Scholarships Are Granted

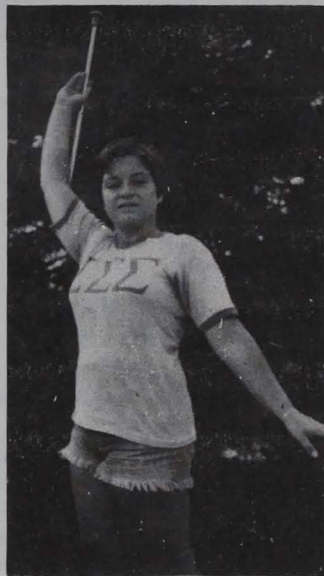

Team Makes Top 20

The Glenville State College forensics team, coached by Katherine Leisering of the Speech department, placed in the top twenty schools in the nation based on overall performance for the 1974-75 forensics year, it was learned recently. Glenville, already in the top twenty at the national finals held at Niagara University last April copped this additional honor in the National Forensics Association's tabulations for the 1974-75 year. To gain this enviable position, points are given schools for each first, second and third place it wins in every event in every tournament over the entire year, in both Individual Events and Debate. Glenville's achievement becomes more remarkable considering it never entered a debate team and all its points came from individual events only. Many of the other schools in the top twenty also had debate teams to help accrue points. Glenville was the only W.Va. college which made it to the top twenty.

This year Glenville hopes to con-

tinue its success on the forensics circuit. Currently the team is nine members strong with Dorothy Wright, Judy Ditlow, Art Wilt, and Brenda Maylee Miller as returning members and Judy Crites, Brenda Henthorn, Stephanie Davis, Angela Davis and Peggy Collins as new team members.

The first tournaments for Glenville will be in November. First will be the Mad Hatter Individual Events tourney at Bloomsburg, Pa., November 7-8, the Midwest Invitational held at P.C.C., November 14-16, followed by the Ohio University tournament to be held the first weekend in December. As in the past any team member who reaches the finals in any event at these tournaments will qualify for the national finals in April, dates and place to be announced.

Another Attempt . . .

One week ago today an attempt was made on the life of President Gerald R. Ford as he walked some 150 yards from a hotel to the California state capitol. Fortunately for the President and for the country, a Secret Service man reacted spontaneously, disarming Lynette Fromme of her Colt .45. They later learned that the gun was loaded but no bullets were in the firing chamber. Nevertheless, another assassination attempt was exposed to the public eye. Many are never publicized.

According to the September 7 issue of The New York Times, the number of political assassinations in the United States is appallingly higher than that of most nations. The Times attributes this to the American political style of wading through crowds to shake hands with the people, exposing the politicians openly to possible assailants. Although the Secret Service employs several thousand persons to guard the lives of politicians and their families, there seems no sure method of protection for these people whose campaign tactics involve getting close to the American people, literally. The Times quoted President Ford as saying, "In my judgment it is vitally important for a President to see the American people, and I am going to continue to have personal contact with the American people."

But what was Lynette Fromme's motive? Was she sent here by a communistic government as an attempt to throw the government of our country into another leader-less turmoil? What is the motive of any person who makes an attempt on the life of another human being? Are they all mentally unbalanced or filled with hate and envy? All of these questions will never be answered. But in a time when man has advanced to the far reaches of the universe, barbarianism still thrives.

Career Seminar Will Feature Young

The first in a series of informal career seminars will be held Thursday, September 18th in the side lounge on the first floor of Wagner Wing in Pickens Hall.

Mr. Buford Young will lead discussion on programs and job prospects in the Social Work field. Mr. Young received his Master's degree in Social Work from WVU and has practiced in his field for four years. He is currently chairman of the Department of Social Work here at GSC.

Mr. Young began the 2-year Associate Degree Program in Social Work here in 1973. Heightened interest in the field has facilitated a program expansion. A four-year program culminating in a Bachelor of Social Work Degree is now being offered by the college.

Any student currently enrolled in

Social Work or who maybe is interested in entering either of the programs is encouraged to attend.

The September 22nd deadline for registration for the 1975-76 Graduate Record Examinations is drawing near.

Seniors who plan to attend graduate and professional schools should complete these tests before graduation. They are being offered twice this semester, on October 18 and December 13.

For registration forms and more detailed information, seniors should see Mr. Kermit L. Kinder, Counselor, in 124 Louis Bennett Hall.

Fee Waiver Applications are also available through Mr. Kinder's office. Those students receiving financial aid or those who can prove financial need are eligible for the waivers of test fees.

Examinations To Be Given

Students completing teacher preparation programs may take the National Teacher Examinations on any of the three different test dates given recently by Educational Testing Service, a nonprofit, educational organization which prepares and administers this testing program.

New dates for the testing of prospective teachers are: November 8, 1975, February 21, 1976, and July 17, 1976. The tests will be given at nearly 400 locations throughout the United States, ETS said.

Results of the National Teacher Examinations are used by many large school districts as one of several factors in the selection of new teachers and by several states for certification or licensing of teachers. Some colleges also require all seniors preparing to teach to take the examinations.

On each full day of testing, prospective teachers may take the Common Examinations which measure their professional preparation and general educational background and an Area Examination which measures their mastery of the subject they expect to teach.

Prospective candidates should contact the school systems in which they seek employment, or their colleges, for specific advice on which examinations to take and on which dates they should be taken.

The Bulletin of Information for Candidates contains a list of test centers, and general information about the examinations, as well as a Registration Form. Copies may be obtained from Mr. Kinder in the counseling dept., or directly from National Teacher Examinations, Box 911, Educational Testing Service, Princeton, New Jersey 08540.

1975 Tri-State Red Cross Urges Majority Campus Participation

Your blood donation could help protect all the students and faculty members here at GSC, as well as their families.

If twenty per-cent of the GSC population donates 45 minutes of their time and a pint of blood, the entire student body and faculty and their families will be eligible to receive blood as needed.

The Red Cross Bloodmobile will visit GSC on Monday, September 22nd from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Anyone 18-65 years old in good health who weighs at least 110 pounds may donate. A seventeen-year-old may give blood with parental consent. Some of the reasons blood may be rejected are: exposure to malaria (within the past year), hepatitis, or jaundice, currently taking antibiotics, over six weeks pregnant, victim of diabetes or cancer, if anyone in family has a kidney ailment, or have had a tooth extraction within 72 hours. However, anyone with any of these conditions who wishes to donate blood should see the nurse.

CLEP TESTS EXPLAINED

Many students are receiving credit through CLEP Examinations. Students at Glenville are now restricted on credit for the general examinations. At a meeting on April 9, 1975, the Committee on Academic Affairs approved the following policy:

"After a student has completed 28 semester hours of college work, including CLEP or any other special credit, he may not take the CLEP General Examinations and receive Glenville State College credit for them."

No credit will be posted for those areas of the general exam if that exam is taken after the student has accumulated 28 semester hours.

Volunteers are needed to assist in these areas: typing, registration, refreshments and medical units. An LPN is needed to take temperatures. Assistants may also volunteer to set up the equipment and will report at 9 a.m. on the 22nd.

Rush plans are being completed for next week. The first smoker will be Monday September 15th in the Multi-Purpose room. Anyone interested is cordially invited.

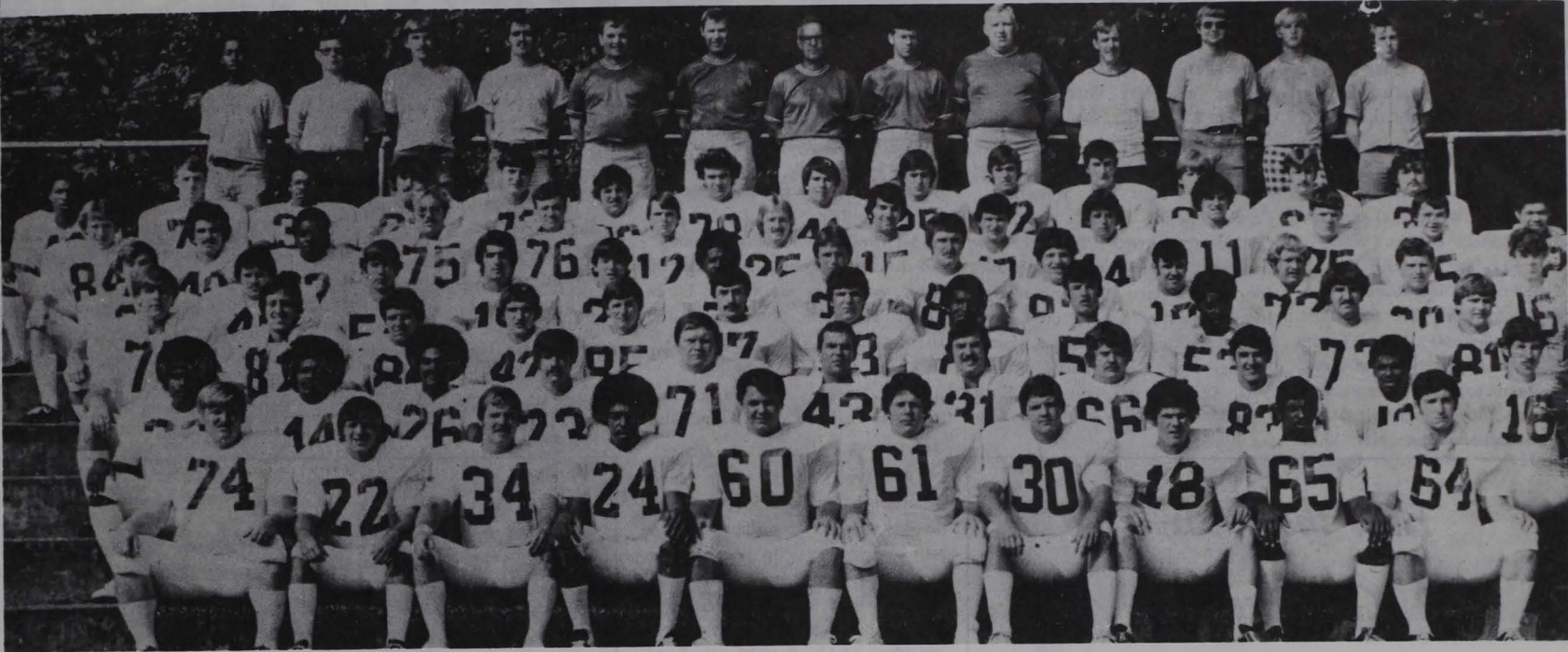

WV Wesleyan 24, Shepherd 21. It's a toss up.

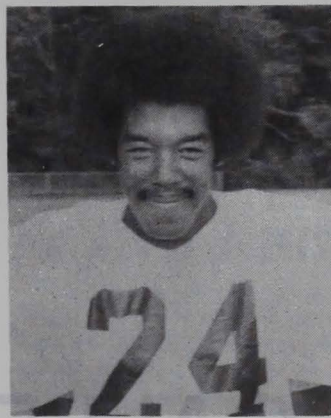
Glenville 31, Madison 26. The G-Men will have to score to beat the Dukes.

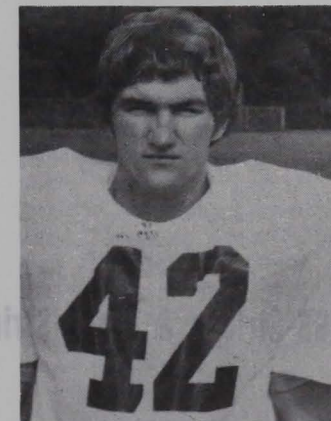

Madison Invades Glenville

The Madison Dukes of Virginia are rolling into Glenville tomorrow and will help open up the 1975 Glenville Pioneer football season. This will be the first meeting of both schools in any sport.

Madison College, which is located in Harrisonburg, Virginia, is coached by Challace McMillin. The Dukes had a 6-4 record last year and that was their first full year in varsity competition. The school was a girls' school until four years ago.

The Dukes have 46 returning lettermen, 9 are seniors, 13 juniors and 24 sophomores. Last year they had an explosive offense and all but one key player returned. The Dukes led the Virginia College Athletic Association in total offense, rushing and scoring and finished third in passing.

Coach McMillan pointed out that their offensive and defensive lines,

plus the offensive backfield, are their stronger positions, while their secondary and kicking game could hurt them in game play.

Some of the Madison players to watch tomorrow are quarterback Leslie Branick, tailbacks Bernard Slayton and Ron Stith, center Brian Grainer and offensive tackle Tim Phillips. On defensive, watch for guard Woody Bergeria, defensive ends Rich Jackson and Dale Eaton, linebacker Dewey Windham and defensive backs Brent Good and Mike Atalla.

The game between the Dukes and the Pioneers has all the makings of being one of the most exciting of opening games for the Pioneers in a long time. With the high geared offense of Madison, and with the enthusiastic Pioneers under new head coach Whitey Adolfson, it should prove to be one heck of a tussle.

Hays Returns


