Dr.'s Point Of View

This is in response to an editorial on page two of the September 19, 1975 edition of The Glenville Mercury. Mr. Boilon painted a false and misleading picture of the course policy in the Department of Forest Technology. There are two conditions in which we restrict classes to majors in courses offered in forestry, land surveying and ornamental horticulture. These are: 1. When field labs become too large to effectively teach, and 2. New classes where it is highly desirable to have a smaller class to best cover

Over the past few years several non-major students have taken courses designed specifically for forestry students. The forestry and land surveying programs are well established and we permit anyone to take these classes as

long as field lab classes do not become excessively large. The same policy will

prevail in the ornamental horticulture program. Many non-major students

have taken forestry classes as electives during the past few years. I know of none that were dismissed from class in these established programs under

circumstances outlined by Mr. Boilon. Furthermore, I know of no attempt by Mr. Boilon to contact me relative to policies he outlined in his editorial. Perhaps a journalist should attempt to get his facts in order prior to press




Delta Zeta

GSC Beats Tech On Casto's Kick

The Glenville Pioneers won their first ballgame of the season last Saturday night at Montgomery when they eased by the WV Tech Golden Bears, 3-0.

The Pioneers, who have yet to yield a point to an opponent or have yet to score a touchdown themselves, scored all they needed when sophomore kicker Bob Casto connected on a 27 yard field goal with eight minutes left in the third quarter to give the G-Men a 3-0 lead and the win.

Casto's kick came after a 48 yard drive which was keyed by a 30 yard pass completion from Chris Anderson to Bob Shaffer.

The G-Men came close to scoring again in the fourth quarter when Glenville's quarterback Tom Cowan guided the Pioneers inside Tech's 10 vard line. But the G-Men were stopped when they were called for offensive holding and Casto's 34 yard field goal attempt was blocked.

Tech's only scoring threat came in the second quarter when they tried a 35 yard field goal but the holder fumbled the ball on the snap and the Golden Bears were stopped.

The Pioneers won the battle in statistics collecting 240 yards total offense, with 129 on the ground and 111 in the air. Tech, in comparison, gained 192 total offense, with 127 on the ground and 65 yards in the air.

Glenville's Don Brady led the G-Men in rushing with 90 yards in 22 carries.

Anderson led the G-Men in passing, hitting six of twelve passed for 105 yards.

The Pioneers' next game will be tomorrow at Rohrbough Field beginning at 1:30 p.m. against the undefeated Salem Tigers.



The Pioneers are scheduled to open up against the Dukes next year down at Harrisonburg, Va.

Salem To Try GSC Defense




