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"Ludlow Fair" Stars Catalano & Ditlow

A one-act play, "Ludlow Fair" by Lanford Wilson, will be performed July 31 at 8:00 p.m. in the Little Theatre. The play, directed by Ms. Vicki McGraner, is part of the requirements for a Play Production class offered here on campus.

"Ludlow Fair" is an engrossingly humorous play which offers a revealing glimpse into the hopes, dreams, and problems of two roommates, Rachel and Agnes. Rachel is glamorous, fast-living, sometimes lost in her own self-dramatizations; Agnes is plain, matter-of-fact, her shyness masked by a kooky personality. The play delves into problems each has with her boyfriend. Rachel has had her latest boyfriend arrested for stealing and remorsefully finds she is in love with him. Agnes, using

witty wisecracks, tries to cheer Rachel, but the latter falls asleep out of self-imposed boredom. Finding herself alone, Agnes reflects upon her forthcoming lunch date with the boss's disappointing son. Suddenly simple and moving, the play offers a heart-felt look at the true romantic, Agnes, possessing the real emotions as compared to Rachel's trumped-up, self-indulgent flourishes.

Portraying the part of Rachel is Ms. Sherri Catalano, GSC's admissions counselor. Ms. Catalano is a '75 graduate of GSC with an A.B. in Language Arts. She was an active member of Delta Zeta sorority, Alpha Psi Omega drama honorary, Ohningohow Players, and editor of the "Mercury". She is the granddaughter of Harlan L. Bowyer of Spencer.

His most memorable performance was as Tell-Me-A-Story-Man in "Raggedy Annie's Christmas", presented for the faculty, administration, and staff members with their children in the 1974 annual Christmas Party. Tell-Me-A-Story-Man travelled the country telling stories to children. Mr. Hardway's musical and acting talent and warm responsibility added the special touch to the play of pretend.

Three New Degrees Offered

Curriculum Gains Released

Glenville State College is pleased to announce that the West Virginia Board of Regents approved three new programs at its July 8, 1975 meeting. All three programs represent Glenville State College's continuing effort to meet the changing demands of higher education in West Virginia.

An Associate in Science Degree in Computer Science and Applications will be offered beginning in the fall semester, 1975. A large number of small business establishments in West Virginia are now purchasing or leasing small computer systems to generate the volume of work required by their growing enterprises. For example, there are more than fifty IBM System/3 computers in West Virginia and the expectation is that the number of these System/3's will increase at the rate of about one dozen per year within the foreseeable future. Preparation characteristics of this two-year program in computer science--simulations, application activities and work experience will enable the graduate to work

competently with computer systems.

In addition to the two-year program in Computer Science, Glenville has added an area of concentration in computer science to the business administration program.

A Bachelor's Degree in Social Work is now available at Glenville. The success of the College's two year program in social work coupled with the increasing demand for people who are professionally prepared in social work have led to the establishment of this four-year program. A minimum of thirty-six semester hours of social work courses are required plus twenty-four hours of courses from related areas such as psychology, sociology, and economics. Students who hold BSW degrees have a wide variety of employment opportunities in the social work field.

A two-year program which will lead to an Associate in Arts degree will be offered to interested and craft-oriented people who possess aptitude and want training to become craft designers or craft directors. The program is designed to train craftsmen to operate their own shops or to be crafts specialists in craft programs, workshops, schools or government agencies. Although students will study a variety of crafts,

E. G. Davis Named New Coach

Dr. D. Banks Wilburn, President of Glenville State College, announces the appointment of Everett Gene Davis to the staff of GSC subject to the approval of the W. Va. Board of Regents at its August meeting.

Mr. Davis will be an Assistant Professor of Physical Education and will serve as an Assistant Football coach and Head Coach of Women's Basketball.

Gene Davis graduated from Jane Lew High School. He graduated from Glenville State in 1963 with an AB degree in Education with majors in Physical Education and Social Studies. At this time, he played football for GSC. He received his Masters Degree in classroom teaching with a major in Physical Education in 1971, and has earned additional hours above his Masters Degree.

Mr. Davis taught and coached at Brookside High School in Shoffield Lake, Ohio from 1963 until 1965. In 1965-1966, he taught and coached at Weston Junior High School. He became head football coach at Lewis County High School, in 1966 and remained there until

1971. Mr. Davis moved to Grafton High School in 1971 as Head Football Coach. In 1974-1975, he was appointed Principal at Terra Alta High School in Terra Alta, W.Va.

Dr. Robert Dollgener, Athletic Director and Chairman of Health, Physical Education and Safety at GSC, said, "We are looking forward to having a man like Gene Davis join our staff. He possesses an excellent background in physical education and athletics which will complement our existing staff and programs."

Coach "Whitey" Adolfson, recently appointed to the head football coaching position at Glenville said "Gene Davis has been a personal friend of mine for a number of years. I have worked with him professionally as a teacher and as a coach. He has an excellent knowledge of football and I am looking forward to having him join our football staff. I feel that he will that he will be very helpful to our football program as a defensive line coach."

Glenville State College is rapidly expanding to meet the changing times. Early registration provides students an opportunity to see their advisors, plan their schedule, and to complete the registration process. You will have an opportunity to pay your fees during this time, or you may pay them later by mail, or you may wait until you arrive on campus next fall.

When you arrive on campus (anytime between 4:30 and 6:00 p.m.), you should check in at Pickens Hall. You may reserve a room at Pickens Hall for \$3.09 per night, but you must provide your own linens and towels. We recommend that you bring two half-sheets, a pillowcase, and towels.
