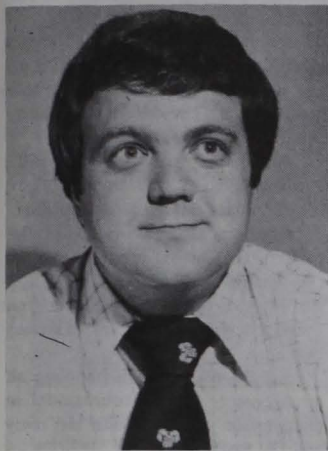

W. Perry Takes Job

The newly-appointed coordinator of GSC-PCC Cooperative Program is Mr. Willis J. Perry, Jr. The position consists of transferring students from a two year program at PCC to a four year at GSC. Mr. Perry resides in Parkersburg with his wife Judith. His office is at PCC.

Mr. Perry assumed his duties July 1. He taught social studies for three and one-half years at Martinsburg High in Berkeley County. While there, he coached varsity Football and Wrestling. He also taught 1 yr. at Parkersburg South.

A 1970 graduate of GSC, he holds an A.B. in Social Studies and an M.A. in Secondary Education with a minor in Economics from W.V.U. He will be enrolled in the doctoral program at W.V.U. next month. He also will help design a career Education Program. Perry will be teaching Educ. 301 also at PCC.

Mr. Perry is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Willis J. Perry, Sr. of 31 VanHorn Drive, Glenville, W. Va.

McGraner Directs Williams' One-Act

"I Can't Imagine Tomorrow" a one-act play written by Tennessee Williams will be performed July 17 at 8:00 p.m. in the Little Theatre. Student director for the play is Ms. Vicki McGraner, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W.P. McGraner of Elkview.

I Can't Imagine Tomorrow is a probing character study which reveals the unique ability of Tennessee Williams to illumine the pathos and terrible loneliness which underlie human condition. The play involves only two characters, a man and a woman. The woman is in her dark house. The man, her only friend and equally solitary, dreads returning to the airless hotel room which has become his home. He tries to reach out to her, to help her, but it is too difficult, perhaps too late for her to respond. Their confrontation, sometimes gentle, sometimes tense, becomes a revealing and moving emotional experience as they accept the need to face alone the terrors which might be more easily met together.

Portraying number one, the woman will be Sherri Catalano. Ms. Catalano is employed at Glenville State College as admissions counselor. She is a graduate of GSC with an A.B. in Language Arts. While at GSC she was an active member of Delta Zeta Sorority, Alpha Psi Omega drama honorary, and Ohningohow Players. Ms. Catalano is the granddaughter of Harlan L. Bowyer of Spencer, W. Va.

The other part in the play, the man, has not been filled yet. Any male interested in this part may contact Ms. McGraner in the underground.

Admission for I Can't Imagine Tomorrow is free.

Camp Counselors Direct Youth Camp

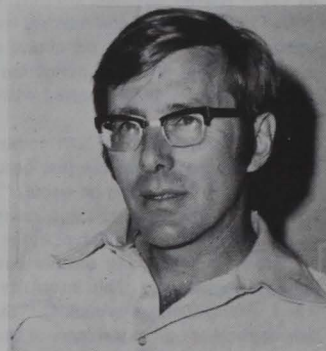
Phillip Stump Crash Victim

Rev. M. G. Adkins Takes Campus Post

Rev. M. Gene Adkins has been appointed GSC campus minister. He is a former resident of Friendly, W. Va. where he was a minister to six churches. Adkins took the position June 19, 1975.

Adkins graduated from Hendricks College, in Conway, Arkansas with an A.B. in English. He also graduated from Perkins School of Theology, Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas with a Master of Divinity.

The new resident minister applied for the position through the District Supt. in Wheeling, then through the Bishop of the church and finally through the Board of Directors in Glenville.

His office can be found in the Wesley Foundation with hours being 10 a.m.-4 p.m. daily and from 6:30-10:30 p.m. in the evening.

Dormitory Regulations Outlined

During the spring term for 1974-1975, the president of Glenville State College sent a letter to parents of students living in the residence halls. The results of this letter have been released by the president's office.

Out of 500 letters addressed to parents, there were 289 replies with 84% expressing the desire that no significant changes be made in residence hall living regulations.

The following regulations will be maintained for the coming college year:

(1) One entrance to Louis Bennett Hall and two in Pickens Hall will be open 24 hours daily. Pickens Hall has two main entrances, one for Scott Wing and the other for Wagner Wing. The main entrances to the two halls will have security personnel on duty from 11:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. daily. The security personnel will have assistance of other campus security in case of emergencies if necessary. Students living in a particular residence hall will have no restrictions in terms of entering and leaving the hall where they have their living quarters.

(2) All doors other than the main entrances in each hall will have alarms operative from 8:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. daily.

(3) "Open House" or intervisitations may be held in each residence hall with a maximum of one per week on weekends to be arranged by the governing board of the hall. The board is composed of student representatives and the elected officers of the hall. The hours for "Open House" or intervisitation will be from 7:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., with doors of living quarters open and supervised by Resident Assistants.

(4) The 11:00 p.m. check which was established this past year, and has served as a record "at the moment" as to what residents are in the hall will be discontinued. This information has been a record for telephone switchboard operators for use in case of calls for particular students from the campus or home or elsewhere. Thus, a man or woman who wishes the telephone operator to know where or when available for calls will take the responsibility for doing so.

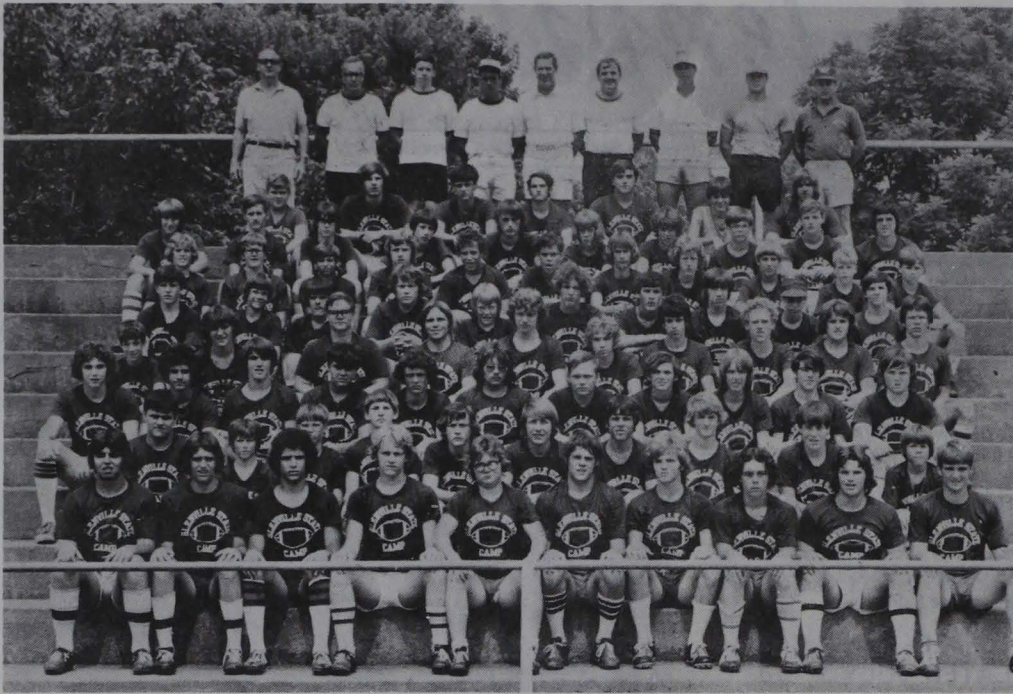

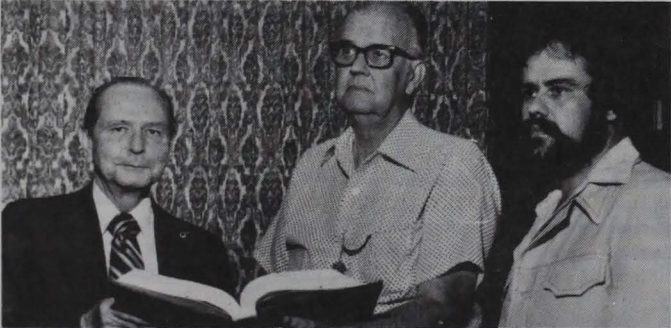
Even the problems we have today can be reflected from earlier times. Stagnant bureaucracies and unequal occupational rewards were two of Thomas Jefferson's worries when he wrote, "I think we have more machinery of government than is necessary, too many parasites living on the labor of the industries!" This has been evident in the U.S. since its birth.

The ever-present Big Brother complex has been periodically brought to light in recent years. This insecurity was evident in America's first century, when James Madison remarked, "Since the general civilization of mankind I believe there are more instances of the abridgment of the freedom of the people by gradual and silent encroachments of those in power than by violent and sudden usurpations." Very recently, the prophesied deadline of '1984' may have been slackened by the expose of C.I.A. wrongdoings.

Our democracy has had successes, but in the light of recent political and governmental mistakes, Calvin Coolidge's statements may still partly apply: "It would be folly to argue that the people cannot make political mistakes. They can and do make grave mistakes. They know it, they pay the penalty, but compared with the mistakes which have been made by every kind of autocracy, they are unimportant." Of course, Vietnam and Watergate were very important, but the imperative thing now is not to repeat them.

Idealistically, some day, we may solve many of the problems we have: poverty, racism, discrimination, and the general prejudice between individuals of different life styles. We will be a far better country for it, and then we will really have reason to celebrate. Let's schedule it for our Bicentennial, July 4, 1976.
