting, finds himself rendered almost immobile in pursuing that goal by the university imposed rules, which the university will not explicitly justify and which the student certainly cannot justify by his own standards or those of his peers. Thus added to the student's disdain for the rules themselves is his correct assumption that the college is deceiving him and challenging his integrity by expecting him to obey rules not of his own making and lacking stated justification. "Do as I say because I say to do it" is a stress-provoking statement to a sophisticated people in any age.

Consider the dilemma of the student who finds himself facing expulsion just because he broke the rule against dormitory intervisitation. Consider the couple who cannot develop a meaningful relationship because they cannot find either privacy on campus or adequate time, due to their adherence to the rules against apartment dwelling and intervisitation.

The basic problems created by arbitrary social rules, then, is clear. The final problem, however, is created by the "solutions" which "liberal" administrators are proposing. These solutions generally are in the form of extensions. Women's hours are extended which leads the administrators to install an alarm system on almost all doors on the bottom floors of the dorms.

It is not clear that these "liberalizations" are in fact only crumbs from the dinner table, pats on the head from Daddy, and that they only further aggravated the problem? For whenever an extension of freedom is granted, the principle of freedom itself is withheld.

Gaining freedom on campus begins with the elimination of arbitrary social rules. How much longer will it be before GSC's administrators realize that many of their social rules are futile in today's college setting? How much longer will you have to sit in your room and compare your social atmosphere with that of a prisoner? How many administrators and faculty could live harmoniously in such a dorm setting? Do you think that they would feel comfortable living under the same regulatory restrictions? Ask them sometime. The next time you're in your room pondering, try to come up with a solution to combat our present policies and regulations.

Ad. Counselor Job Is Open



Wildwood Flower Sponsors Kite Fest

The Wildwood Flower is sponsoring the first annual Windrfters Kite Flying Festival to be held Saturday and Sunday, April 5-6, at the Equitable Gas Company field, across from the Community Supermarket on Rt. 5. The spring event has three age groups: grade schoolers, students in high school, and college students. Each individual may enter in any of these four classes: I. individual; II. group of four; III. marathon (individual or groups); and IV. commercially made kites.

The contest rules are as follows: (1) In classes one, two, and three all kites must be handmade; (2) To qualify for classes the kite must stay airborne for three minutes, with a person getting three tries for a safe launch; and (3) Any material may be used for construction. This last stipulation applies for the first, second, and third classes, as the fourth is for commercially-made kites.

Prizes will be awarded in the four different classes according to categories. In Class I prizes will be awarded for the most original, highest flying (time limit of thirty minutes), longest airborne (starting at 10 a.m. until dark on Saturday), largest, smallest, acrobatic flying, and dog-fight (using paper streamers as tails, with the longest streamer the winner at the finish).

Those entering in Class II will be competing in the highest flying, longest airborne, largest, smallest, and formation flying categories. Class III entrants must enter most original, highest flying, longest airborne, and a category of his/her own choice. Individuals entering in Class IV will be awarded prizes in highest flying, longest airborne, acrobatic flying, and formation flying.

Speakers Take 3 Trophies



With two tournaments to go on the regular season and one pick up tournament before the national tournaments (the nationals at Niagara Falls, the other a limited entry Nationals to be held at Chicago and perhaps if Glenville qualifies one at Bradley University, Peoria, Illinois) Glenville should end up well fortified with qualifiers and well stocked with trophies. The next tournament for Glenville will be the W. Va. State tourney to be held this weekend at Parkersburg Community College, followed by the Marshall University Oral-Prep Tourney to be held April 4-5 at Marshall University.

The 1975 Glenville State College bowling team finished the regular season in second place in the WVIAC. The West Liberty Hilltoppers edged out the G-Men by one game ending with a record of 22-10 compared to the Pioneers' record of 21-11. The Alderson Broadbudds Battlers came in a close third in the conference with a 20-12 record.

On March 8 the Pioneers competed in the fourth and final WVIAC Regional Tournament in Charleston where the conference championship was decided. Glenville who placed second in this event was led by Rick Goodall's 183 average. He was followed by Tom Newberry and Sam Ferrell who both rolled a 171. Next for the G-Men were Rich McFee's 167, Gary Humphrey's 163 and Mike Simmons' 154 average.

As in basketball, the WVIAC has a conference Bowling Tournament to decide a tournament winner. If the conference champion and the conference tournament champion are different teams, they have a rolloff

The WVIAC Bowling Tournament will be held in Parkersburg this Saturday and Sunday.

Each year the top five bowlers in the conference are selected to the WVIAC All Conference Bowling Team. As it now stands three GSC bowlers have a shot at landing on that team. Newberry has rolled a seasonal average of 186 and is third in the conference, Ferrell is currently tied for fifth with a 179 mark, and Goodall has posted a 176 average, good for twelfth in the conference.

College Freshmen Termed As 'Poor'

Reprinted from the March 4, 1975 issue of the Charleston Gazette.

Nearly 75 per cent of a group of college and university English teachers surveyed say their freshman students are not adequately prepared for college classwork.

The majority of those surveyed said their students cannot read or write well or express themselves clearly and are not familiar with literature. A high percentage rated student grammar skills as poor.

A Fairmont State College teacher responding to the survey called most of his students "culturally illiterate apparently never having been exposed to good reading in the home."

The survey was sent to 42 teachers by the Charleston Daily Mail. Sixty-four per cent replied to the survey.

Asked to judge their student's general academic preparation for college, no teacher gave an excellent rating, only 26 per cent thought students are adequately prepared for higher learning, and 74 percent rated their students fair or poor.

More than half said the quality of students entering college has deteriorated in the past several years.

Fifty-one per cent of the teachers said their students cannot read well—a Shepherd College teacher said that last fall 64 per cent of students tested failed a test of their use of grammar.

A teacher at Alderson-Broadus said his students' grammar skills were "practically nonexistent," and a Glenville teacher wrote:

"English grammar, for most students is a 'foreign' language. The nature of the sentence, the phrase, the clause are all a mystery."

Jerry Harris, chairman of the Division of Humanities at Southern West

Virginia Community College in Logan and Williamson, said he has a student who could not, in any significant way, identify William Shakespeare or name any of his works.

"He did not even seem to be aware that most of Shakespeare's works are plays."

Harris added that "in this part of the state the problem is primarily attributable to the weak educational background of the home and communities from which the students come."

He noted that last year a sampling of students at the twin-campus school showed that as many as 25 per cent of them have parents who did not go beyond the eighth grade.

Several teachers equated a deterioration of academic preparedness with less rigid college admission policies, and others blamed television.

Others blamed today's secondary education.

"I think many high school teachers have their hands tied. There aren't enough books to go around, no homework can be assigned, teachers are frightened by parents, school is dismissed for the flimsiest of reasons, etc."

Because of the delay in mailing the mid-semester D-F Reports to parents, the drop deadline for withdrawing from a course with a "W" has been extended to Monday, March 24, 1975.

Following Groce's concert will be a free showing of the movie "Little Big Man" starring Dustin Hoffman. Admission is free by I.D.
