GSC Enrollment Stated As 1622

The enrollment of Glenville State has increased 6.8 per cent over last year's with a total of 1,622. This includes 1,449 in-state and 143 outof-state. The remaining 30 are in PCC extension classes. Fifty one counties, out of 55, in West Virginia are represented here at Glenville. Gilmer county has the most representatives with 224. Wood County is in second place with 173, and Braxton has 136. Mr. John White, a GSC math instructor, attended the National Teacher's Retirement Council held in Houston, Texas, during the week of Sept. 28 to Oct. 2. Mr. White was accompanied by his wife and the Executive Secretary of the Board, Mr. Williard Ansel, and his wife. Approximately 500 members attended, including representatives from each state and some from the larger cit-

Composing the W.Va. State Teacher's Retirement Board are the Gov. Mr. Arch Moore, Mr. Donald Brown, the Director of Finance and Budget, Mr. Cleveland Benedict, the State Superintendant of Schools, Daniel Taylor, and three elected members-Lloyd G. Farinash, an instructor at Parkersburg High School, Mrs. Velma Allen, a Phillipi Elem. teacher, and Mr. White. The 3 elected members are chosen every six years by the entire membership of the state. This year approx. 40,000 people elected the W.Va. Board, not including the 13,000 retired teachers who also cast their vote.

During their week long stay in Houston, Mr. White and the other members of the Board discussed such problems as the Board structures, teacher's benefits, the specific problems facing retired teachers, and the investment of funds.

The Board meets annually, with the next meeting being held in Honolulu, Hawaii.

And for those who prefer making their own handicrafts, there are instruction books on such things as quilt patterns, gardening, and hand-made toys. Music and history books pertaining to the Appalachians are also stocked

The Country Store, besides being a popular gift shop, is the headquarters for the West Virginia State Folk Festival. The Folk Festival has been held annually for 16 years. Over this period of time many antiques have been accumulated, and the Country Store is the storing place

The store is run by Mrs. Fern Rollyson, this year's Parade Marshall for the Homecoming Parade, and also the President of W.V. State Folk Festival, Inc. The organization's aim is to promote and preserve the old ways of living. Since the organization is non-profit, the store is run on a volunteer basis. The store is open year round at different times. During the festival, the fourth weekend in June, it is open every day from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. The festival is held on the streets of Glenville, and on the college campus. After the festival, Mrs. Rollyson and other volunteers take items to the Cedar Lakes Arts and Craft Fair.

The Country Store sells handcrafted items from around the country at a 20% commission. Foods such as home-made apple butter and molasses are also sold. Pioneer P. Stovall Spurs Enthusiasm

In the fall of 1933 the students of Glenville State College decided to elect a spirit leader for the college athletic teams. They decided that to qualify one must be a senior male in good academic standing and have never lettered in any sport. With this criteria in mind, an election was held in which Charles Bennett was chosen as GSC's first pioneer. His official duties were to attend the coronation of the Homecoming Queen, participate in the Homecoming parade, and fire up the student spirit for the Homecoming

In 1934, the Pioneer, Homer Blackhurst, had the distinction of becoming the first Pioneer to be admitted for membership in the G-Club, the college athletic club.

In 1954, GSC's Homecoming was a little dampened when the fields flooded and Homecoming was cancelled. William Rumbaugh was the

Butch Hays, the 1965 Pioneer, had the unique experience of using three different types of muzzle loaders: a Kentucky Long Rifle, a double barrel muzzle loader, and a .69 caliber rifle. The first two of these exploded.

In the year of 75-76 we are proud to have senior Perry Stovall as our Pioneer. Perry is a Business Administration major from Beckley. Perry belongs to Tau Kappa Epsilon fraternity. His opinion of the crowd's spirit-"Sometimes it's good and sometimes it's poor."

Like the preceding 43 pioneers, Perry will wear the traditional garb of buckskins, a coonskin cap, and will be sporting his own version of the Pioneer beard. His new costume was made by Mrs. Roma Adkins of the Home Economics Department at the request of the Student Con-





The Frank Montrose Award that is being presented at half-time at the Homecoming Game is given annually to the most prolific senior GSC athlete(s). The committee searched to find a man of athletic merit, outstanding scholastic average and 'unimpeachable moral character. In 1952, when this award was initiated, the mere suggestion of Frank Montrose ended their search.

In the year of 1939, Frank Montrose came to the GSC campus as a promising football prospect. By the second week of the regular season, Montrose had proved himself as a college gridder. Against rival Fairmont, Montrose scored two six-pointers while passing for a third. His first collegiate score came on a dazzling 63 yard punt return.


Against Shepherd, Montrose "did it all," setting up the Pioneers' first score on a 17 yard sweep. GSC's next score belonged to Montrose on a 12 yard scamper. A 59 yard open field jaunt was the next Montrose score which he followed up with a 46 yard interception return enabling the Pioneers to score again.

This stardom was short-lived as Montrose began to play less and less. The spring of 1940 brought him stricken with nephritis, causing him to lose his eyesight and to withdraw from school.

Shortly before Montrose left school, Mercury sports editor, Earl McDonald, shook his hand and said, "See you in September at training camp." But September never arrived as Frank Montrose died from his fight with nephritis on June 21.



"Never Too Late" Now Showing

Homecoming weekend 1975 has arrived in full color with the usual excitement and flavor of Fall. The Drama Department proudly offers an additional gift to this year's nostalgic weekend. Never Too Late by Sumner Arthur Long provides chuckles, chorkles, tummy tickles and just an over all good feeling inside.

Never Too Late was first produced November 27, 1962 on Broadway and was an instant success.

"The unsung hero of the piece is 41 yr. old playwrite Sumner Arthur Long who's Broadway debut has left him slightly shell shocked from the force of a direct hit. As unassuming as his play, Long, a father of two, admits he was even less prepared for a flop: "I wouldn't have dared to go home to Los Angeles.

The children-they give you such a send off-you hate to sneak back tarred and feathered." A long time TV writer, Long joshes about his labor pains with Never Too Late: "Eight weeks to write, siv years to retype." He got the idea for the play from watching "a pretty grevhaired woman walking down Wilshire Boulevard. She had the only happy face in sight, and was obviously pregnant. I wondered what happened when she first told her husband, what happened when her marrigable children heard of it."

Long took this curiousity and from a genuine wit and humor gave us Never Too Late.

The play itself is based upon a woman in her middle forties, who for 30 years has washed clothes, cooked, cleaned and in all actuality been a slave to her husband and king of the household, Harry. Then after visiting Dr. James Kimbro, she makes her entrance to the family bedecked as a new Edith, with the words, "I'm going to have a baby." She turns a once happy, and quiet residential home into utter chaos.

Harry, the once overly-proud and very obviously overly-bearing head of the household, has been somewhat de-throned by his wife's growing courage as a new mother. Through Edith's whimpering fainting spells, Harry melts into a puddle of apologies. "In the face of his astounding prospective fatherhood, when the child gets out of college, I'll be 83," he groans.

CHARACTERS PORTRAYED

Steve Deem, who will be portraying Harry Lambert, has an astute ability for revealing the comedy involved in such a play as Never Too Late, with his booming voice and facial expressions that could kill an audience with laughter. Mr. Deem portrays Harry to the hilt.

As Edith, Peggy Collins brings out the warm and yet subtle comedy that Long wants to get across to his audience. The excitement that Ms. Collins puts into the role will be conveyed to the audience as sheer enjoyment.

Harry's attitude toward the whole situation is a little understandable. With his daughter Kate and son-in-law Charlie living under the same roof, there always seems to be tension. His attitude toward youth as a whole is summed up in "Their whole generation is just plain lazy...won't think for themselves, won't do for themselves."

Charlie, the meathead son-in-law, is forever doing the wrong thing at

the right time. Throughout the play he and Harry tangle in words and finally meet their show-down. One of the funniest scenes in the play is the uproariously hilarious drunk scene. This scene, "seems like a creative inspiration of mischief."

Bob Hays, a new-comer to GSC's stage, comes across as the perfect meathead. Between the clashes with Harry and the sugar-sweet attitude toward Edith, his abilities are unquestionable. Charlie's sexy wife. Kate, who doesn't want to break her fingernails, is perfectly expressed by the feminine Janet Eriksen. In the total chaos of the household, after Edith makes her llittle announcement, she goes from riches to rags. Harry is still definitely dominant. Although she has never cooked a meal in her life and has not "actually been domesicated. Kate must now accept full responsibility of the household. Fixing breakfast, lunch, and dinner for Harry Lambert is definitely not the ideal situation for the most experienced cook

Ms. Eriksen, another new comer to Glenville's stage comes across as the defiant and yet submissive daughter. She should take a stand against her father and yet knowing this is impossible, she portrays perfectly the sexy to doudy Kate.

Edith's closest friend and trouble maker for Harry is Grace Kimbrough As a super sophisticated wife of doctor Jim, she fills Edith's head with all sorts of expensive ideas which Harry terms "female nonsense." Grace will be portrayed by the veteran to Glenville's stage, Ms. Barbara Stemple.

Her husband the doctor is the easy going type who attempts to use logic on Harry. This easy-going member of the cast is being successfully portrayed by Joe Boggs.

Mayor Crane is a typical small town politician. Being quite sure of himself, he attempts to ridicule Harry with subtle satire, when he finds out about the new member to Harry's old life-style. Gilbert Valdez plays the perfect small town mayor with his quick wit and authoritative air.

The policeman will be portrayed by Kent Lowther, another rookie to Glenville. His temper is almost always under control as he attempts to talk to the drunk Charlie and Harry.

Internships Are Offered

Application forms will be available immediately on campuses of state colleges and universities for the Board of Regents public service-learning internship program.

Students interested in receiving 12 to 15 credit hours by participating in the internship program for one semester should contact the person who has been designated a liaison officer at the institutions in which they are enrolled.

Completed applications are to be returned to campus liaison officers by November 1, 1975. Students

will be notified of their acceptance on November 15, 1975.

Dr. John Callebs is the statewide coordinator of the new study plan and also is professor of educational administration at West Virginia College of Graduate Studies.

He said 20 or 30 students will be selected for the internships which will start January 9, 1976 in Charleston with agencies in state government.

"Each student will receive an educational stipend of \$85 per week for 16 weeks for a total of \$1,360. The payment will be provided by the government agency," Dr. Callebs said.

Dr. Ben L. Morton, Chancellor of the Board of Regents, said the Board desired to implement a program which makes a public service experience available to West Virginia students.

"The service-learning experience is an opportunity to bring together college and university students and government in a relationship designed to yield optimum benefits to the public," Dr. Morton said.

The decision to implement the internship program was made following a study 2, to whether such a plan should be developed. The Southern Regional Education Board provided \$3,500 for the study.

AAUP Holds Fall Meeting

The West Virginia Conference of the American Association of University Professors held their fall meeting at Jackson's Mill September 26th and 27th

According to Dr. Lowell Fredin, President of the Glenville Chapter of AAUP, three resolutions were passed, the most important of which was a "request for the national office of AAUP to undertake an investigation of the W.Va. Board of Regents' policies that may violate established AAUP standards of college governance and academic due process." Specifically, the state conference is grieved about Policy Bulletin number 40, in which the Board of Regents outlines its policy giving the President of each state institution complete power over certain campus policies not governed by the Board of Regents. Dr. Fredin said this "effectually removes the faculty from the governing process of the institution."


According to Dr. Gary Gillespie, chairman of the Lyceum-Convocation Committee, three events have been currently scheduled for the school year.
